# RCPD's Community Policing Shows Results as Crime Rates Decline

The Rockville City Police Department's commitment to community policing resulted in reduced crime rates for 2023, RCPD Chief Victor V. Brito told the Mayor and Council in presenting a crime report with data that contrasts with that of other municipalities across the country.

While criminality has risen locally, regionally and nationally since 2020, "Virtually all of our data and all of our crime has been down in the last year," Brito said in giving an overview of the report to the Mayor and Council on Feb. 26. "And that's not through happenstance or reverse osmosis. That's through the hard work and selfless dedication of the men and women of the Rockville City Police Department."

Each year, the department prepares a crime report under the FBI's National Incident-Based Reporting System.

Overall, between 2022 and 2023, crimes against people, which include homicides, assaults and sex offenses, decreased 10.6%, from 501 offenses in 2022 to 448 offenses in 2023.

Crimes against property, including burglaries, robberies, thefts and vandalism, increased by 1.7% (from 1,831 to 1,862). While the number of carjackings is rising locally, regionally and nationally, Rockville saw a 68% decrease, from eight in 2022 to

three in 2023.

Crimes against society, including drugs, prostitution and weapons offenses, decreased 28.7%, from 129 to 92, including a 39.8% decrease in drug/narcotic violations.

RCPD responded to almost 70% of the 25,139 calls for service in the city in 2023, alongside the Montgomery County Police Department's First District Station and the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office.

Recent changes could impact these numbers. The Montgomery County Department of Police's recent decision to redeploy personnel assigned to the county's First District to other areas of Montgomery County has led to an increase in the number service calls handled by RCPD officers. RCPD responded to 88% of the calls within the city limits in January 2024, versus 71% of calls during the same period in January 2018, a pre-pandemic period used for comparison.

# **Revitalizing Recreation: The Benefits of Rockville's Pool Renovation Project**

One of summer's most popular features — the outside recreation pool at the Rockville Swim and Fitness Center — will be transformed into a state-of-the-art swimming experience in time for 2025's pool season.

The project will involve a complete renovation and reconfiguration of the outdoor recreation pool areas, including improvements to accessibility, and modernized amenities and infrastructure that will provide exciting new recreational features and pools for swimmers of all ages and abilities.

Bid submissions from potential contractors are due Wednesday, April 10. Construction is expected to begin in mid-August and last through May 2025. Interested bidders can get more information at www. rockvillemd.gov/bids.aspx.

To accommodate the construction, the outdoor recreation pool will close early for the summer 2024 season, around Friday, Aug. 16. Other areas of the complex, in-

cluding the outdoor fitness pool, indoor pools and fitness room are planned to remain open throughout the construction.

## Chesnutt to Retire After Decade as Head of Rockville Rec and Parks

After more than a decade at the helm of Rockville's Department of Recreation and Parks



as director, Tim Chesnutt has announced he will retire Wednesday, May 15.

During his service, Chesnutt oversaw the first dedicated pickleball-only courts in Montgomery County at Mattie J.T. Stepanek Park, as well as a new concrete skate park at the Rockville Swim and Fitness Center, the splash pad at Maryvale Park, locker room improvements at the Rockville Swim and Fitness Center, and Americans with Disability Act improvements at the Rockville Senior Center, F. Scott Fitzgerald Theatre and Glenview Mansion.

Also among those numerous achievements, Chesnutt presided over plans to reenvision the future of a former 130-acre golf course into the RedGate Park and Arboretum Master Plan.

Chesnutt's contribution to RedGate planning "will transform the former golf course into a significant recreation amenity for the city and surrounding area," acting City Manager Craig Simoneau noted in an email announcing Chesnutt's retirement.

# Climate Action Plan Makes Progress in Second Year

Rockville is making progress on many of the 42 initiatives in the city's first Climate Action Plan, with several action items completed and other efforts well underway.

