

Rockville to Celebrate Martin Luther King Jr. With Service and Unity

Rockville will honor Martin Luther King Jr.'s life and legacy as the city holds its 53rd annual Martin Luther King Jr. celebration this month with a unity gathering and service activities at sites across the city.

A free unity gathering will be held from 11 a.m.-1 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 19 at Beall Elementary School, 451 Beall Ave. It will feature a dialogue with community and faith leaders, a light lunch, fellowship and information about how to get involved with the event's nonprofit participants.

King famously said,
"Everyone can be great because everybody can serve." In
1994, Congress passed the King
Holiday and Service Act to designate the federal holiday as a
National Day of Service. By observing Martin Luther King Jr.
Day through service activities,
Rockville begins each year with
a commitment to making our
community a better place.

The city is sponsoring service activities in which the community can participate. (Some of these activities are weather dependent and may be rescheduled.) They are:

- Assembling "Cups of Cheer" for seniors with hot chocolate, tea packets and treats in a mug with a handwritten note.
- Assembling house kits with essential items, such as toiletries, in reusable bags for people in housing transition.
- Creating winter care kits with items like gloves, lip balm, hand sanitizer and a handwritten note for community members in need.
- Weed Warrior invasive plant pulls at city parks.
- A trail cleanup.


Mayor and Council Continue Work on Draft Town Center Master Plan Update

The Rockville Planning Commission approved a draft of the Town Center Master Plan in September to forward to the Mayor and Council for their final approval. The Mayor and Council held a public hearing on the draft plan on Oct. 28, a work session and public hearing on Dec. 9, with an additional work session on Dec. 16.

Tips for Driving Safely in Town Center

The City of Rockville's Traffic and Transportation Division offers the following tips for safe driving on Rockville Town Center's recently redesigned roadways:

- Travel in the designated lane for motor vehicles, not in the bike lane or parking lane.
- Before turning at an intersection or a driveway, check for approaching bicyclists and pedestrians.
- Do not attempt to pass a bus at a bus stop while passengers are boarding or exiting the bus.
- Drive at the posted speed limit.
- Do not park, even temporarily, in the bike lane.
- Look for new on-street parking spaces on North Washington Street, East Middle Lane and Beall Avenue.



Vision Zero Brings Better Bus Boarding to Beall and Bike and Pedestrian Counters Citywide

Rockville is rolling — and walking, biking and driving — into the new year with the completion of a major project in Rockville Town Center and new ways to track trips by bike and by foot.

A new bus boarding platform, installed Nov. 25, is the final piece of the Beall Avenue Complete Streets and Asphalt Art project. The first-of-its-kind project for the city makes Rockville Town Center safer and more attractive for residents, visitors and businesses. It includes traffic-calming features that shorten pedestrian-crossing distances and provides other safety improvements along a new alignment of Beall Avenue between MD 355/Hungerford Drive and North Washington Street. The project created one travel lane in each direction, buffered bicycle lanes and on-street parking and loading spaces, all adorned with new "asphalt art" in the form of a street mural that was dedicated Nov. 10.

The city also recently completed the installation of permanent counters to help measure pedestrian and bicycle use on trails throughout Rockville. Five pedestrian and bicycle counters were installed:

- Along the Carl Henn Millennium Trail, between Gaither Road and Piccard Drive.
- Along the Stoneridge shared-use path near Wootton Parkway.
- At the southern entrance of the Sister City Friendship Bridge over Interstate 270 near MD 28/West Montgomery Avenue.
- Along the Twinbrook Connector Trail near Ardennes Avenue.
- Along the Baltimore Road shared-use path near Gladstone Drive.

A bicycle-only counter was installed on north-bound North Washington Street near Wood Lane. The devices continuously count pedestrians and bicycles.

The projects are part of the city's Vision Zero Action Plan to eliminate traffic-related deaths and serious injuries. An update on the city's Vision Zero progress is scheduled for the Mayor and Council meeting on Monday, Feb. 3

Radon Reminders: The Law, The Risks and What You Can Do

January is National Radon Action Month and a reminder of what you can do to protect your home and family.

Radon is an invisible, odorless, tasteless, radioactive gas. While no immediate symptoms will signal its presence, exposure at high levels can cause cancer. Testing is the only way to know a home's radon levels.

Laws that went into effect in 2023 apply Montgomery County's home energy disclosure and radon testing laws to the sale of singlefamily homes and townhomes in Rockville and require specific rental properties to be tested for radon. The laws provide residents with access to important home health and energy information. The goal is to protect public health from radon exposure and promote home energy efficiency, an objective of the city's Climate Action Plan.

