It's an Election Year for Rockville: What You Need to Know Now About Voting for a Mayor and Council

The City of Rockville will hold a vote-by-mail election in November this year — with a few important changes, including more members of the city council to elect, two Election Day Vote Centers and several additional ballot dropoff locations.

Voters will have the opportunity to elect seven members of the city's elected body — for mayor and six council members — following a unanimous vote Feb. 6 by the Mayor and Council on a resolution to add two seats to the council.

Ballots will be mailed to all registered voters who live within Rockville city limits. All ballots must be received by 8 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 7. Voters will be able to vote by mail, in person at the two Election Day Vote Centers on Nov. 7, or at an election drop box.

If voting by mail, voters can return their ballots in the provided envelope by prepaid mail or by delivering them to a secure ballot drop box.

Voters can cast their ballots at vote centers on Election Day, Nov. 7, at either City Hall, 111 Maryland Ave., or Thomas Farm Community Center, 700 Fallsgrove Drive. The vote centers will be open from 7 a.m.-8 p.m. on Election Day only.

Voters will be able to drop off their ballots at boxes inside the Rockville Senior Center, 1150 Carnation Drive, Lincoln Park Community Center, 357



Frederick Ave., and Twinbrook Community and Recreation Center, 12920 Twinbrook Parkway. The boxes will be available during center hours.

In addition to a drop box outside City Hall, voters will be able to drop their ballot at a drop box outside Montrose Community Center, 451 Congressional Lane. Both will be available 24/7, beginning in late September or early October

Key 2023 Mayor and Council election dates:

- Monday, May 1: Candidate information election packet will be available.
- On or before Friday, Oct.
 13: Ballots mailed to registered voters.
- Tuesday, Oct. 17: Deadline to register to vote or update voter registration.
- Tuesday, Nov. 7: Election Day. Completed ballots must be received by 8 p.m. in person at City Hall or by mail.

The City of Rockville will host four interactive listening sessions to kick off outreach and engagement for the Town Center Master Plan update, which will help guide the area's success in coming decades.

The most recent master plan for Rockville Town Center was adopted in 2001.

Listening sessions are scheduled for:

- 7-9 p.m. Thursday, April 13, Rockville Memorial Library, second-floor meeting room.
- 7-9 p.m. Wednesday, April 19, Rockville Memorial Library, first-floor meeting
- 10 a.m.-noon, Saturday, April 22. WebEx virtual meeting.
- 7-9 p.m. Tuesday, April 25. WebEx virtual meeting.

The same material will be covered at all listening sessions, so only one needs to be attended.

A 10-minute survey on Town Center is available at engage rockville.com/towncenter. Survey responses will help guide the direction of zoning, streetscapes, public infrastructure and other aspects of land use in Town Center.

A master plan is a longrange document that establishes a vision for future growth and development, and makes recommendations for zoning, streetscapes, public infrastructure and other aspects of land use.

Rockville Town Center comprises about 200 acres of the city, generally bounded by properties along Fleet Street to the south, South and North Washington streets along the west, and the Metro/railroad tracks to the east.

The goal of the master plan is to create a cohesive vision for the Town Center area that meets the city's goals regarding climate action, bicycle and pedestrian safety, and racial equity and social justice.

Rockville Ranked Eighth Most Ethnically Diverse City in U.S.

Rockville has been ranked eighth overall and fourth among small cities in the U.S. for its ethnic diversity, once again placing highly in an annual WalletHub study. More than one-third of Rockville's residents were born outside of the U.S.

Rockville and three other Montgomery County municipalities, Gaithersburg, Germantown and Silver Spring, ranked in the top 10 spots among all cities, of any size, in the entire United States.

"The U.S. today is a melting pot of cultures, thanks to increasing ethnic and racial diversification," WalletHub stated in its release of the study. "If the trend continues, America will be more colorful than ever by 2045, at which point no single ethnic group will constitute the majority in the U.S. for the first time."