The Mayor and Council adopted the plan in January 2022 with the goal of equitably reducing greenhouse gas emissions that cause climate change and improving community resilience to extreme weather. City staff will provide a progress report during the Mayor and Council meeting on Monday, April 29. Achievements in the 2023 report include:

- More than \$1 million in grants and rebates awarded to the city to support light-emitting diode (LED) streetlight conversions, facility energy upgrades, solar canopies, flood resiliency master planning and a tree planting project at RedGate Park.
- Twelve more vehicles in the city fleet converted to electric or hybrid models.
- The opening of the city's second food waste compost drop-off sta-

tion, doubling collection capacity. The drop-off stations, at the Rockville Senior Center at 1150 Carnation Drive and the city's maintenance facility at 14635 Rothgeb Drive, collected 97 tons of food scraps for composting.

- Launching the Stormwater
   Incentive Program, which included partnering with the
   Chesapeake Bay Trust to expand the RainScapes Rebates
   program and launch a competitive grants program for outreach
   and restoration projects.
- Reimbursing \$99,148 through the Flood Mitigation Assistance Program to residents who made flood protection improvements to their properties.

# **12501 Ardennes Ave.: New Residential Project Planned**

A new residential project is under review at a site that has been used exclusively for offices in the past.

Located at 12501 Ardennes Ave., near the city's southeast boundary in the Twinbrook neighborhood, the redevelopment envisions converting the existing office building into a 181-unit residential multifamily building. The submitted site plan includes construction of three additional stories to provide the proposed units and will utilize an existing underground parking garage below the building for residents' use.

The site plan application will be considered by the Planning Commission at a future meeting.



# **2200 Tower Oaks Blvd.: New Residential Project Planned**

The Mayor and Council has preliminary approved a new residential development at 2200 Tower Oaks Blvd., just south of its intersection with Wootton Parkway.

The adopted project plan envisions a townhome community of 82 units, which will include both front and rear-loaded unit types and a central open-space plaza.

The project will now move forward for review of a site plan application, which will be considered by the Planning Commission at a future date.

# **New Attached Accessory Dwelling Unit Law to Go Into Effect in April**

Legislation allowing the conditional use of attached accessory units in the City of Rockville will go into effect Tuesday, April 9, following passage of a zoning text amendment by the Mayor and Council in October.


Attached accessory dwelling units, or attached ADUs, are secondary dwellings either inside, or attached to, single-family homes. Examples of these include an apartment in a basement or over an attached garage. However, an ADU in a small structure on a foundation in the backyard is not currently permitted and will be subject of future legislation to be considered by the Mayor and Council.

A property owner who wants to construct an attached ADU must meet requirements for owner occupancy, square footage, parking and other conditions.

When the new regulations become law in April, those who wish to either build an attached ADU under the new zoning rules or bring an existing unpermitted attached ADU into compliance can begin the application process. Attached ADUs were previously only permitted as special exceptions.

# **Public Hearing and Survey Provide Final Opportunities for Budget Input**

Rockville's Mayor and Council continue budget deliberations this month with their final scheduled public hearing and work sessions before the scheduled adoption of the Fiscal Year 2025 budget.

A final public hearing and a work session are scheduled for the Monday, April 8 Mayor and Council meeting.

Public participation in the budget process is a high priority for the Mayor and Council and city staff. A community budget priorities survey at www.rockvillemd. gov/budget in simplified Chinese, French, Korean and Spanish, as well as English, allows community members to identify their budget priorities and options for maintaining a balanced budget. Survey responses provide valuable input to the Mayor and Council for their budget discussions. Friday, April 12 is the last day to provide input via the survey and budget public record.

The Mayor and Council are scheduled to hold a final work session on Monday, April 15. The budget, which covers the fiscal year that begins July 1, is scheduled for adoption on Monday, May 6.

The proposed FY25 operating budget of \$168.9 million is a 7.4% increase over the FY 2024 adopted budget. The general fund budget, which supports the largest portion of the operating budget, is \$109.7 million, a 7.9% increase.

The city's current real property tax rate of \$0.292 per \$100 of assessed valuation will remain the same for FY25. All residential and commercial property owners pay this tax. Rockville has not increased its property tax rate since

# **Rockville Receives Federal Grant to Advance Twinbrook Bridge Planning**

A federal grant announced in March will help Rockville with feasibility planning and design for a proposed bridge to connect Twinbrook with Rockville Pike.

