City of Rockville 2024 Year in Review

JANUARY

The City of Rockville moved forward with citywide projects focused on making all forms of mobility safer for all users as part of the city's Vision Zero initiative. Adopted in 2020 by the Mayor and Council, the plan seeks to eliminate traffic-related deaths and serious injuries and was discussed with the Mayor and Council in a report by the city's Vision Zero coordinator.

The first phase of a project to rewrite and update Rockville's zoning ordinance was completed, resulting in a zoning diagnostic report that served as a roadmap for the next phase, known as "Calibrate."

The Compliance Engine continued to improve fire safety in Rockville, achieving a 30% reduction in unwanted fire alarm and sprinkler activations citywide. The service allows oversight by Rockville's fire marshal and Inspection Services Division of fire alarm, sprinkler, smoke control and commercial cooking extinguisher systems installed within commercial and multifamily dwellings in the City of Rockville.

More than 100 people volunteered and 147 individuals and organizations that donated delivered a brighter Thanksgiving and Christmas for those in need in Rockville through the 2023 Holiday Drive. Thirty-one organizations and individuals were recognized with certificates and plaques based on their level of donations.

Rockville volunteers carried on the legacy of Martin Luther King Jr. A week of activities coinciding with the city's 52nd annual celebration of King's life saw 175volunteers participate in several service projects. Volunteers partnered with Project Linus to make 150 blankets for sick children, donated about 80 backpacks filled with items for children entering the foster care system for distribution by Comfort Cases, created 50 survival kits for unsheltered veterans and pulled invasive plants from a city park. The search continued for a new city manager following Rob

DiSpirito's resignation in August 2023. A survey gathered community feedback about the traits, qualities and characteristics they wished to see in a city manager, and the priorities the new city manager should address.

FEBRUARY

In an ongoing effort to reduce the number of speeding vehicles in Rockville neighborhoods, the Rockville City Police Department deployed a new speed monitoring system in the 2500 block of Wootton Parkway, near its intersection with Fairwood Court.

The RCPD's commitment to community policing resulted in reduced crime rates for 2023, Chief Victor V. Brito told the Mayor and Council while presenting a crime report with data that contrasts with that of other municipalities across the country. While criminality has risen locally, regionally and nationally since 2020, "Virtually all of our data and all of our crime has been down in the last year," Brito said. "And that's not through happenstance or reverse osmosis. That's through the hard work and selfless dedication of the men and women of the Rockville City Police Department."

MARCH

Rockville turned out the lights to observe Earth Hour, an international effort in support of climate change action.

Community members learned about ongoing transportation safety improvement projects across Rockville when the city hosted public meetings. The projects are part of the city's Vision Zero Action Plan to eliminate traffic-related deaths and serious injuries.

A federal grant announced this month will help Rockville with feasibility planning and design for a proposed bridge to connect Twinbrook with Rockville Pike. Rockville was awarded \$568,000 through the U.S. Department of Transportation's Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhoods Grant Program.

Rockville Holiday Drive Continues into Gift-Giving Season



Help the City With Its Drinking Water Service Line Inventory

Rockville recently sent notices to nearly 8,300 city water customers requesting their help in determining and reporting the material used in their drinking water service lines.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's recent Lead and Copper Rule Revisions require water service providers to inventory all lines in their distribution system on both public and private property. The city has not identified any lead service lines in Rockville's system. However, the notices inform customers that their service line is of an unknown material. They provide instructions for customers to use to identify their service line material, complete a survey to report the material and request free water testing for the presence of lead. Customers who complete the survey by Sunday, Dec. 15 will receive a \$30 credit on their water/sewer bill.

A service line inventory map at www.rockvillemd. gov/LCRR allows users to review information the city has on file regarding the material used in service lines on public and private property. The webpage also includes how-to videos for identifying and reporting service line material and a link to the survey for reporting the material.

Customers not served by the city will receive updates and notifications from WSSC Water, which serves about 30% of the City of Rockville. Find more information from WSSC Water at wsscwater. com/lead.

The speed limit is now 35 mph, down from 40 mph, between Edmonston Drive and Twinbrook Parkway. The change made the speed limit consistent with that of other sections of the road, which is also known as MD 586.

Rockville's Mayor and Council, city leadership, and leadership from Rockville Economic Development, Inc., attended Government Alliance on Race and Equity training at VisArts in Rockville Town Square. The GARE training introduced roles, responsibilities and opportunities for government to advance racial equity.

