

Rockville's MLK Day to Celebrate 'Boldly Imagining Our Future'

Rockville will celebrate the life and legacy of a civil rights leader with the city's 51st annual Martin Luther King Jr. Day celebration on Monday, Jan. 16.

The celebration, which is free and open to all, will be held from 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. in the auditorium of Richard Montgomery High School, 250 Richard Montgomery Drive. The program begins at 10:30 a.m. It is sponsored by the city's **Human Rights Commission** and will feature performances by emcee and spoken word artist Unique Robinson, vocalist Esi Abercrombie, Dem Raider Boyz Step Team, and Soul in Motion African Drum and Dance Group; awards; interactive booths from community organizations; and a continental breakfast, while supplies last.

Sharon Jackson Wilder, the inaugural chief equity and inclusion officer for Montgomery College, will deliver a keynote address based on the celebration's theme of "Boldly Imagining Our Future." The theme invites courage, creativ-

ity and curiosity as our community considers the work before us. It asks us to consider what lessons we can bring from the civil rights movement into the advocacy of today, as millennials and Gen Z have ushered in a new era of disruption and activism for racial, economic, social, gender and disability justice.

The ceremony will include the presentation of two awards. The Martin Luther King Jr. Youth Award will recognize a student at a Rockville high school who has worked to fulfill King's dream in either their school or the community. The F. Michael Taff Award will be presented to an individual, organization or business that has helped to improve the lives of people with disabilities, such as through efforts to improve accessibility or raise public awareness.

City Manager Names Barack Matite New Deputy City Manager

Barack Matite, city manager for the City of Eudora, Kansas, will be Rockville's next deputy city manager, City Manager Rob DiSpirito has announced. Matite will formally assume the role Monday, Jan. 23.

Matite has served as city manager of Eudora since August 2016. He joined Eudora in 2012 and has served in several roles for the city. He was chosen from a strong field of more than 100 applicants nationwide.

Matite has a master's degree in public administration from the University of Kansas, a bachelor's degree in global and international studies from the University of Kansas, and attended the Senior Executive Institute at the University of Virginia, Weldon Cooper Center of Public Service.

"I am excited, honored and humbled to be selected to serve as the next deputy city manager for the City of Rockville," Matite said. "I look forward to becoming a member of the Rockville community and joining the Rockville team that is dedicated and works hard to achieve the Mayor and Council's vision and goals for the community."

Rockville's deputy city manager assists the city manager in directing and working with city departments to achieve departmental and citywide objectives, initiate and oversee strategic plans, and execute Mayor and Council policy initiatives. The



deputy city manager serves as acting city manager in the city manager's absence.

Matite will fill a position vacated by Angela Judge, who resigned this year to join her husband, Warren, when he assumed command of United States Coast Guard Training Center Cape May in Cape May, New Jersey.

"With his experience and accountability as a chief executive officer in a full-service city, Barack will bring all his professional talents and deep familiarity with the broad range of municipal services to this critical position on our team," DiSpirito said. "Barack fully understands what it takes to support the success of a mayor and council, a city organization, and a community of engaged and diverse residents. I look forward to working with Barack and introducing him as we serve the people of Rockville."

Commission Recommends Changes to Voting Age, Size of Mayor and Council, and City Elections

Lowering the voting age to 16, expanding the size of the Mayor and Council, term limits, representative districts and consideration of ranked-choice voting were among recommendations the city's Charter Review Commission presented to the Mayor and Council on Dec. 12.

The Mayor and Council are scheduled to discuss, during their Monday, Jan. 30 meeting, whether to adopt any of the recommendations and amend the city charter. Recommendations included:

Lowering the age to vote in city elections from 18 to 16, regardless of citizenship. The commission unanimously recommended this change and also recommended that the right to vote in city elections be extended to anyone "who has been a resident of the City of Rockville for six months preceding a municipal election, without regard to

citizenship.

Expanding the Mayor and Council from five members to seven, comprising a mayor and six councilmembers.

Limiting the mayor and councilmembers to three consecutive four-year terms. This would not preclude someone from serving as mayor following three consecutive terms as a councilmember, or vice versa.

Creating representative dis-

tricts. The commission deferred to the Mayor and Council on how to achieve this, as well as whether to include at-large seats.

The creation, by the Mayor and Council, of "a precise, open, transparent, and definitive administrative *process for the election of a Councilmember when a vacancy occurs* after the 24th month of a term."

