Local Love on Display in City's Community Survey

Ninety percent of Rockville residents feel the city's quality of life is good or excellent, and that their neighborhoods and the city are a great place to live and raise children. The city also scored highly for how it treats its diverse residents. Nine in 10 residents commended the overall quality of services and the same amount said they would recommend living in Rockville.

These are just some of the community's thoughts revealed by the City of Rockville 2024 Resident Survey, which was presented to the Mayor and Council at their Jan. 13 meeting. The scores help identify areas where the city can improve service to its residents and also plan for the future. Normally conducted every two years, this is the first survey since 2018, due to the pandemic. The survey will now return to its biennial schedule.

According to survey results, Rockville's highest-rated characteristics were the overall quality of the natural environment, parks and recreation opportunities, the city's image or reputation, utility infrastructure, a feeling of safety, overall health and wellness, transportation system, and overall opportunities for education.

Other top-rated services, considered excellent or good by more than 85% of respondents,

included playgrounds, services for youth, fire prevention and education, Rockville-provided water and sewer services, athletic fields, and trash collection services.


Virtually all respondents feel very or somewhat safe in their neighborhood and commercial areas in Rockville during the day. Compared to 2018's survey, feelings of safety in 2024 were higher for paths and trails, parks and playgrounds, and in neighborhoods.

About eight in 10 respondents rated the overall quality and variety of business and service establishments in Rockville as excellent or good, and the same amount said the city is an excellent or good place to work.

All dimensions regarding public trust received at least 60% favorable ratings, with the top-rated aspects being treating residents with respect (81%), treating residents fairly (78%) and the responsiveness of city

The survey was sent to 3,000 randomly selected households within the city. In total, 476 completed surveys were returned. The survey has a 5% margin of error.



Black History in Multimedia This Month in Rockville

Rockville celebrates Black History Month in February with a spotlight on Black history in our community and our city government.

Rockville Renews Lead Service Line Inventory Effort

Rockville is continuing its efforts to identify the materials used in customers' drinking water service lines.

In November, a survey was mailed to nearly 8,300 customers with unknown service line materials, requesting their assistance in identifying and reporting the material of their service lines.

A second survey will go out in early spring with the goal of reducing the number of unknown service line materials. This information is crucial for complying with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Lead and Copper Regulations, which requires water utilities to inventory all service lines. No lead service lines have been identified within the city's

"This is an opportunity for the community to play an active role in shaping one of Rockville's historic treasures," said Tara Stewart, director of the city's Department of Recreation and Parks. "We look forward to hearing from residents and working together to reimagine the King Farm Farmstead as a vibrant, functional space for generations to come."

The farmstead project will draw on more than a decade of input, including task force studies, property assessments and economic analyses. This foundational work will guide discussions as the city collaborates with a consultant to evaluate potential uses for each building on the property.

Public input will guide the Mayor and Council's decision on the property's master plan.

Winter Plumbing Protection: Tips for Preventing Frozen Pipes or Meters

Freezing temperatures can lead to frozen pipes or meters, leaving homes without running water, or burst pipes that cause costly damage to homes and infrastructure.

To prevent frozen pipes:

- When freezing weather is forecast, turn off inside valves that control the water supply to outside hose attachments (known as bibs). Open the outside hose bibs to allow any water in the line to drain out. Keep the valve open. Remove and drain garden hoses and drain in-ground irrigation systems.
- Eliminate sources of cold air near pipes. Close off crawl spaces, seal drafty windows and doors, and insulate walls and attics.
- Use insulation, pipe sleeves or newspaper to wrap pipes that are ex-

- posed to cold air.
- During extended absences, set the thermostat to at least 55 degrees, or shut off the main water valve.
- In severe cold, keep water moving through pipes. Turn on the faucet farthest from your main valve to a very small, steady trickle.

If pipes freeze:

- Shut off the water immediately at the main shutoff valve.
- Warm air around the pipes using a hair dryer. Do not use a kerosene heater, blow torch or open flame.
- Once pipes are thawed, slowly turn water back on. Check all joints for leaks and other areas for cracks that may have resulted from the freeze.

Mayor and Council to Receive Proposed Budget in March

Community Priorities Survey Offers Opportunity for Neighborhood Representation

City Manager Jeff Mihelich is scheduled to present Rockville's proposed Fiscal Year 2026 operating budget and Capital Improvements Program on Monday, March 17, followed by Mayor and Council public hearings and work sessions in March and April.

The proposed budget will be available beginning Friday, March 7 at www.rockvillemd. gov/budget.

Public participation in the budget process is a high priority for the Mayor and Council and city staff. That includes having all parts of the city represented in responses to a survey about community priorities for the city's budget.

The survey can be found at www.rockvillemd.gov/budget. It is available in English, Spanish and Simplified Chinese and takes 5-10 minutes to complete. Responses provide valuable input to the Mayor and Council for their budget discussions.

Budget work sessions and public hearings are scheduled for Mondays, March 17 and 24. A work session and the close of the public record is scheduled for Monday, April 7.