The City of Rockville is giving away a limited number of radon test kits to city residents. Reservations for a free test kit, a link to discounted \$3 kits and more can be found at www. rockvillemd.gov/radon.

The test involves placing a small measuring device in the middle of the basement or lowest level of your home, raised 3 feet off the ground, for two to four days and then following directions in the kit for mailing the device to a laboratory for the results.

The city's building code requires all new single-family construction to include passive radon mitigation, such as subfloor preparation, installation of a soilgas retarder, the closure of potential radon entry routes and the installation of vent pipes, all of which are verified through required city inspections.

Documents produced by the city's Finance Department include the city's operating budget and capital improvements program, an Annual

FY 2024 Financial Reports Highlight Rockville's Finances


Summaries Give Public a Look at the City's Fiscal Health

Two annual reports approved by the Mayor and Council last month give the public a closer look at Rockville's financial health during the most recently completed fiscal year.

For Fiscal Year 2024, which closed June 30, the city ended "with an overall net position of \$360 million, an increase of 4.3% over last year," City Manager Jeff Mihelich wrote in the city's Popular Annual Financial Report, a summary document highlighting the city's finances. Net position is a useful indicator of a government's financial health and represents total assets minus total liabilities.

"The change in net position is based on increases in property tax revenue, charges for services revenues, and tax duplication revenues, coupled with conservative spending across city departments and programs," Mihelich wrote.

The city ended the year with a general fund reserve of \$31.2 million, equal to 30.7% of the FY 2024 general fund adopted revenue. The general fund is the



main source of funding for the city's day-to-day operations.

The city maintains a triple-A bond rating, the highest possible, which saves Rockville taxpayers money by allowing the city to borrow at the lowest possible interest rates.

The city created the first PAFR in 2007 to explain, in layman's terms, the information contained in Rockville's since-renamed Annual Comprehensive Financial Report. The ACFR is prepared by the Finance Department in accordance with generally accepted accounting

Responses provide valuable input to the Mayor and Council for their budget discussions. The proposed Fiscal Year 2026 operating budget and Capital Improvements Program will be posted to the city's website on Friday, March 7. Budget work sessions and public hearings are scheduled for Mondays, March 17 and 24. A work session and the close of the public record is scheduled for Monday, April 14.

The Mayor and Council are scheduled to adopt the budget on Monday, May 5. FY26 begins Tuesday, July 1.

Rockville Readies EV Readiness Plan for January Debut

Rockville's Electric Vehicle Readiness plan is nearly ready for its release.

The draft plan is tentatively scheduled to be released Friday, Jan. 10.

Community members will be able to read the plan, provide comments and get all their questions answered about EVs and EV charging at engagerockville.com/evplan.

The plan will help identify how the city can work with county, state and federal programs toward rapid adoption of electric vehicles, identifying where EV chargers are needed and recommending actions to support equitable charging access amid a growing demand. That includes identifying policy and permitting needs that communicate the benefits and incentives available, installing grant-funded public chargers, and converting fleet vehicles. 
Recycle the Holidays (But Be Careful with Batteries)

As the post-holiday cleanup begins, remember:

- Rockville collects and recycles electronics, such as cell phones, computers, televisions and holiday lights, through requests for special collections, and collects Christmas trees as part of its recycling and trash collection.
- Don't dispose of batteries in your trash or recycling cart, where they could start a fire. Instead, bring batteries of any size to the household hazardous waste drop-off at the county transfer station at 16105 Frederick Road.

Recycling Reminders: Christmas Trees and Polystyrene, Needles and Bags

From taking away your Christmas tree to purging your home of plastic bags, the city's recycling and trash collections can help you safely cleanup from the holidays and year-round.

Place Christmas trees at the curb for pickup on regular recycling and trash collection days after removing all ornaments and metals, wires, stands and decorations, including tinsel. Trees should not be bagged. There is no deadline for curbside collection of trees. As an alternative, recycle branches and needles by using them as ground cover under trees and shrubs or chopping them up and adding them to a compost pile. Artificial trees should be placed in the gray trash cart for regular weekly collection. Artificial trees that are too large to fit in the cart can be collected by appointment as one of six bulk collections allowed per year. For bulk-waste disposal information, visit www. rockvillemd.gov/bulkwaste.

The City of Rockville collects used polystyrene as part of its weekly trash collection and takes it, along with other household refuse, for disposal in the county's waste-to-energy incinerator. Often mistakenly called "Styrofoam," the material, commonly used to protect package contents during shipping, should not be placed in recycling carts. Instead, place it in the gray trash cart.

