#### Mayor and Council Pass Resolution Rejecting Anti-Palestinian, Anti-Israeli, Anti-Arab, Antisemitism, Anti-Jewish and Anti-Muslim Hate

The Mayor and Council on Dec. 18 unanimously passed a resolution, "Rejecting Anti-Palestinian, Anti-Israeli, Anti-Arab, Antisemitism, Anti-Jewish, and Anti-Muslim Hate in the City of Rockville."

WHEREAS the Mayor and Council of Rockville, through Resolutions 10-21 (To Endorse and Commit to the Establishment of Government Policies and Practices that Promote Racial and Ethnic Equity and Social Justice), 12-21 (Hate Has No Place Here: Condemning and Denouncing All Hate and Hate-Motivated Violent Actions in the City of Rockville), and 16-23 (Antisemitism Resolution TOCC), strongly affirm an ongoing commitment to combating hate, prejudice, and discrimination in the City of Rockville; and

WHEREAS the Mayor and Council are aware of numerous incidents of anti-Palestinian, anti-Israeli, anti-Arab, Antisemitism, anti-Jewish and anti-Muslim hate in our neighborhoods, places of worship, and schools; and

WHEREAS the Mayor and Council understand that lasting peace comes from dialogue, understanding, and respect for the human rights of all people, and that global conflicts can have far-reaching impacts on the Rockville community; and

WHEREAS the Mayor and Council must stand in solidarity against all forms of anti-Palestinian, anti-Israeli, anti-Arab, Antisemitism, anti-Jewish and anti-Muslim violence in Rockville, and must advocate for peaceful and just resolutions to conflicts; and

WHEREAS the Mayor and Council believe in the importance of cultivating a community in which all residents can live, work, learn, play, and worship free from fear; and

WHEREAS the Mayor and Council commit to countering hate and extremism through engagement with all communities, governmental transparency, community conversations, public information sharing regarding efforts to fight extremism, and the investigation and prosecution of those who commit criminal acts by working through the legal system, consistent with civil liberties protections; and

WHEREAS all ideologies based on hate, violence, and intolerance are rejected and condemned, and the Mayor and Council emphatically denounce hate and extremism;


NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Rockville Mayor and Council condemn all acts of anti-Palestinian, anti-Israeli, anti-Arab, Antisemitism, anti-Jewish, and anti-Muslim hate in Rockville, Maryland.

## **'Finding Fellowship' and Spotlighting Service at Rockville's MLK Celebration**

Join the City of Rockville for something new at this month's Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration.

The 52nd annual celebration, one of Rockville's signature events, will move from the traditional Monday holiday to 9:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 13 at Rockville High School, 2100 Baltimore Road. It will feature a new conference-style format with a film screening and questionand-answer session, a panel discussion, performances and the Salute to Nonprofits.

Hosted by the Mayor and Council and the city's Human Rights Commission, the free event kicks off a week of service and celebration of King's legacy and founding principles. The Salute to Nonprofits will offer an opportunity to learn about organizations serving our community and to sign up to take part in service projects. The celebration will also fea-

ture a screening of the award-winning documentary "Finding Fellowship." The film, about belonging and building community in a divided world, recounts how three racially segregated churches in Gaithersburg's Quince Orchard community merged in the months following King's assassination in 1968.

The Rev. Gerard A. Green Jr., a Quince Orchard native and former district superintendent for the Greater Washington District of the Baltimore Washington Conference of the United Methodist Church who is featured in the film, will participate in a question-and-answer session following the screening.

The day also includes a panel discussion with city and county justice, equity, diversity and inclusion professionals; a drum performance by Soul in Motion; a kid-friendly performance by Groovy Nate; and a kids craft activity. A continental breakfast will be provided, while supplies last.

# **Matching Grant Program Seeks Projects to Improve Communities**

Application Deadline is Jan. 19

The city's matching grant program helps neighbors work together to accomplish common goals that support the health, vitality and inclusivity of the place they call home.

The Community
Empowerment Matching
Grant application deadline is Friday, Jan. 19.
Neighborhood, civic or
homeowners associations,
community groups, organized groups of neighbors
and student groups are eligible to apply.

Neighbors and organizations willing to match funding through cash, inkind donations and volunteer hours are also eligible.

Applications are reviewed and grants awarded by the City Manager's Office. Grants typically range from \$500-\$1,000, must benefit a clearly identified area within city limits and may address any or all of the following objectives:

- Building community: Projects that promote the development or sustainability of a neighborhood association or community group. Activities that foster diversity, equity and inclusion.
- Community improvement projects: Projects that improve shared

space within a neighborhood or strengthen community identity. This may include land-scape improvements and maintenance, natural features management, benches, painting, or certain exterior improvements. Bonus points will be awarded if two or more groups work together on a project.

 Livability initiatives: Projects that provide educational and outreach opportunities that strengthen social connections between neighbors or neighborhoods. This may include improving safety, ad-

dressing a neighborhood challenge or conflict, serving low-income seniors or finding ways to welcome newcomers to Rockville.

#### **Radon Reminders: The Law, The Risks and What You Can Do**

January is National Radon Action Month and a reminder of what you can do to protect your home and family.

