## YOUR SUMMER HOME IMPROVEMENT PROJECT CAN PREVENT CRIME, PART 5

The National Institute of Justice (NIJ) shows that Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) [is effective](#) at reducing crime.

CPTED uses landscaping, architecture, and home-design to reduce opportunities to perform and conceal crime and evoke a sense of neighborly cohesion and care.

We're highlighting a principle of CPTED one-at-a-time to inspire you to make your summer home-improvement project also a crime-reduction project.

### **Principle 5: Social cohesion and community culture**

The final principle in this series is all about being neighborly. [Criminological research](#) shows that safe communities are those where neighbors know and appreciate one another and can work together to solve personal and community problems.

As explained by the NIJ, you can probably determine if your neighborhood has a high degree of cohesion already:

*Do people get along with their neighbors? Can they count on each other's help when there is a problem? Do they get together for holiday dinners? Do they babysit each other's children? Do they walk in the local park after dinner? Do they think their children are being taught well in school? Do they feel safe?*

The City of Rockville offers community events often, including one annual celebration directly aimed at crime prevention via neighborhood cohesion: National Night Out!