In a move to protect renters, the Mayor and Council adopted 2.6% as the Voluntary Rent Guideline for 2024.

APRIL

Earth Day was celebrated with stream cleanups, non-native plant removal workdays and plogging (committing to cleaning up litter during walks, jogging or running through Rockville).

The Rockville Civic Ballet celebrated its 50th anniversary, receiving a certificate of recognition from the Mayor and Council. The certificate was presented to Rockville Civic Ballet directors Eleanor Simpson and Erin Kwong, who grew up in the ballet company under the leadership of founder and artistic director Claudia Mangan.

Using a survey, the city solicited the community's input on how best to integrate artistic elements into a broader roadway improvement project for Beall Avenue to improve traffic and pedestrian safety in the area. (See how it turned out on page 1.) The project aims to improve safety and make the street more attractive for residents, visitors and businesses.

Rockville is making progress on many of the 42 initiatives in the city's first Climate Action Plan, with several action items completed and other efforts well underway, a progress report made to the Mayor and Council stated. Rockville adopted the plan in January 2022 with the goal of equitably reducing greenhouse gas emissions that cause climate change and improving community resilience to extreme weather.

The City of Rockville received more than \$3.9 million

in federal earmark funding for a new emergency operations center, police radios, water main and sewer line rehabilitation, and storm drain improvements in the Potomac Woods neighborhood.

Earmarks allow members of Congress to request a portion of federal spending to be directed to specific projects or programs.

State aid for improvements to David Scull Park and legislation supporting the city's affordable housing, climate action and Vision Zero efforts were among wins for Rockville during the Maryland General Assembly session.

The Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments' Transportation Land-Use Connections Program awarded Rockville \$80,000 for a Complete Streets feasibility study of Congressional Lane. The Complete Streets approach can reduce speeding vehicles by identifying potential improvements to help people drive, walk, roll, bike and use transit more safely. The study will examine the full length of Congressional Lane, from Rollins Avenue to Rockville Pike (MD 355), assessing roadway conditions and evaluating the impact of potential improvements on multiple modes of transportation.

Pepco officials joined members of Rockville's Mayor and Council and city staff, mid-April, for a ribboncutting of two electric vehicle chargers on Vinson Street, adjacent to City Hall.

MAY

After more than a decade at the helm of Rockville's Department of Recreation and Parks as director, Tim Chesnutt retired. During his service, Chesnutt oversaw the first dedicated pickleball-only courts in Montgomery County at Mattie J.T. Stepanek Park, as well as a new concrete skate park at the Rockville Swim and Fitness Center, the splash pad at Maryvale Park, locker room improvements at the Rockville Swim and Fitness Center, and Americans with Disability Act improvements at the Rockville Senior Center, F. Scott Fitzgerald Theatre and Glenview Mansion.

The two-day Hometown Holidays Music Fest, featuring local flavor, two stages of entertainment by local acts, the Taste of Rockville and activities for kids, returned to RedGate Park with headliners, alt-rockers Everclear.

The annual Equipment Show at Mattie J. T. Stepanek Park let attendees see what it was like to sit in the cabs of some of the big trucks used by Rockville's Department of Public Works.

The Mayor and Council emerged from discussions with guiding principles that informed the development and adoption of the city's Fiscal Year 2025 budget. They include three focus areas: public safety, economic development and housing; and two guiding principles: effective and efficient service delivery and stewardship of the environment and infrastructure.

The Mayor and Council and the city's Environment Commission honored Terry Pinkston, Jyoti Bisbey and Westmore Commercial Condominium Association, Inc., with Environmental Excellence Awards recognizing their contributions to Rockville's environmental health and sustainability.

A monthlong national celebration of the benefits of protecting historic buildings and structures concluded with the Rockville Historic District Commission's seminar, "ABCs of Historic Preservation." The hybrid event, which gave members of the community an overview of historic preservation practices in Rockville, is available on Rockville 11's YouTube channel, www. youtube.com/cityofrockville. Search for "ABCs."

JUNE

Jeff Mihelich, who has more than three decades of experience in city management, became Rockville's new city manager. The Mayor and Council unanimously voted to appoint Mihelich, who started this July.