Rockville was awarded \$568,000 through the U.S. Department of Transportation's Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhoods Grant Program. The grant will be used to evaluate and design a pedestrian and bicycle crossing over the Metrorail and CSX railroad tracks to connect Twinbrook to retail and employment areas along Rockville Pike, including the Twinbrook Quarter development, which is under construction. Residents along Rockville Pike would be connected to parks, trails and the Twinbrook Community Recreation Center.

"Planning for a Twinbrook pedestrian and bicycle bridge is a first step in addressing historical barriers and disparities," Mayor Monique Ashton said in a statement thanking the city's congressional delegation of Sens. Benjamin L. Cardin and Chris Van Hollen and U.S. Rep. Jamie Raskin for their support of the project. "The vision for the Twinbrook bridge goes beyond the structural plan. It has the opportunity to help reconnect our communities to services and economic opportunity, as well as improve pedestrian and bike

safety."

Included in the city's Comprehensive Plan and Vision Zero Action Plan, the bridge would improve east-west mobility and pedestrian and bicycle safety. It is also in line with the city's ongoing efforts to address equity.

The grant will help the city evaluate feasibility of four potential crossings, identify a preferred alternative for the project, prepare a cost-benefit analysis, support public engagement, develop a 30% engineering design, and create strategies to prevent displacement and benefit the entire community.

While the grant is a big step forward, much remains to be done before the bridge becomes a reality. As a condition of the grant, the city must match 20% of the funding, kicking in an additional \$113,600 for feasibility planning. The city's Capital Improvements Program appropriated \$387,250 for the project in Fiscal Year 2024, which ends June 30. That covers completion of an initial feasibility study of two crossing locations and development of a final scope and estimated timeline for the project.

# **Be a Respectful Neighbor and Follow Rockville's Property Rules**

The City of Rockville is reminding property owners to be good neighbors and avoid exterior property violations that could affect health and safety and result in a citation:

- · Remove trash or debris.
- Trim weed or plant growth of more than 10 inches tall.
- Remove junk vehicles that are inoperable, abandoned or dismantled.
- · No overcrowded or prohibited dwellings.
- Prune trees, bushes, hedges, shrubs and vines so they're not a hazard or detriment to the neighborhood.
- Maintain all exterior wood and metal surfaces in good condition.
- Park motor vehicles properly in off-street parking or on the street.
- Only one unlicensed motor vehicle can be parked on a residential zone property.

# Working on a Historic Property? You Could Qualify for a Tax Credit

Restoring or repairing the outside of a historic home? Preserving the exterior of a historic structure? You could be eligible for a property tax credit.

Rockville participates in the tax credit program for local structures designated as historic. If your property in Rockville is designated by the city as historic and you spent at least \$1,000 on exterior maintenance between Jan. I and Dec. 31, 2023, you may be eligible for reduction of your property taxes for the coming year, up to 25% of the approved expenses.

Eligible projects include:

- Exterior painting.
- · Uncovering and repairing original siding.
- Repairing roofs or replacing them in-kind.
- Repointing brick or stone foundations, or chimneys.
- Repairing windows, architectural trim or ornament.
- Repairing and maintaining outbuildings, such as barns and garages.
- Restoring a documented feature, such as a dormer or porch that was altered or removed.

The city is accepting applications for work completed in calendar year 2023.

# Drug Take Back Day: Drive Up, Drop Off Unwanted Medication

The Rockville City Police Department offers safe, free and anonymous disposal of unwanted prescription drugs during National Drug Take Back Day, Sunday, April 28.

In cooperation with the Drug Enforcement Administration, city police will accept leftover — including expired — prescription drugs from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. in the Rockville City Police Station parking lot at 2 W. Montgomery Ave. To make it quick and convenient, officers will be outside with easy drive-up and drop-off access, so there is no need to get out of your vehicle.

Illicit drugs, liquids, needles, sharps or syringes cannot be accepted, only pills or patches. All returned medications will be destroyed by the DEA.

National Prescription
Drug Take Back Day aims to
provide a convenient and responsible means of disposal,
keeping prescription drugs
from potentially polluting
our drinking water, while
educating the public about
the potential for abuse or
theft of these medications.