The Mayor and Council are scheduled to adopt the budget on Monday, May 5. FY26 begins Tuesday, July 1.

The \$168.3 million budget

for Fiscal Year 2025, which began July 1, keeps the city's real property tax rate at \$0.292 per \$100 of assessed valuation. All residential and commercial property owners pay this tax. Rockville has not increased its property tax rate since 1995.

Go Green When Battling the Freeze

A Mug-Full Will Suffice When You Deice

Follow these tips to keep your sidewalks and driveway snow- and ice-free, while minimizing the environmental impact:

Shovel Early, Shovel Often

Deicers work best for melting thin layers of snow or ice. Shovel first before snow hardens into ice, breaking up any icy patches you can. Then add the salt. Use Salt Sparingly

Scatter deicer, leaving space between the grains. A 12-ounce mug full of salt can treat a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. Using more won't speed up melting and can harm soil and water quality.

Buy Early and Check Labels

Buy before a storm forecast to avoid empty shelves at the store. Check the label: While slightly more expensive, calcium chloride (CaCl2) requires less salt, works at lower temperatures and does not contain cyanide, unlike sodium chloride (NaCl, also known as rock salt). Urea is sometimes promoted as lawn-friendly fertilizer. However, the application rate for urea is far greater than the amount your lawn needs and can wind up polluting streams as runoff.

Avoid Kitty Litter and Ashes

While environmentally friendly, kitty litter and ashes are only marginally effective at adding traction and won't melt ice. For traction, a better option is to mix in a small amount of sand and use less salt.

Sweep and Reuse

After a weather event, sweep and collect any sand, salt or undissolved deicer. Any excess can be reused for the next storm. Letting it run off into waterways is harmful to drinking water and wildlife. **Learn More**

Leave Out the Gas Blowers When Blowing Leaves

A ban on the use of gas-powered leaf blowers and vacuums takes effect Tuesday, July 1 and applies in the City of Rockville.

The ban seeks to address the environmental, noise and health concerns related to gas-powered leaf blowers and leaf vacuums. It aims to reduce harmful air emissions and continued reliance on fossil fuels, and to lessen health impacts that contribute to hearing loss, cardiovascular and respiratory disease, and other

health issues.

A ban on the sale of gaspowered blowers and vacuums took effect last July.

To help residents and businesses comply with the law, a limited number of rebates for purchasing electric leaf blowers will be available. Residents are eligible for one \$100 rebate. Applications for the rebates will open July 1.

Twinbrook Community **Recreation Center Annex Mural**

Residents can preview the design and share their thoughts during a community engagement session from 7-8:30 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 5 in the center's multipurpose room at 12920 Twinbrook Parkway.

Peoples will present her vision for the mural, followed by a community discussion.

College Gardens Park Mural

Artist Andy Dahl will create a mural for the exterior of the College Gardens Park

picnic shelter.

The city invites residents to learn about Dahl's design during a presentation from Dahl about the project and an interactive feedback session, from 7-8:30 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 19, in the Azalea Room of the Rockville Senior Center, 1150 Carnation Drive.

Lincoln Park Public Art Project

The legacy of the Lincoln Park piece, "Memory Walk," will be reimagined with new public artwork, set to be completed in 2025.

The project will begin with a community engagement session during the Lincoln Park Civic Association meeting at 9 a.m. Saturday, Feb. 8, at the Lincoln Park Community Center, 357 Frederick Ave.

"Memory Walk," originally created by Christine Hoestine in 1995, saw a central component removed in 2024. The new art piece will replace it.

The first engagement activity, the Lincoln Park Postcard Project, will collect residents' stories about why they love Lincoln Park. These stories will inspire the new artwork and be shared with the artist, once selected, to create the piece.

Vision Zero Projects Make Progress Through Winter

Rockville continues planning Vision Zero projects to create safer travel routes for all.

The projects are part of the city's Vision Zero Action Plan to eliminate traffic-related deaths and serious injuries.

Department of Public Works staff met in December with community members to identify a preferred pedestrian safety improvement at the intersection of Mannakee Street and Smallwood Road. There was consensus to build a pedestrian median refuge at the intersection, which will help calm traffic and make it easier for pedestrians to cross Mannakee Street. The improvement will be built as part of the upcoming roadway resurfacing project.

The city completed the Twinbrook Safe Routes to School and Transit Accessibility Study in December. Funded in part by a federal Transportation Alternatives Program grant, it evaluated eight intersections and seven sidewalk gap segments in the Twinbrook neighborhood. The city has already advanced three sidewalks segments — at Brooke Drive, Crawford Drive and Midway Avenue — to the design stage and will make intersection improvements at Ardennes and Ridgway avenues, Ardennes and Wainwright avenues, and Lemay Road and Ridgway Avenue.

A virtual public meeting is scheduled for Thursday, March 27 to discuss the Congressional Lane Complete Streets study. Find details with the March 27 calendar listing at www.rockvillemd.gov/calendar. Comments can be submitted at any time to Bryan Barnett-Woods, the city's Vision Zero coordinator, at bbwoods@rockvillemd.gov.