A new web-based platform that automates public records requests enhanced Rockville's ability to respond to the public efficiently and effectively. The public has a legal right to access records the city creates in the transaction of public business, unless the record is protected by law. Visit www.rockville md.gov/mpia for more information.

The city launched a new community enhancement code enforcement webpage that provides comprehensive information on maintaining property standards,

REDI and Mayor and Council Discuss Focus Areas for Economic Growth

Members of Rockville Economic Development, Inc.'s board and staff joined the Mayor and Council on Oct. 21 for a work session to discuss the focus of REDI's economic development efforts.

Those areas for Fiscal Year 2025, which began July 1, are: life science/biotech, small-scale manufacturing, small business and clean technology.

The city's life science/biotech sector comprises over 120 firms and is part of a region that ranks No. 3 in the United States for life science. As the public-private partnership charged with helping businesses launch, locate and expand in Rockville, REDI's efforts include creating a branded identity, sense of community and networking opportunities for Rockville's biotech/life science industry; adding to the tax base and jobs market; filling vacant real estate space; spurring investment in redevelopment; and supporting the development and growth of entrepreneurs and small businesses.

REDI also provides technical support to the city's approximately 300 small-scale manufacturing businesses and is creating opportunities for those businesses to interact with each other.

Efforts to support small business and entrepreneurship include fostering a strong entre-

preneurial ecosystem through technical assistance and programs such as the Maryland Women's Business Center, incentive programs and the Explore Rockville website, which is part of a campaign to market the city as a place to visit, live or locate a business.

In addition, REDI is researching and developing a strategy to support job and business growth in the clean technology sector.

The Mayor and Council received an overview from the board of the life science branding project, the Rock East District Boost Report and REDI's annual report for Fiscal Year 2024, which ended June 30. The information outlines REDI's efforts to grow Rockville's economy through incentive grants, engagement, analysis, business counseling and training. It further details REDI's life science branding project to address global messaging challenges and attract businesses, and a study of Rockville's competitive advantage in providing light industrial real estate options to meet small-scale manufacturing business needs.

Rockville Scores Top Marks Again for Commitment to LGBTQ+ Community

Rockville has scored 100 marks for the city's commitment to the health, welfare, safety and equality of its lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer community in its seventh year of participation in, and the 13th year for, the Human Rights Campaign's Municipal Equality Index.

Rockville scored 99 out of 100, plus an additional four bonus points, for its nondiscrimination laws, law enforcement, employment and workplace inclusivity, leadership and services to the LGBTQ+ community. Final scores cannot exceed 100.

"[T]he strength of our communities lies in their ability to embrace and support all residents, regardless of who they are or whom they love," stated Kelley Robinson, president of the Human Rights Campaign Foundation.

The 13th annual MEI scorecard, released in November, analyzes and rates 506 municipalities

across the country, measuring each for the inclusivity of laws, policies and services for their LGBTQ communities. The MEI is the only nationwide assessment of municipal laws, policies and services that are inclusive of LGBTQ+ people.

Cities rated include the 50 state capitals, the 200 largest cities in the U.S., the five largest cities or municipalities in each state, cities home to the state's two largest public universities, 75 cities and municipalities that have high proportions of same-sex couples, and 98 cities selected by HRC and Equality Federation state groups' members and supporters.

Cities are rated across numerous criteria, covering citywide nondiscrimination protections, policies for municipal employees, city services, law enforcement and the city's leadership on LGBTQ+ equality.

Hearing and Survey Offer Opportunities for Community to Be Heard on the Budget

The Mayor and Council held a budget public hearing on Oct. 28 where community members offered ideas for the city's Fiscal Year 2026 operating budget and Capital Improvements Program.

The proposed FY26 budget will be posted to the city's website on Friday, March 7, with budget work sessions and additional public hearings to follow in the spring.

Public participation in the budget process is a high priority for the Mayor and Council and city staff. The community budget priorities survey is available in English, Spanish and Simplified Chinese at www.rockvillemd. gov/budget. Survey responses provide valuable input to the Mayor and Council for their

budget discussions. The Mayor and Council would like to see all parts of the city represented in survey responses.

The Oct. 28 staff report to the Mayor and Council includes an interim report of the survey results as of Oct. 15, as well as a summary of public testimony and exhibits for proposed project submissions from community groups and individuals. The Mayor and Council are scheduled to adopt the budget on Monday, May 5. FY26 begins Tuesday, July 1.