Germantown took top billing on the small cities' list of those municipalities with fewer than 100,000 residents. Rockville earned the same high placement among small cities in WalletHub's 2017-2020 studies.

To identify the most ethnically diverse places in America, WalletHub compared more than 500 of the largest U.S. cities across three key metrics.

Go Green and Save Green With Permit Fee Waivers for Earth Month

Rockville to Waive Fees for Select Home Improvement Permits During April

The City of Rockville is marking Earth Month in April by waiving permit fees for certain environmentally friendly home improvements.

The city will waive all fees assessed by Rockville's Inspection Services Division that are directly associated with the residential installation of solar photovoltaic sys-

tems, electric vehicle charging stations and energy-efficient heating and cooling upgrades, such as heat pumps.

Applications must be submitted by Sunday, April 30 at www.mygovernmentonline. org and must be accepted by city staff by 5 p.m. Monday, May 1.



Rockville's Mayor and Council begin wrapping up budget deliberations this month with their final scheduled public hearing and work sessions before the scheduled adoption of the Fiscal Year 2024 budget.

The budget, which covers the fiscal year that begins July 1, is scheduled for adoption on Monday, May 8.

The proposed FY 2024 operating budget of \$156.4 million is a 5.1% increase over the FY 2023 adopted budget. The general fund budget, which supports the largest portion of the operating budget, is \$100.7 million, an 8% increase.



Mayor and Council Work to Protect Renters from

In a move to protect renters, the Mayor and Council adopted 5.8% as the Voluntary Rent Guideline for 2023.

Excessive Rent Hikes

The voluntary rent guideline became effective in March. The guideline encourages landlords to hold rent increases to the lowest level possible. The resolution asks landlords to increase rent by no more than 5.8%, or less, if possible.

The voluntary rent guidelines system provides a baseline amount for rent increases that is based on the Bureau of Labor Consumer Price Index for rent of primary residences in the metropolitan region around Washington, D.C.

Baltimore Road Corridor Improvements Near Completion

Construction along Baltimore Road is in its final phase, with the city's contractor eyeing a spring completion for the project.

Over the winter, crews installed the final storm drains, new curb and gutter, and several sidewalk and shared-use path links between Rockville High School and Broadwood Drive.

In late winter, crews made intersection improvements at Avery and Baltimore roads and installed curb, gutter, sidewalk and driveway aprons between Edmonston and Gladstone drives.

Final roadway paving from Edmonston Drive northeast to the city limit near White Gate Road is scheduled to be completed this spring.

City Seeks Input on Sidewalk Feasibility Studies

The city is holding walking meetings this month offering the opportunity for public input as Rockville considers the feasibility of six proposed sidewalk projects.

Rockville staff and the city's design consultant will conduct "walk the block" public meetings about four proposed projects to fill in gaps in the city's sidewalk network along:

- Frederick Avenue, from Westmore to North Stonestreet avenues.
- Highland Avenue, from Grandin to South Stonestreet avenues.
- Reading Terrace, from Grandin to South Stonestreet avenues.
- Wood Lane, from North Adams to North Washington streets.

Each meeting will discuss the proposed sidewalk's alignment and its associated impacts and will collect public comments for further consideration by the project team. The design consultant will evaluate the sidewalk links, considering costs and impacts of possible alignments.

The city will also accept public comments in April on two additional proposed sidewalks. One would be along Monroe Street, from the path from New Mark Esplanade, continuing into Dogwood Park. The other would be along Nelson Street, from the Woodley Gardens Shopping Center to 100 Nelson St. The city will conduct an online review only of these proposed projects, which do not directly impact residential or commercial properties.

As an alternative to attending the meetings, residents are invited to review the plans, at www.rockvillemd.gov/visionzeroprojects, and submit comments by Sunday, April 30 to Andrew Luetkemeier, the city's project manager, at aluetkemeier@rockvillemd.gov.