During the most recent national collection in October, 4,383 law enforcement agencies collected 599,897 pounds — 300 tons — of unwanted prescription drugs, including 10,599 pounds in Maryland. Alltime, the program has collected 8,950 tons over 25 national collection dates, including 243,154 pounds (121.5 tons) in Maryland.

# **Be Flood Aware for April**

April is Flood Awareness Month. Anywhere it can rain, it can flood. With the arrival of the rainy spring season, follow these tips to know the risk and be prepared to reduce the impact of potential flooding:

- Insure your property.
  Flood damage isn't covered by standard homeowners' insurance policies and is expensive. An inch of floodwater can cause more than \$25,000 in damage.
  Talk to your insurance agent about flood insurance or visit floodsmart.
- Reduce Your Risk. Take steps before a flood to protect your family and home by having an emergency plan, installing a water alarm and storing important documents in a watertight box. Find more resources at www.floodsmart.gov/first-prepare-flooding.
- Take Advantage of the Flood Mitigation

Assistance Program. Rockville offers up to \$5,000 in matching reimbursement funds to residents and property owners who make flood protection improvements to their properties. Find program guidelines, eligibility requirements and apply at www.rockville md.gov/floodassistance.

• Report storm flood damage. Rockville residents or property owners who have experienced flood damage associated with severe weather can help us understand the impact of intense storms on our community. A virtual meeting from 6:30-7:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 9 will present findings from a Complete Streets feasibility study for Mannakee Street that was funded by the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments' Transportation Land-Use Connections Program. The Complete Streets approach can reduce speeding vehicles by identifying potential improvements for motorists, pedestrians, bicyclists and transit users.

The city's ongoing effort to develop new guidelines for pedestrian crosswalks and other pedestrian improvements— another COG-funded project, through the Regional Roadway Safety Program— will be the focus of a virtual meeting from 6:30-7:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 16

Other public meetings later this spring, at dates and times to be determined, will include a discussion of the Beall Avenue Complete Streets and asphalt art project and walk-and-roll-the-block meetings for each segment in the second group of sidewalk feasibility studies. Unlike the fall leaf collection, which has two collection rounds, city crews make only one pass to collect leaves in spring. An interactive map at www.rockvillemd.gov/leafcollection allows residents to input their address and learn when their leaves will be collected.

Rake leaves next to, but out of, roadways, gutters and bike lanes, and away from parked vehicles. Leaves should be raked by 6 a.m. on the first day of their collection period.

After the collection period ends, use biodegradable paper lawn bags or 32-gallon trash cans (without plastic garbage bags) to set leaves out on your refuse and recycling collection day. Use alternative disposal methods such as mulching or composting. Do not dump leaves, grass clippings or other yard waste into storm drains, along stream banks or directly into streams, where they can cause blockages that contribute to localized flooding or release nutrients that lead to fish kills

# **City Now Issuing Citations Related to Wootton Parkway Speed Camera**

Rockville is now issuing citations for speeding vehicles captured by a speed camera on Wootton Parkway.

In a continuing effort to reduce the number of speeding vehicles in Rockville neighborhoods, the Rockville City Police Department deployed the speed monitoring system in late February in the 2500 block of Wootton Parkway, near its intersection with Fairwood Court. The system uses a portable camera to monitor southbound traffic. Though the monitoring system was fully functional, the city did not issue citations for the first month the camera was deployed.

The city began issuing citations Tuesday, March 26 for vehicles exceeding the posted speed limit of 25 mph by 12 mph or more.





### **Mayor and Council Work to Protect Renters from Excessive Rent Hikes**

In a move to protect renters, the Mayor and Council adopted 2.6% as the Voluntary Rent Guideline for 2024.

The voluntary rent guideline became effective in March. The guideline encourages landlords to hold rent increases to the lowest level possible. The resolution asks landlords to increase rent by no more than 2.6%, or less, if possible.

The voluntary rent guidelines system provides a baseline amount for rent increases based on the Bureau of Labor Consumer Price Index for rent of primary residences in the metropolitan region around Washington, D.C.


