Weekly Public Safety and Crime Information

December is National Drunk and Drugged Driving Prevention Month. First started in December of 1981, this campaign focuses on the period between Thanksgiving and Christmas to raise awareness of the issues of impaired driving. This period is regarded as “one of the deadliest and most dangerous times on America’s roadways”. Below are facts provided by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration regarding impaired driving.

- It is illegal to drive with a BAC of 0.08% or higher in 49 states, including the District of Columbia. There is only one state where this is different, Utah, where the legal limit is lower than the national limit at just 0.05% BAC.
- Even if you believe you are not above a 0.08% BAC and only “buzzed” you can still be charged with a DUI. **If you feel different you drive different, buzzed driving is drunk driving.**
- According to the NHSTA, 885 people were killed in traffic incidents involving a drunk driver in just the month of December in 2017. 267 of these fatalities occurred between December 25th (Christmas) and New Year’s Day (January 1st).
- Approximately 33% of all traffic fatalities annually are a result of drunk drivers [BAC of .08%]. In 2017, that was 10,874 lives lost.
- A DUI is not limited to just alcohol consumption. Driving following the consumption of alcohol or narcotics is impaired driving.
- On average, a single DUI could set you back \$10,000 in attorney’s fees, fines, court costs, lost time at work, higher insurance rates, car towing, and more. A second offense could cost you thousands more.
- **If you see someone on the road who you believe is driving impaired, call 9-1-1**

Rockville City Police Reported Incidents

The Rockville City Police Department provides a weekly Crime Report of serious incidents to serve as an overview of police activity occurring within the City Limits of Rockville. Please note this summary does not include every reported incident that has occurred during this time frame.

It is to be noted that the words “arrested” and “charged” do not imply guilt.

ARRESTS

11/25/20, a female, age 52, was arrested for shoplifting and possession of narcotic paraphernalia following an incident that occurred in the 1600 block of Rockville Pike.

11/28/20, a male, age 34, was arrested on the strength of a bench warrant for failure to appear in court and failure to identify to law enforcement for an event that occurred earlier in the 100 block of First Street.

11/28/20, a male, age 31, was arrested for public intoxication following an incident that occurred in the 200 block of Meadow Hall Drive.

11/28/20, a male, age 59, was arrested for driving under the influence following an incident that occurred at the intersection of Falls Road and Wooton Parkway.

11/30/20, a male, age 53, was arrested for malicious destruction of property and disorderly conduct following an incident that occurred in the 1300 block of Rockville Pike

INCIDENTS

1600 block Rockville Pike, the complainant reports that an unknown subject removed perfume from a business without paying for the items between 12:34 p.m. and 12:36 p.m. on 11/24/20.

The suspects are described as:

#1 B/F – approx. 5 feet 6 inches, 150 pounds, Medium Build, Long Hair

#2 B/F – approx. 5 feet 6 inches, 155 pounds, medium build