Exploring ranked-choice voting and, if deemed appropriate, implementing the process, which allows voters to rank candidates on a ballot by order of preference. The commission also recom-

Mayor and Council Push County for Answers on Seven Locks Road Restoration Center Plans

The Mayor and Council have expressed concern about a delay and not having received a response from the county regarding on a planned restoration center at a 25.8-acre site along Seven Locks Road that is presently home to the Montgomery County Detention Center.

The Mayor and Council oppose the plans, as currently proposed by the county, to house at the site a future Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation Criminal Justice Complex and restoration center. The site abuts eight city neighborhoods.

The Mayor and Council addressed a letter to the county in December requesting feedback on outstanding requests, including for a virtual forum, following up from an Oct. 6 meeting; a date for the next community meeting and steps to engage the public about the plans; written responses to questions raised by the community and Mayor and Council; and alternative locations that had been considered but set aside for the proposed restoration center.

"We wish to continue the positive dialogue with the County on its plans for the proposed Restoration Center, including alternative locations," the letter states. "Time is of the essence, as the Rockville community is eager for additional information and further opportunity to engage with the County on this critical issue.



FY 2022 Reports Highlight Rockville's Finances Summaries Give Public a Look at the City's Fiscal Health

Two annual reports released last month give the public a closer look at Rockville's financial health during the most recently completed fiscal year.

For Fiscal Year 2022, which closed June 30, the city ended "with an overall net position of \$328.7 million, an increase of 7% over last year," City Manager Rob DiSpirito wrote in the city's Popular Annual Financial Report, a summary document highlighting the city's finances. Net position is a useful indicator of a government's financial health and represents total assets minus total liabilities.


"The change in net position is based on increases in property tax revenue, income tax, and tax duplication revenues, coupled with conservative spending across City departments and programs," DiSpirito wrote.



That left the city with a general fund reserve of \$26.4 million, equal to approximately 31% of the total general fund adopted revenues, which is the main source of funding the city's day-to-day operations.

The city maintains a triple-A bond rating. Triple-A is the highest possible rating and saves Rockville taxpayers money by allowing the city to borrow at the lowest possible interest rates.

The city created the



first PAFR in 2007 to explain, in layman's terms, the information contained in Rockville's recently renamed Annual Comprehensive Financial Report, which was presented to the Mayor and Council on Dec. 12. The ACFR is prepared by the Finance Department in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and audited by certified public accountants.

- The city's financial structure, including governmental funds, such as the general fund and the capital projects fund, and enterprise funds.
- The overall financial health of the city.
- The city's capital investments and debt.

mended that ballots offer a "None of the Above" option.

Exploring scheduling city elections to coincide with the presidential or gubernatorial *elections*. City elections are held every four years, with the next election in November. The commission unanimously voted to recommend against staggering councilmember elections by electing different seats in different years.

Other commission recommendations concerned election outreach, ballot drop boxes, and the terms, appointment and duties of members of the city's Board of Supervisors of Elections.

For Sixth Year, Rockville Nets Full 100 Points for LGBTQ+ Support

Rockville has scored 100 marks for the city's commitment to the health, welfare, safety and equality of its lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer community in its sixth year of participating in, and the 11th year for, the Human Rights Campaign's Municipal Equality Index.

Rockville scored 95 out of 100, plus an additional 10 bonus points, for its nondiscrimination laws, law enforcement, employment and workplace inclusivity, leadership, and services to the LGBTQ+ community. Final scores cannot exceed 100.

"LGBTQ+ people everywhere deserve to live in welcoming places that are focused on building equality for all," said Jodee Winterhof, the Human Rights Campaign's senior vice president of policy and political affairs. "Since its launch 11 years ago, the main priority of the Municipal Equality Index remains supporting and celebrating the work cities do to serve LGBTQ+ people in the places they call home."

The 11th annual MEI scorecard, released in November, analyzes and rates 506 municipalities across the country, measuring each for the inclusivity of laws, policies and services for their LGBTQ communities.

Cities rated include the 50 state capitals, the 200 largest cities in the U.S., the five largest cities or municipalities in each state, cities home to the state's two larg-

est public universities, 75 cities and municipalities that have high proportions of same-sex couples, and 98 cities selected by HRC and Equality Federation state groups' members and supporters.

Ranked cities include more than 92.6 million people.

Cities are rated across numerous criteria, covering citywide nondiscrimination protections, policies for municipal employees, city services, law enforcement and the city's leadership on LGBTQ equality.