April is Flood Awareness Month

Anywhere it can rain, it can flood. With the rainy spring season ahead, it's important to know the risk and be prepared to reduce the impact of potential flooding.

Here are some tips you can follow to be prepared:

- Reduce your risk. Prepare now to protect your family, home and belongings from flooding. The Federal **Emergency Management** Agency offers several publications to help you manage flooding risks. Find a few at mailchi.mp/ rockvillemd/storm-flooddamage-survey-summer. Find more resources at www.fema.gov/floodmaps/know-your-risk/ homeowners.
- Insure your property. Flood damage isn't covered by standard homeowners insurance policies, and is expensive. An inch of floodwater can cause more than \$25,000

- in damage. Talk to your insurance agent about flood insurance or visit floodsmart.gov.
- Report storm flood damage. Rockville residents or property owners who have experienced flood damage associated with severe weather can help us understand the impact of intense storms on our community. Take the Storm Flood Damage Survey and find additional resources at www. rockvillemd.gov/flooding.
- Take advantage of the Flood Mitigation Assistance Program. Rockville offers matching reimbursement funds to residents and property owners who make flood protection improvements to their properties. See the article below.

Funds Available for Flood Protection

The City of Rockville's Flood Mitigation
Assistance Program offers matching reimbursement funds to residents and property owners who make flood protection improvements to their properties.

The matching reimbursement funds will provide up to 50% of the total costs of approved mitigation measures, up to \$5,000. Funds will be distributed on a first-come, first-served basis.

Examples of eligible practices include flood-proofing windows, flood-gates, "sandless sandbags,"

battery-powered sump pumps, modifying topography, elevating utilities, flood alert systems and flood-resistant building materials.

Residential and commercial properties, including homeowner associations and condominium associations, can apply. Renters can only apply with documentation of approval from the property owner.

A Year on, Climate Plan Makes Progress

More than a year on from Rockville's adoption of its first Climate Action Plan, many of the plan's 42 initiatives have made progress, with several action items completed.

The Mayor and Council initiated the plan in January 2022 with the goals of equitably reducing greenhouse gas emissions that cause climate change, and improving

community and city resilience to extreme weather. At their March 27 meeting, the Mayor and Council heard an update on progress made during the plan's first year.

Rockville launched its first food scraps compost drop-off facilities at the city's maintenance facility and now at the Rockville Senior Center. (See the article on page 5.)

A pilot flood mitigation assistance program reimbursed 19 households for floodproofing expenses. The city was awarded state and federal funding and technical support to develop a Flood Resiliency Master Plan.

Twelve city fleet vehicles were replaced with electric models. Rockville is also developing an Electric Vehicle Readiness Plan and will partner

again with Montgomery County Energy Connection and Maryland Solar United Neighbors to promote a solar and electric vehicle charger co-op.



Fast Rake: Spring Leaf Collection Sweeps Through City This Month

The city will vacuum leaves from neighborhood curbs from April 3-14 in five collection areas throughout Rockville.

An interactive map at www.rockvillemd. gov/leafcollection allows residents to input their address and learn when their leaves will be collected. Unlike the fall leaf collection, which has two collection rounds, city crews make only one pass to collect leaves in spring.

Rake leaves next to, but out of, roadways, gutters and bike lanes, and away from parked vehicles. Leaves should be raked by 6 a.m. on the first day of their collection period, but no earlier than one week before the collection dates to avoid grass damage or fire hazards. Remove sticks and other objects from leaf piles. Avoid parking near leaf piles or other vehicles.