Don't Be Salty, Save Our Streams

The city's first painted plow takes to the roads this winter with a reminder to reduce salt use to help protect the environment. Keep an eye out for the colorful plow and follow these tips to be safe and salt-smart:

Shovel early and often. Deicers work best for melting thin layers of snow or ice. So, shovel first, break up any ice patches you can and then add the deicer.

Use less salt. Sprinkle deicer sparingly and evenly and leave space between the grains. More is not better. A 12-ounce mug of salt is enough to treat a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. Consider organic, salt-free and pet-safe deicers.

Sweep and reuse. After a weather event, sweep and collect any sand, salt or undissolved deicer. Any excess can be reused for the next storm. Letting it run off into waterways is harmful to drinking water and wildlife.

Don't Let a Clog Become an Unwanted Holiday Guest

When the holiday feast is finished, don't pour fats, oils and grease, i.e., FOG, down the drain.

FOG, including sauces, gravy and salad dressings, can trap solids, form hard deposits and clog pipes, causing basement backups, sewer overflows and costly damage to city infrastructure and private property.

Before washing dishes, scrape food and grease into a trash can, use a paper towel to wipe away oil, or pour FOG into an empty can, let it cool to solidify and dispose of it.

Rockville Charges Ahead with New EV Stations

Electric vehicles drivers have more options for charging up across Rockville with the unveiling of four new Level 2 chargers at Mattie J.T. Stepanek Park in October.

The installation at the park at 1800 Piccard Drive in King Farm adds to the city's network of charging stations. In April, Pepco officials joined city officials to cut a ribbon on two publicly available charging stations on Vinson Street adjacent City Hall. And the city's partnership with Pepco means a new DC fast charger will soon be operational at Thomas Farm Community Center, 700 Fallsgrove Drive, where two Level 2 chargers and one DC fast charger already exist.

Post-Christmas 'Tree-tment': An At-Home Way to Recycle Holiday Trees

Rockville collects Christmas trees as part of its recycling collection.


Place trees at the curb for pickup on regular recycling and trash collection days after removing all ornaments and metals, wires, stands and decorations, including tinsel. Trees should not be bagged. There is no deadline for curbside collection of trees.

While the Montgomery County Recycling Center, which formerly converted the trees into mulch, no longer offers this service, the county recommends recycling branches and needles

at home by using them as ground cover under trees and shrubs or by chopping them up and adding them to a compost pile.

Artificial trees cannot be recycled and should be placed in the gray trash cart for regular weekly collection. Artificial trees that are too large to fit in the cart can be collected by appointment as one of six bulk collections allowed per year or taken to the transfer station.

Leaf Vacuuming Makes Final Sweep This Month

The city is scheduled to conclude its fall leaf collection on Friday, Dec. 20, with crews completing the second of two rounds of vacuuming leaves from neighborhood curbs.

An interactive map at www.rockvillemd.gov/leaf collection allows residents to input their address and learn when their leaves will be collected.

Rake leaves next to, but out of, roadways, gutters and bike lanes, and away from parked vehicles. Leaves should be raked by 6 a.m. on the first day of their collection period, but no earlier than one week before the collection dates to avoid grass damage or fire hazards. Remove sticks and other objects from leaf piles. Avoid parking near leaf piles or other vehicles.

After the collection period ends, use biodegradable paper lawn bags or 32-gallon trash cans (without plastic garbage bags) to set leaves out on your recycling and trash collection day, or consider composting. Other environmentally friendly alternatives to raking include leaving some leaves where they fall or using them as mulch in garden beds, where they provide natural habitat for beneficial insects. Mowing over leaves can break them into tiny pieces that filter into the grass, providing much-needed nutrients. *

Info to Know When It's Snow Time: Rockville's Winter Weather Resources

When winter weather strikes, turn to the city's website at www.rockvillemd.gov.

Closure and snow emergency information will be available on the website, as well as through Facebook (www.facebook.com/cityofrockville) and X, formerly Twitter (@rockville411), and by signing up for Alert Rockville notifications at www.rockvillemd.gov/alerts.

City crews treat and plow roads in priority order. First are primary roads, including major arterial roads, emergency routes, central business districts and primary residential roads near schools. Next are secondary roads, including the remainder of neighborhood streets, alleyways and cul-de-sacs. To check if an address is within the city limits, find the Address and Residency Check map at www.rockville md.gov/maps.