When disposing of needles, such as medical sharps and syringes, use containers made of heavy-duty plastic that close tightly with a puncture-proof lid. This prevents our recycling and trash collection crews from getting stuck. Label the container and place it in the middle of your household trash in the gray trash cart – or find a disposal program. Be Salt-Wise in Winter

Salt on our streets helps keeps us safe in the winter, but too much salt can pose a risk to fish and other wildlife, and humans. Follow these tips to be safe and salt-smart at home:

- 1. Shovel early and often.
 Deicers work best for
 melting thin layers of
 snow or ice. Shovel first,
 break up any ice patches
 and then add deicer.
- 2. Use less salt. Sprinkle deicer sparingly and evenly, leaving space between the grains. More is not better. A 12-ounce mug of salt is enough to treat a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. Consider organic, salt-free and pet-safe deicers.
- 3. Sweep and reuse. After a weather event, sweep and collect any sand, salt or undissolved deicer. Any excess can be reused for the next storm. Letting it run off into waterways is harmful to drinking water and wildlife.

The city's Department of Public Works is working to reduce its overall salt usage while ensuring safe roads.

One of the primary ways crews do this is by pretreating roads with a liquid salt brine that has a lower salt concentration and can be more precisely applied than rock salt. Sometimes beet juice yes, beet juice! — is mixed with the brine to help it work at lower temperatures. Staff also uses calculated salt-application rates, ensures that salt spreaders are properly calibrated and plans routes to avoid double-treating roads.

Earlier this year, crews attended a "salt summit," hosted by the city's Environmental Management Division staff that focused on the impacts of salt on waterways — especially the Chesapeake Bay.

Protect Our Neighborhood Parks and Streams: Put Pet Waste in the Trash

Pet waste belongs in the trash, not on the ground. Pet waste contains twice as many bacteria per gram as human waste. In your yard, in our parks, in the dog park – wherever you are, pick up the poop and put it in the trash. Follow these tips to prevent pet waste from contaminating our streams:

- Carry disposable bags and pick up after your pet, even on trails and in the woods. Make sure your dog walker picks up after your pet when on their walk.
- Properly dispose of pet waste by bagging the waste and depositing it in

- a trash can or pet waste receptacle.
- Do not throw bagged pet waste into storm drains or the woods, and do not leave it on the ground.
 Be sure to pick up pet
- Be sure to pick up pet waste on your own property too. Anything washed away by the rain will end up in our streams.
- Reuse bags that would have ended up in the trash to pick up after your pet. Ask co-workers, neighbors and friends to collect plastic bags used for bread, newspapers, bagels or produce.

Matching Grant Program Seeks Projects to Improve Communities

Deadline for Applications is Jan. 17

The Friday, Jan. 17 deadline is approaching for Rockville's matching grant program, which helps neighbors work together to accomplish common goals that support the health, vitality and inclusivity of the place they call home.

Neighborhood, civic or homeowners associations, community groups, organized groups of neighbors and student groups are eligible to apply. Neighbors and organizations willing to match funding through cash, in-kind donations and volunteer hours are also eligible.

Applications are reviewed and grants awarded by the City Manager's Office. Grants typically range from \$500-\$1,000, must benefit a clearly identified area within city limits and may address any or all of the following objectives:

- Building community:
 Projects that promote the development or sustainability of a neighborhood association or community group. Activities that foster diversity, equity and inclusion.
- Community improve-

ment projects: Projects that improve shared space within a neighborhood or strengthen community identity. This may include landscape improvements and maintenance, natural features management, benches, painting or certain exterior improvements. Bonus points will be awarded if two or more groups work together on a project.

• Livability initiatives:
Projects that provide
educational and outreach opportunities that
strengthen social connections between neighbors
or neighborhoods. This
may include improving safety, addressing a
neighborhood challenge
or conflict, serving lowincome seniors, or finding ways to welcome
newcomers to Rockville.





Rockville and Region Places 9th in Arts Vibrancy Rankings

The Frederick-Rockville-Gaithersburg region has come in ninth out of 20 large communities ranked as the most arts-vibrant nationwide.

SMU DataArts, the National Center for Arts Research, released its ninth Arts Vibrancy Index in December, which identifies the 40 most arts-vibrant communities in the United States.

"Rockville, along with its neighbors Frederick and Gaithersburg has consistently appeared on the Arts Vibrancy Index since the launch of the rankings in 2015," an SMU DataArts news release on the rankings states.

The index analyzes 13 unique measures, including the level of supply, demand and government support for the arts in more than 900 communities across the country. Large communities are those with a population of 1 million or more.

The Frederick-Gaithersburg-Rockville region also scored in the top 2% on measures related to state arts dollars.

Maryland ranked fifth

overall in the nation in SMU DataArts' separate arts vibrancy rankings of all 50 states.