After the collection period ends, use biodegradable paper lawn bags or 32-gallon trash cans (without plastic garbage bags) to set leaves out on your trash and recycling collection day. Use alternative disposal methods such as mulching or composting. Do not dump leaves, grass clippings or other yard waste into storm drains, along stream banks or directly into streams, where they can cause blockages that contribute to localized flooding or release nutrients that lead to

City Opens Second Food Scraps Compost Drop-Off at Senior Center

The City of Rockville now offers residents two free food scrap drop-off sites to make composting easy, keep valuable materials out of landfills and reduce excessive greenhouse gas emissions:

- Rockville Senior Center at 1150 Carnation Drive.
- Maintenance Complex at 14625 Rothgeb Drive. Food scraps will be picked up weekly by a commercial contractor and delivered to the Prince George's County Organic Compost

How To Use the Drop-Off

- I. Place food scraps in a container (empty coffee containers with sealing lids are great for this). Be sure to remove any plastic or other trash.
- 2. Bring full containers and empty them into the designated green bins at one of the Food Scraps Compost Drop-Offs. Follow the signs when you arrive. The sites are accessible 24/7 and the service is free of charge.
- 3. Rinse container and repeat.



access, so there is no need to get out of

Illicit drugs, liquids, needles, sharps or syringes cannot be accepted, only pills or patches. All returned medications will be destroyed by the DEA.

National Prescription Drug Take Back Day aims to provide a convenient and responsible means of disposal, keeping prescription drugs from potentially polluting our drinking water, while educating the public about the potential for abuse or theft of these medications.

During the most recent national collection in October, 4,340 law enforcement agencies collected 647,163 pounds — 324 tons — of unwanted prescription drugs. All-time, the programs has collected 8,318 tons over 23 national collec-

pollution and climate change mean wildlife is struggling.

Rockville property owners can help wildlife, take action to counter climate

change and earn National Wildlife Federation certification by creating wildlife-friendly landscapes that incorporate habitat elements in their yards or grounds.

Certified wildlife habitats must provide food, water, cover and places for wildlife to raise young. The program encourages sustainable gardening practices like using native plants, reducing pesticide and fertilizer use, removing non-native invasive plants, and composting.

Certified habitats help create corridors for wildlife to thrive, increase biodiversity and build climate resilient landscapes throughout the community.



She started in her newly created role on March 13 in an office at the police station on West Montgomery Avenue. We asked her a few questions to get to know her better and learn more about her new role.

Beth Loftus is the Rockville

City Police Department's

new mental health specialist.

You have an important job as part of the city's - and police department's new mental health initiative. Tell us more about it.

As RCPD's first mental health specialist, I am assigned to the Special Operations Division. My role is to serve as a resource when police officers encounter people in the community with mental health issues. That includes assisting officers in identifying how to best serve individuals and families, and connect them with resources provided by the Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services.

Where were you before coming to work for the City of Rockville?

For the past 10 years, I have been a clinical therapist at the Montgomery County Crisis Center on Piccard Drive. I functioned in a variety of capacities and assisted individuals and families with, among other things, homelessness, domestic violence, Montgomery County Public Schools school referrals and mental health evaluations.

I was a member of the Montgomery County Mobile Crisis Team, which provides a mental health professional 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to partner with police, when necessary, in responding to psychiatric emergencies. The team provides crisis evaluation and recommends treatment and resources.

Beth Loftus, mental health specialist.

I also serve as a crisis intervention instructor for the Montgomery County Crisis Intervention Training program, educating law enforcement about mental health issues. (Editor's note: Beth was named the Montgomery County Crisis Intervention *Instructor of the Year in* 2019.)

What did you study to be able to do what you do?

I have a bachelor's degree in psychology, with a minor in sociology, from Catholic University and earned a master's in clinical counseling and a post-master's certificate in play therapy from John Hopkins University. In the past 10-plus years, my focus has been in training around crisis intervention, suicide prevention and de-escalation. I continue to educate myself to stay current with best practices and updated research.

Anything else we should know?

I am a Montgomery County native and am invested in providing mental health services and resources to the Rockville community. I am excited about this new opportunity to partner with RCPD and increase access to much needed mental health resources. I look forward to being a part of this new initiative and watching it grow. **†**