Mayor and Council Discuss Budget Priorities, Multilingual Community Surveys Debut

The Mayor and Council continued their work on the city's Fiscal Year 2024 budget in December with a discussion of their priorities and the release of budget priorities surveys in five languages to gather community input.

The discussion focused on staffing, benefits, program offerings, capital project initiatives and priorities for the community, as well as community safety, affordable housing, and the Flood Resiliency Master Plan. Public participation in the budget process is a high priority for the Mayor and Council and city staff. A community budget priorities survey at www.rockville md.gov/budget is now available

in simplified Chinese, French, Korean and Spanish, as well as English. The survey allows community members to identify their budget priorities and options for maintaining a balanced budget. Survey responses provide valuable input to the Mayor and Council for their budget discussions.

The \$148.8 million budget for Fiscal Year 2023, which began July 1, keeps the city's real property tax rate of \$0.292 per \$100 of assessed valuation the same. All residential and commercial property owners pay this tax. Rockville has not increased its property tax rate since 1995.

Recruits Sought for Compensation Commission

Body Determines Compensation for Mayor and Councilmembers

The Mayor and Council are seeking applicants to serve on the Compensation Commission, which determines annual compensation for the five elected officials of the city.

The commission consists of five members, who must be residents or have a place of business in the city.

Members' terms are staggered, with initial appointments for two, four and six years. Terms are six years.

By city ordinance, the Compensation Commission convenes every four years to provide a recommendation to the Mayor and Council by March 31. Any change in compensation would not take effect until after the following election. The next city election is in November.

The Compensation
Commission is required to meet
before Jan. 31 in an election year.
At that meeting, the commission
must discuss its mission of recommending possible changes to the
stipend of the mayor and councilmembers. Before making a recommendation, and to assist with
its deliberations, the commission
seeks input from residents on aspects of compensating the Mayor
and Council.

The Mayor and Council may choose to adopt or reject the commission's recommendation. If they take no action, the recommendation goes into effect within 60 days.



Bank On Rockville to Help Low-Income Residents Better Control Their Finances

Rockville has launched Bank On Rockville, an initiative to connect its low- to moderate-income residents to safe and affordable bank accounts, increase their financial capability, and provide more pathways to economic self-sufficiency.

As part of a national movement, Bank On Rockville will connect residents with nationally certified Bank On accounts that feature low or waived maintenance fees, low minimum opening balance, no inactivity fees and no overdraft fees.

The program also provides referrals to free personal finance workshops, one-to-one financial coaching and credit counseling, and tax preparation services. (Income eligibility restrictions apply for tax preparation.)

Part of the Bank On Rockville program includes information about Family FinCap, a pilot, two-generation, incentivized savings program that combines financial literacy education with workforce development opportunities.

Matched funds will be restricted to workforce development, including higher education, certification and credentialing, and small-business endeavors.

Family FinCap begins Tuesday, Jan. 10 and runs through Tuesday, July 25. Eligibility criteria apply.

Matching Grant Program Seeks Projects to Improve Communities

The city's matching grant program helps neighbors work together to accomplish common goals that support the health, vitality and inclusivity of the place they call home.

Community Empowerment Matching Grant applications are being accepted now. The application deadline is Friday, Jan. 27.

Neighborhood, civic or homeowners associations, community groups, organized groups of neighbors, and student groups are eligible to apply. Neighbors and organizations willing to match funding through cash, in-kind donations and volunteer hours are also eligible.

Applications are reviewed and grants awarded by the City Manager's Office. Grants typically range from \$500-\$1,000, must benefit a clearly identified area within city limits and may address any or all of the following objectives:

- Building community:
 Projects that promote the development or sustainability of a neighborhood association or community group. Activities that foster diversity, equity and inclusion.
- Community improve-

ment projects: Projects that improve the shared space within a neighborhood or strengthen community identity. This may include landscape improvements and maintenance, natural features management, benches, painting, or certain exterior improvements. Bonus points will be awarded if two or more groups work together on a project.

• Livability initiatives:
Projects that provide educational and outreach opportunities that strengthen social connections between neighbors or neighborhoods. This may include improving safety, addressing a neighborhood challenge or conflict, serving low-income seniors, or finding ways to welcome newcomers to Rockville.

A project to make Rockville Town Center safer for pedestrians and bicyclists by calming traffic kicked off Nov. 21 as city staff and the city's contractor discussed construction of the Town Center Road Diets Project.