Removing snow from

sidewalks, driveways and entrances is the responsibility of the property and/or business owner or a community association. Rockville requires that snow and ice be removed from sidewalks, steps, driveways, parking spaces and similar paved areas for public use within 24 hours after a snowfall of up to 3 inches, within 48 hours after a snowfall of 3-10 inches, and within 72 hours after a snowfall of more than 10 inches. If residents can do so, they should clear snow from around fire hydrants and storm drains. To report a sidewalk that has not been cleared within the required timeframe, call 240-314-8330.

Matching Grant Program Seeks Projects to Improve Communities

Deadline for Applications is Jan. 17

The Friday, Jan. 17 deadline is approaching for Rockville's matching grant program, which helps neighbors work together to accomplish common goals that support the health, vitality and inclusivity of the place they call home.

Neighborhood, civic or homeowners associations, community groups, organized groups of neighbors and student groups are eligible to apply. Neighbors and organizations willing to match funding through cash, in-kind donations and volunteer hours are also eligible.

Applications are reviewed and grants awarded by the City Manager's Office. Grants typically range from \$500-\$1,000, must benefit a clearly identified area within city limits and may address any or all of the following objectives:

- Building community: Projects that promote the development or sustainability of a neighborhood association or community group. Activities that foster diversity, equity and inclusion.
- Community improve-

ment projects: Projects that improve shared space within a neighborhood or strengthen community identity. This may include landscape improvements and maintenance, natural features management, benches, painting or certain exterior improvements. Bonus points will be awarded if two or more groups work together on a project.

• Livability initiatives: Projects that provide educational and outreach opportunities that strengthen social connections between neighbors or neighborhoods. This may include improving safety, addressing a neighborhood challenge or conflict, serving low-income seniors, or finding ways to welcome newcomers to Rockville.

West and Plummer to Lead Rockville Police Department

Acting Maj. Jason West has been appointed acting chief and Maj. Troy Plummer acting deputy chief of the Rockville City Police Department, following the resignation of Chief Victor V. Brito, City Manager Jeff Mihelich has announced.

The appointments took effect Friday, Nov. 22, the day Brito stepped down following six years of service to the community.

West is a 25-year law enforcement veteran. He began his career with the Frederick County Sheriff's Office where he served until his retirement at the rank of lieutenant in 2017. He joined the RCPD in June 2017.

Plummer has more than 30 years of law enforcement experience, including 28 years with the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office, where he retired at the rank of lieutenant in February 2022. He joined the RCPD in March 2022.

As the city is committed to ensuring the public's safety, recruitment for a new police chief will begin in the near future.

F. Scott Theater to Close for Upgrades to Accessibility, Sound

The F. Scott Fitzgerald Theatre and its social hall will close for nine months in late December for renovations that will improve accessibility and sound. The venue will close Tuesday, Dec. 17 and reopen Sept. 1, 2025.

The primary focus of the renovations is to improve safety and compliance with Americans with Disabilities Act standards.

Changes will be made to the lobby, theater house and dressing rooms. The box office and restrooms will be expanded and wheelchair accessible.

New speakers will be installed in the theater house, upgrading the sound experience and making assisted listening devices more effective. The ADA-seating section will be expanded and modified for easier and safer access.

The box office, which will move to the Rockville Civic Center Cottage during renovations, will sell tickets for some resident company performances that will be held at alternate venues. Hours will be 2-6 p.m. Wednesday-Friday and two Saturdays per month, 10 a.m.-2 p.m.

number of speeding vehicles in Rockville neighborhoods, the RCPD deployed a speedmonitoring system in late August near the intersection of southbound Wootton Parkway and Wootton Oats Court.

The city's safety and risk, public works, and recreation and parks teams took part in a ceremony to recognize Safe + Sound Week, a nationwide event held each August that recognizes the successes of workplace health and safety programs and offers information and ideas on how to keep America's workers safe. During the ceremony, the city recognized Rockville employees for their contributions to promoting safety in city operations. Awardees were Alexander Morales, a maintenance worker with the Department of Recreation and Parks; Jason Burdette, a crew supervisor; and William Moore, Jr., a maintenance worker with the Department of Public Works.