Radon is an invisible, odorless, tasteless, radioactive gas. While no immediate symptoms will signal its presence, exposure at high levels can cause cancer. Testing is the only way to know a home's radon levels.

Laws that went into effect in 2023 apply Montgomery County's home energy disclosure and radon testing laws to the sale of single-family homes and townhomes in Rockville and require specific rental properties to be tested for radon. The laws provide residents with access to important home health and energy information. The goal is to protect public health from radon exposure and promote home energy efficiency, an objective of the city's Climate Action Plan.

The City of Rockville is giving away a limited number of radon test kits to city residents. Reservations for a free test kit, a link to discounted \$3 kits and more can be found at www. rockvillemd.gov/radon.

The test involves plac-

ing a small measuring device in the middle of the basement or lowest level of your home, raised 3 feet off the ground for two to four days, then following directions in the kit for mailing the device to a laboratory for results.

The city's building code requires all new single-family construction to include passive radon mitigation, such as subfloor preparation, installation of a soilgas retarder, the closure of potential radon entry routes and the installation of vent pipes, all of which are verified through required city inspections.

## **FY 2023 Financial Reports Highlight Rockville's Finances**

Summaries Give Public a Look at the City's Fiscal Health

Two annual reports released last month give the public a closer look at Rockville's financial health during the most recently completed fiscal year.

For Fiscal Year 2023, which closed June 30, the city ended "with an overall net position of \$345.2 million, an increase of 5 percent over last year," Stacey Webster, the city's chief financial officer, wrote in the city's Popular Annual Financial Report, a summary document highlighting the city's finances. Net position is a useful indicator of a government's financial health and represents total assets minus total liabilities.


"The change in net position is based on increases in property tax revenue, charges for services revenues, and tax duplication revenues, coupled with conservative spending across City departments and programs," Webster wrote.

That left the city with a general fund reserve of \$27.6 million, equal to 29.4% of the FY 2023 general fund adopted revenue. The general fund is the main source of funding for the city's day-to-day operations.

The city maintains a triple-A bond rating. Triple-A is the highest possible rating and saves Rockville taxpayers money by allowing the city to borrow at the lowest possible interest rates.

The city created the first PAFR in 2007 to explain, in layman's terms, the information contained in Rockville's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report, which was presented to the Mayor and Council on Dec. 4. The ACFR is prepared by the Finance Department in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and audited by certified public accountants.

The FY23 PAFR describes:
• The city government and



services.

- Rockville demographics and statistics.
- The city's financial structure, including governmental funds, such as the general fund and the capital projects fund, and enterprise funds.
- The overall financial health of the city.
- The city's capital investments and debt.
- Property taxes and utility rates, including how to read tax and utility bills.

The report also lists city accomplishments and accolades, and spotlights capital investment in the Vision Zero Action Plan. The plan, adopted by the Mayor and Council in 2020, seeks to eliminate traffic-related fatalities and serious injuries, and increase traffic safety for all modes of transportation.

#### Mayor and Council Discuss Budget Priorities, Promote Multilingual Community Surveys

The Mayor and Council continued their work on the city's Fiscal Year 2025 budget in December with the first discussion of their priorities and urge community members to get involved in the process by identifying their own priorities through an online budget survey.

Public participation in the budget process is a high priority for the Mayor and Council and city staff. A community budget priorities survey at www. rockvillemd.gov/budget is now available in simplified Chinese, French, Korean and Spanish, as well as English. The survey allows community members to identify their budget priorities and options for maintaining a balanced budget. Survey responses provide valuable input to the Mayor and Council for their budget discussions.

The \$157.2 million budget for Fiscal Year 2024, which began July 1, keeps the city's real property tax rate at \$0.292 per \$100 of assessed valuation. All residential and commercial property owners pay this tax. Rockville has not increased its property tax rate since 1995.

#### **Recycling Reminders: Christmas Trees** and Polystyrene, Needles and Bags

From taking away your Christmas tree to purging your home of plastic bags, the city's recycling and trash collections can help you safely clean up from the holidays and year-round.

Place Christmas trees at the curb for pickup on regular recycling and trash collection days after removing all ornaments and metals, wires, stands and decorations, including tinsel. Trees should not be bagged. There is no deadline for curbside collection of trees. Or, recycle branches and needles by using them as ground cover under trees and shrubs or chopping them up and adding them to a compost pile. Artificial trees should be placed in the gray trash cart for regular weekly collection. Artificial trees that are too large to fit in the cart can be collected by appointment as one of six bulk collections allowed per year. The City of Rockville collects used polystyrene as part of its weekly trash collection and takes it, along with other refuse, for disposal in the county's waste-to-energy incinerator. Often mistakenly called "Styrofoam," the material, commonly used to protect package contents during shipping, should not be placed in recycling carts. Instead, place it in the gray trash cart.

When disposing of needles, such as medical sharps and syringes, use containers made of heavy-duty plastic that close tightly with a puncture-proof lid. This prevents our recycling and trash collection crews from getting stuck. Label the container and place it in the middle of your household trash in the gray trash cart – or find a disposal program. Learn more at bit.ly/ howtorecyclesharps.