At a kickoff meeting, city staff and the city's contractor discussed the construction schedule for the project, including a projected completion date of early fall 2023.

Ardent Company will construct the project. It will improve pedestrian and bicyclist safety by narrowing the two travel lanes on North Washington Street and East Middle Lane to one lane in each direction, and by creating protected bike lanes, parking and signage. The project will also widen the sidewalk on the south side of East Middle Lane between North Washington Street and Maryland Avenue.

Ardent Company plans to order construction materials and begin small portions of the construction in January or February, depending on weather conditions and material availability. However, the major work will begin in March 2023.



As part of a Mayor and Council initiative, the project was developed through a consultant's study of how to improve Town Center's vitality. The study followed recommendations by a panel of Urban Land Institute experts who visited the city in July 2019.

The project is also one of several to improve safety for people driving, walking, rolling, bicycling and using transit as part of Vision Zero, the city's strategy to eliminate traffic and pedestrian fatalities, and severe injuries, while increasing safe, healthy and fair mobility for all.

City to Give Away Radon Test Kits for National Radon Action Month

The City of Rockville is giving away 150 radon test kits to city residents for National Radon Action Month.

The test kit involves placing a small measuring device in the basement or the lowest level of your home, raised 3 feet off the ground, in the middle of the room for two to four days. Once the test is completed, follow the directions on the test kit packaging to mail the device to a laboratory for results.

A new radon law goes into effect Sunday, Jan. 1 in Rockville that applies Montgomery County's home energy disclosure and radon testing laws to the sale of single-family homes and townhomes in Rockville.

The change provides home buyers with access to important home health and energy information.

The Mayor and Council adopted the ordinance on July 18 to allow residents and businesses time to comply with the requirement and to coincide with National Radon Action Month in January.

The goal is to protect public health from radon exposure and promote home energy efficiency, an objective of the city's Climate Action Plan.

Radon, which was Rockville's focus for Building Safety Month in May, is an invisible, odorless, tasteless, The only way to know is to test!

Test your home at least every two years. It's easy and inexpensive.

radioactive gas. While no immediate symptoms signal its presence, exposure at high levels can cause cancer. Testing is the only way to know a home's radon levels.

The city's building code requires all new single-family construction to include passive radon mitigation, such as subfloor preparation, installation of a soil-gas retarder, the closure of potential radon entry routes and the instal-

lation of vent pipes, all of which are verified through required city inspections.

Last summer, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development awarded Rockville Housing Enterprises, the city's public housing agency, \$157,870 to support radon testing and mitigation demonstrations. Rockville was one of nine U.S. cities awarded funding.

Snow Info: Be In-the-Know About Winter Weather

Closure and snow emergency information will be available on the website, as well as through Facebook (www.facebook.com/city ofrockville) and Twitter (@ rockville411), and by signing up for Alert Rockville notifications at www.rockvillemd. gov/alerts.

City crews treat and plow city roads in priority order. First are primary roads, including major arterial roads, emergency routes, central business districts and primary residential roads near schools. Next are secondary roads, including the remainder of neighborhood streets, alleyways and cul-de-sacs. To check if an address is within the city limits, find

the Address and Residency Check map and search "Snow Priorities" in the map gallery at www.rockvillemd. gov/maps.

Rockville requires that property and/or business owners remove snow and ice from sidewalks, steps, driveways, parking spaces and similar paved areas for public use within 24 hours after a snowfall of up to 3 inches, within 48 hours after a snowfall of 3-10 inches, and within 72 hours after a snowfall of more than 10 inches. If residents can do so, they should clear snow from around fire hydrants and storm drains. To report a sidewalk that has not been cleared within the required timeframe, call 240-314-8330. 💠

Recycling and Refuse Reminders: Trees, Polystyrene, Needles and Bags

From taking away your Christmas tree to purging your home of plastic bags, the city's recycling and trash collections can help you safely cleanup from the holidays.

Rockville collects Christmas trees as part of its recycling collection. Place trees at the curb for pickup on regular recycling and trash collection days after removing all ornaments and metals, wires, stands and decorations, including tinsel. Trees should not be bagged. There is no deadline for curbside collection of trees. Artificial trees should be placed in the gray trash cart for regular weekly collection. Artificial trees that are too large to fit in the cart can be collected by appointment as one of six bulk collections allowed per year or taken to the transfer station. For bulkwaste disposal information, visit www.rockvillemd.gov/ bulkwaste.