A virtual public meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, April 30 for staff to share three proposed alternatives to add bicycle facilities along East Jefferson Street between Rollins Avenue and Congressional Lane, and along Halpine Road between East Jefferson Street and Rockville Pike (MD 355). brine that has a lower salt concentration and can be more precisely applied than rock salt. Sometimes beet juice — yes, beet juice! — is mixed with the brine to help it work at lower temperatures. Staff also uses calculated saltapplication rates, ensures that salt spreaders are properly calibrated and plans routes to avoid double-treating roads.

Last year, crews attended a "salt summit," hosted by the city's Environmental Management Division staff that focused on the impacts of salt on waterways. *

Drive Wisely: Tips for Winter Travel

Keep your vehicle well-maintained for the winter driving season: Check to see that the brakes, heating/cooling system, electrical system, engine, exhaust, tires, oil, lights, defrosters and wipers are working properly. Consider installing winter or snow tires with deep treads to help keep traction.

Equip vehicles with an emergency kit: Kits should include blankets, flashlights, extra clothes, a shovel, tow chain, matches, traction aids, flares, jumper cables and nonperishable snacks and water.


While driving in winter weather conditions:

- Always drive with your lights on to help increase visibility.
- Increase your following distance. Stopping distances are three to 12 times longer on winter surfaces.
- Come to a gradual stop. To reduce the risk of skidding, don't slam the brake pedal.
- Brake before curves and turn your steering wheel slowly and smoothly to help maintain control.
- · Always wear your seat belt.

Protect Our Parks, Streams and Neighborhoods: Put Pet Waste in the Trash

Pet waste belongs in the trash, not on the ground. Pet waste contains twice as many bacteria per gram as human waste. In your yard, in our parks, in the dog park – wherever you are, pick up the poop and put it in the trash. Follow these tips to prevent pet waste from contaminating our streams:

- Carry disposable bags and pick up after your pet, even on trails and in the woods.
 If you hire a dog walker to walk your dog, make sure they pick up after your pet when on their walk.
- Properly dispose of pet waste by bagging the waste and depositing it a trash can or pet waste receptacle.
- Do not throw bagged pet waste into storm drains or the woods, and do not leave it on the ground.
- Be sure to pick up pet waste on your own property too. Anything washed away by the rain will end up in our streams.
- Reuse bags that would have ended up in the trash to pick up after your pet. Ask coworkers, neighbors and friends to collect plastic bags used for bread, newspapers, bagels or produce.

Rockville's Generosity Lights Up Holidays for Community's Most in Need

Rockville's community warmth and holiday spirit were on display during the 2024 Holiday Drive, with 158 donors donating \$32,054 in cash to families and people in need throughout November and December.

In-kind, or non-monetary, donations totaled \$20,000.

Four-hundred-and-fifty volunteers donated 1,300 hours of their time. Hundreds of families were helped during the two-month campaign. In November, 629 families and seniors, a total of 2,159 people, were helped with the Holiday Drive's distribution of food. Families and seniors in need were provided with a \$15 grocery store gift card, a box of nonperishable food, a bag of produce and a pie, via an in-person drivethru pickup at Elwood Smith Community Center or home delivery.

In December, 1,135 children from 454 families received toys and books for each child 11 and younger, and a \$25 Target gift card and books for those aged 12-17.

An Escape from Slavery Recognized With New Sign

A new Civil War Trails site honoring Zedekiah Thompson, a formerly enslaved man who self-emancipated and served in the United States Army, has been established at the intersection of North Washington Street and Wood Lane. The site, created in partnership with local historians and Civil War Trails, Inc., is part of Rockville's recognition of Black History Month.

Thompson escaped slavery at 31, enlisting in the 1st United States Colored Troops in June 1863. Wounded during battles near Petersburg, Virginia, he lived out his postwar years in Maine, dying at age 70.

The project was spearheaded by Rutgers University doctoral student Hugh Goffinet, with further research contributions from Peerless Rockville, Montgomery History and Rockville's



Historic Preservation Division. Civil War Trails, Inc., developed and installed the signage as part of its multistate initiative, with support from the Maryland Office of Tourism Development.

Thompson's story joins over 1,500 Civil War Trails sites across six states, including 18 in Montgomery County. These locations allow visitors to engage with history firsthand, using trail maps and guides to explore significant landmarks.

An official ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new site will be set in the future.



EVEN IN WINTER, POOL RENOVATIONS MAKE PROGRESS ... Work continued in January on a comprehensive renovation and reconfiguration of the Rockville Swim and Fitness Center's outdoor recreation pool.

Improvements are being made to accessibility, amenities will be modernized, and infrastructure will provide new recreational features and pools for swimmers of all ages and abilities.

Among tasks completed last month, the shallow section of the activity pool was shaped and piping laid, including connections to the pump room. Retaining walls for the stormwater management area were installed. And, as weather permitted, the contractor prepared for the pouring of concrete for the shallow section of the pool and continued installing plumbing and electrical systems throughout the site.