## **Thinking Green is Nice When Removing Snow and Ice**

Follow these tips to keep your sidewalks and driveway snow- and ice-free, while minimizing environmental impact:

#### **Shovel Early, Shovel Often**

Deicers work best for melting thin layers of snow or ice. Shovel first before snow hardens into ice, breaking up any icy patches you can. Then add the salt.

#### **Use Salt Sparingly**

Scatter deicer, leaving space between the grains. A 12-ounce mug full of salt can treat a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. Using more won't speed up melting and can harm soil and water quality.

#### **Buy Early and Check Labels**

Buy before a storm fore-

cast to avoid empty shelves at the store. Check the label: While slightly more expensive, calcium chloride (CaCl2) requires less salt, works at lower temperatures and does not contain cyanide, unlike sodium chloride (NaCl, also known as rock salt). Urea is sometimes promoted as lawnfriendly fertilizer. However, the application rate for urea is far greater than the amount your lawn needs and can wind up polluting streams as runoff.

#### **Avoid Kitty Litter and Ashes**

While environmentally friendly, kitty litter and ashes are only marginally effective at adding traction and won't melt ice. For traction, a better option is to mix in a small amount of sand and use less salt.

#### **Be In-the-Know When It Snows**

When winter weather strikes, turn to the city's website at www.rockville md.gov.

Closure and snow emergency information will be available on the website, as well as through Facebook (www.facebook.com/city ofrockville) and X, formerly Twitter (@rockville411), and by signing up for Alert Rockville notifications at www.rockvillemd.gov/alerts.

City crews treat and plow city roads in priority order. First are primary roads, including major arterial roads, emergency routes, central business districts and primary residential roads near schools. Next are secondary roads, including the remainder of neighborhood streets, alleyways and cul-de-sacs. Check if an address is within the city limits with the Address and Residency Check map and search "Snow Priorities" in the map gallery at www. rockvillemd.gov/maps.

Rockville requires that property and/or business owners remove snow and ice from sidewalks, steps, driveways, parking spaces and similar paved areas for public use within 24 hours after a snowfall of up to 3 inches, within 48 hours after a snowfall of 3-10 inches, and within 72 hours after a snowfall of more than 10 inches. If residents can do so, they should clear snow from around fire hydrants and storm drains. To report a sidewalk that has not been cleared within the required timeframe, call 240-314-8330. 💠


#### **Recycle the Holidays (But Be Careful with Batteries)**

When the post-holiday cleanup begins, remember: Rockville collects and recycles electronics, such as cell phones, computers, televisions and holiday lights through requests for special collections, and collects Christmas trees as part of its recycling and trash collection. (See the article on page 4 for more information about Christmas tree disposal.)

Getting rid of old batteries? Don't dispose of them in your trash or recycling cart, where they could start a fire. Instead, bring batteries of any size to the household hazardous waste drop-off at the county transfer station at 16105 Frederick Road.

#### **Why Bike Lanes? More** 'Complete Streets' and **Benefits for All Road Users**

Recent changes created new traffic patterns in Rockville Town Center and frustration for some road

Construction last year on North Washington Street and East Middle Lane converted two motor vehicle travel lanes on each street into one lane in each direction, added new protected bike lanes using precast concrete curbs and bike boxes along North Washington Street, widened the sidewalk along East Middle Lane, and added new on-street parking spaces. It also left some road users baffled at what all the new lines, curbs and colors mean. (See the article at right to learn how motorists can use the road-

bicyclists, by:

- Reducing crash risk by torists and bicyclists.
- Providing a dedicated

space for people to bicycle at their preferred speed without having to navigate motor vehicle traffic.

- Increasing pedestrians' comfort and safety by widening the buffer between motor vehicle lanes and sidewalks and reducing the number of lanes to cross.
- Reducing opportunities for speeding vehicles.
- Reducing automobilerelated noise and pollution from fuel emissions, brakes and tires.







## **Lock It or Lose It!: Tips for Preventing Thefts from Vehicles**

Thefts from vehicles continue to be an issue in Rockville with the majority of cases due to cars being left unlocked.

In 2023, there were 147 reports of theft from vehicles around the city. Don't become a victim. Follow these tips to deter criminals and protect your property:

- Lock vehicle doors. Check to be sure you've closed the windows.
- Don't leave valuables in your vehicle. If you must leave valuables, make sure they are locked in the trunk. Don't leave them in plain sight.
- Don't leave your garage door opener in plain sight inside of your vehicle. Put it in the glove box, hide it or bring it with you.
- Park in well-lit areas

whenever possible.

- Remember: briefcases, backpacks, gym bags, sunglasses, keys and small change are all tempting to a thief.
- If you see someone in your yard, driveway or lurking near vehicles, especially overnight and in the very early morning hours, do not attempt to confront or detain them. Immediately call 911.
- If your vehicle is broken into, immediately contact city police to make a report at 240-314-8900. Documenting every theft from a vehicle is an important step toward stopping crime.

Do your part to stop thefts from vehicles occurring in our city. *Remember: Lock it or lose it!*