Rockville celebrated
National Night Out. RCPD
officers, city elected officials
and city staff joined neighbors at gatherings across the
city. In its 41st year, National
Night Out is a nationwide
effort to raise awareness
about crime and drug prevention, generate support for
anti-crime programs, and
strengthen community spirit
and community policing
partnerships.

SEPTEMBER

In their ongoing effort to bring awareness to the national impact of opioid addiction and signal hope for recovery, Rockville's Mayor and Council proclaimed September as National Recovery Month. Rockville Goes Purple is a campaign, alongside the city's county and state partners, that seeks to shine a spotlight on the national impact of opioid addiction and create awareness about the epidemic's impact on our community.

Following a pandemicdriven hiatus, Rockville's biennial survey returned. The community survey — which provides an opportunity for residents to rate their satisfaction with the quality of life in the city, the community's amenities and local government services — last took place in 2018. Previous survey solicitations were conducted every two years.

The 28th annual F. Scott Fitzgerald Literary Festival honored author and two-time National Book Award winner Jesmyn Ward with the F. Scott Fitzgerald Award for Outstanding Achievement in American Literature.

As part of the city's Vision Zero Action plan to eliminate traffic-related deaths and serious injuries, the city launched a new tool for helping pedestrians cross city streets safely, with new guidelines for evaluating requests for crosswalk installation and related pedestrian safety improvements. The new Marked Crossing Guidelines help city staff determine when a marked crosswalk can be considered at an intersection or midblock. By Maryland law, pedestrians may cross the street midblock only when using a marked crosswalk. Intersections are considered legal crosswalks whether marked or unmarked. The city's new guidelines better account for the area immediately surrounding a crosswalk and update the thresholds for considering whether a marked crosswalk should be installed.

The city's Department of Finance earned the Government Finance Officers Association's Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for Rockville's FY 2025 Adopted Budget. This was the 34th time the city has received the award. It included special recognition in three categories: Budget Process, Capital Program and Financial Policies.

The Rockville Planning Commission approved a draft of the Town Center Master Plan to forward to the Mayor and Council for their final approval. This advancement marked a major milestone in the process and moved the plan along to its final phase.

A new sign of peace and hope was unveiled in Mattie J.T. Stepanek Park's Peace Garden with the Mayor and Council, and guests, cutting the ribbon on a labyrinth that encourages park visitors to walk its path, meditate and reflect.

OCTOBER

Rockville's Mayor and Council were out and about on a walking tour of the Lincoln Park neighborhood. The tour focused on observing the look and feel of homes in this historic neighborhood in relation to design guidelines proposed for the community.

The Rockville Antique and Classic Car Show, a city tradition for more than six decades, once again rolled into Rockville Civic Center Park.

Two public workshops were held so community members could learn more about the ongoing update to the city's zoning ordinance. The comprehensive rewrite of the city's zoning ordinance — Chapter 25 of the city code — aims to enhance the code's usability and accessibility, as well as modernize land-use laws to meet the changing living, working and recreation trends of Rockville's

residents in the 21st century. Visit engagerockville.com/zoning rewrite for more information about the project.

Two rating agencies reaffirmed the city's triple-A bond rating and expressed confidence in Rockville's financial outlook. Triple-A is the highest possible rating and saves Rockville taxpayers money by allowing the city to borrow at the lowest possible interest rates. In awarding the rating, the agencies showed confidence in Rockville's ability to meet its financial obligations, cited the city's conservative fiscal management, strong policies and practices, ample reserve levels, and stable tax base.

NOVEMBER

Rockville's Procurement Division hosted "Rockville Means Business," an informational session to offer vendors the opportunity to learn more about doing business with city government.

City Manager Jeff Mihelich accepted the resignation of Rockville City Police Chief Victor V. Brito. Brito submitted his resignation after six years of committed service to the Rockville community. His last day was Friday, Nov. 22.

BACK IN THE DAY ... The December 1974 "City of Rockville Newsletter" heralded completion of a "New Baltimore Road Pedestrian Way." This "crushed stone pathway paralleling the South side of Baltimore Road between Gladstone Drive and Rockville High School" offered safer pedestrian access to keep students from walking in the roadway during inclement weather. Fast-forward nearly a half-century and the July/August 2023 "Rockville Reports" detailed completion of a long-planned project with pedestrian safety improvements that include an 8-foot-wide shared-use path along Baltimore

Road from the Carl Henn Millennium Trail at First Street to the Rock Creek Trail near the school.