The City of Rockville collects used polystyrene as part of its weekly trash collection and takes it, along with other household refuse, for disposal in the county's

waste-to-energy incinerator. Often mistakenly called "Styrofoam," the material, commonly used to protect package contents during shipping, should not be placed in recycling carts. Instead, place it in the gray trash cart.

When disposing of needles, such as medical sharps and syringes, use containers made of heavy-duty plastic that close tightly with a puncture-proof lid. This prevents our recycling and trash collection crews from getting stuck. Label the container and place it in the middle of your household trash in the gray trash cart - or find a disposal program. Give Green a Go When Removing Snow

Follow these tips to keep your sidewalks and driveway snow- and ice-free, while minimizing the environmental impact: Shovel Early, Shovel Often

Deicers work best for melting thin layers of snow or ice. So, shovel first before snow hardens into ice, break up any ice patches you can and then add the salt. Use Salt Sparingly

Scatter deicer and leave space between the grains. A 12-ounce coffee mug full of salt is enough to treat a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. Using more than recommended won't speed up melting but can harm soil and water quality.

Buy Early and Check Labels

Buy before a storm forecast and avoid empty shelves in the stores. Check the label: Although slightly more expensive, calcium chloride (CaCl2) requires less salt, works at lower temperatures and does not contain cyanide, unlike sodium chloride (NaCl, also known as rock salt). Urea is sometimes promoted as lawnfriendly fertilizer. However, the application rate for urea is far greater than the amount your lawn needs and can wind up polluting streams as runoff.

Avoid Kitty Litter and Ashes

While environmentally friendly, kitty litter and ashes are only marginally effective at adding traction, and don't melt ice. If you need traction, a better option is to mix in a small amount of sand and use less salt.

DNR Grants to Help the City with Stream Restoration and Flood Resiliency Projects

Maryland's Department of Natural Resources recently awarded Rockville grants to cover the costs of stream restoration at Croydon Creek and the Calvin Park tributary to Rock Creek, and address flooding through the city's Flood Resiliency Master Plan.

A \$2 million grant will help offset the cost of a \$5.2 million project to reduce erosion of the stream banks and enhance stream and buffer habitat along Croydon Creek and the Calvin Park tributary.

A \$75,000 grant will offset the cost of the city's Flood Resiliency Master Plan, which is intended to identify current and predicted flood-prone areas and prioritize mitigation projects to reduce flood impacts.

The Mayor and Council voted Dec. 12 to authorize the city manager to sign the agreement for the flood plan grant and are scheduled to vote Monday, Jan. 9 to authorize the agreement for the Croydon Creek and Calvin Park tributary project.

Shared-Use Path Complete as Baltimore **Road Corridor Improvements Continue**

City contractors recently completed construction of a shared-use path near Rockville High School and are turning their attention to sidewalk installation on Baltimore Road and Broadwood Drive as work continues along the corridor between Rockville Town Center and the city's east side.

In late fall, contractors finished installing a pervious shared-use path, curb and gutter on the south side of Baltimore Road between the Rockville High School driveway and Twinbrook Parkway. Crews also installed storm drain between Edmonston Drive and Avery Road and near Broadwood Drive, and completed permanent roadway striping between First Street and Edmonston Drive.

Upcoming work will focus on concrete work as the winter weather allows.

Drive Safely! Tips for Sharing the Roads

Rockville is a great place to get around by all modes of transportation. People may drive to a park, bike to work, or walk or roll to a store. Drivers who are aware of people walking, rolling and bicycling can make traveling safer for everyone. Here are a few tips to keep in mind for safe driving around people bicycling and walking:

- Bicyclists travel faster than you may think. Instead of speeding past them, it's safer to be patient and let them go ahead or to wait until there is space to pass them.
- When passing, move to the left as soon as possible and remember to leave at least 3 feet of space between an automobile and a bicycle.
- Remember that bicyclists are allowed to use the full travel lane. A person could choose to ride closer to the middle of the lane to avoid debris and stormwater drainage grates, the potential for opening car doors, and traffic approaching from the right.
- Make complete stops at stop signs.
- Always try to make eye contact, but keep in mind that people may not be able to make eye contact if it is dark or there is glare on the window. Never assume people see you.
- Always signal when turning. When making a right turn, check the blind spots for people bicycling through the intersection. This can help prevent "right hook" crashes.
- Remember that not everyone can just "walk around." When parking, be sure to not encroach on the sidewalk or curb ramp.
