City Hall to Reopen March 28

Rockville City Hall will reopen Monday, March 28, with provisions in place to protect the health of Rockville employees and the public and prevent the spread of COVID-19.

The Mayor and Council will continue to hold hybrid meetings, which the public is welcome to attend virtually, until further notice. These meetings can be viewed ondemand or live streamed online at www.rockvillemd.gov/ rockville11 and can be watched on Rockville 11 on Comcast and Verizon cable channel 11.

City Hall has been closed since March 14, 2020, however, city services have been available virtually throughout the pandemic. Community centers, the Rockville Swim and Fitness Center, Civic Center Park and the Rockville Senior Center are open for in-person

Rockville mandates vacci-

nations and booster shots for all city employees and provides frequent COVID testing opportunities.

The city will continue to require face coverings for all employees and visitors, age 2 and older, in City of Rockville facilities. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention strongly recommends face coverings when the rate of community transmission is substantial, as it is presently in Montgomery County. When that rate becomes moderate or low, the city can reassess the face covering requirement.

To better assist visitors and monitor indoor use of face coverings, City Hall's third-floor main entrance on Vinson Street will be the facility's only entrance and exit for visitors until further notice. Face coverings will be provided to visitors who need

Mayor and Council Choose Preferred Concept for Future of RedGate Park

The Mayor and Council have decided on a preferred concept for the future of the 131-acre RedGate Park from three initial concepts presented to them at their Monday, Feb. 7 work session.

All three concepts prioritized nature-based amenities and passive recreation — activities such as connected trails for biking, hiking and walking, pathways, areas for picnicking, open spaces and natural habitats, as well as options for a possible amphitheater, community center, and sports field.

Following discussion, the preferred concept of the Mayor and Council included a smaller-scale amphitheater, community gardens, a nature playground, an arboretum, picnic areas, a network of trails and renovating the existing clubhouse.

Each concept was a preliminary and broad overview of possible amenities for the

park, and was developed following an Oct. 18 discussion with the Mayor and Council. Concepts were based on the city's strategic plan for recreation and parks in Rockville, considerable engagement with and feedback from the community, input from the Mayor and Council, and environmental constraints of natural features at the park.

City staff is working on the best method to reach out to the community and stakeholders for feedback and input on the Mayor and Council's preferred concept.

Spring Forward and Check Your **Smoke Alarms**

Daylight saving time begins at 2 a.m. Sunday, March 13, which is the ideal reminder for homeowners to check smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors while setting clocks forward


Alarms and detectors are the best way of notifying you and your family of a fire.

State law requires that battery-operated smoke alarms be replaced every 10 years from the date of manufacture. The devices should also be tested at least once a month.

State law also calls for older smoke alarms to be replaced with new, sealed, long-life battery-powered smoke alarms. Hardwired 120-volt electric smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years with new 120volt smoke alarms with battery backup to ensure proper and timely operation in a fire. Homeowners with hardwired smoke alarms should not replace their devices with battery-powered alarms.

Fire code-compliant smoke alarms can be purchased at most home improvement stores.

Rockville Utilities

Rockville's four utility funds are enterprise funds. They function like a private business, with costs fully recovered through user charges. The utility funds are the water fund, the sewer fund, the refuse fund, and the stormwater manage-


Revenue from the funds pays for repairs and replacement of aging water and sewer pipes and other infrastructure vital to providing these services, and for required payments to the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission related to a regional wastewater treatment plant. The city does not control the amount paid for regional wastewater treatment.

In January, the city transitioned to a rate structure based on property classification, namely single family, multifamily and nonresidential. This new structure more equitably distributes the cost of providing water and sewer service.


Other changes to city utility rates include a proposed \$20 annual increase in the refuse and recycling rate, to \$479 per household. The stormwater management rate would increase by \$6, to \$138 for the year, following four years of the same rate.

Budget Watch: Fiscal Year 2023

Rockville's Mayor and Council continue budget deliberations this month with public hearings and work sessions focused on crafting a Fiscal Year 2023 budget that outlines the city's priorities.

City Manager Rob DiSpirito was scheduled to present the Mayor and Council with a FY 2023 budget proposal on Feb. 28 that focuses on Mayor and Council priorities while addressing recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

"The FY 2023 proposed budget uses resources wisely and focuses on several Mayor and Council priorities, including implementation of the Comprehensive Plan, environmental sustainability and Climate Action Plan, Vision Zero, economic development, and financial sustainability and pandemic recovery," DiSpirito wrote in a letter introducing the budget. "While there are many other items proposed in the FY 2023 budget (including cultural arts, [the Americans with Disabilities Actl, grants management, public safety, and housing), staff understood these to be top priority areas for FY 2023."

The budget, which covers the fiscal year that begins July 1, is scheduled for adoption by the Mayor and Council on Monday, May 9.

The proposed FY 2023 operating budget of \$148.6 million is a 5.2% increase over the FY 2022 adopted budget. The general fund budget, which supports the largest portion of the operating budget, is \$93.1 million, a 7.7%

The city's current real property tax rate of \$0.292 per \$100 of assessed valuation would remain the same for FY 2023. All residential and

ARPA Aids in Pandemic Recovery

The city received \$9.6 million in federal American Rescue Plan Act funding. ARPA's goal is to aid state and local governments in recovering from the budgetary, economic, and financial impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. During Fiscal Year 2022, the Mayor and Council appropriated \$5.6 million

of ARPA funds for the following:

- \$1 million for delinquent water and sewer bill forgiveness.
- \$1.4 million for commercial water meter replacements.
- \$750,000 for upgrades to the city's water treatment plant.
- \$530,000 for water treatment plant safety improvements.
- \$300,000 for water treatment plant cybersecurity improvements.
- \$650,000 for King Farm Farmstead sewer infrastructure.
- \$450,000 for King Farm Farmstead electrical infrastructure.
- \$533,345 for an enclosure for the recycling transfer station at the city's Gude Drive Maintenance Facility.

The remaining \$4 million will be discussed and likely appropriated in calendar year 2022.

commercial property owners pay this tax. Rockville has not increased its property tax rate since 1995.

The proposed budget prioritizes implementation of the Comprehensive Plan. Adopted by the Mayor and Council in August, the plan contains the core philosophy that guides development, conservation, and capital improvement projects to improve quality of life in Rockville.

Other priorities in the proposal include:

- \$4.2 million for flood mitigation, electric vehicle infrastructure, LED streetlight conversion, and storm drain analysis and spot repairs as part of the Climate Action Plan adopted in January. The proposed budget also funds the creation of a sustainability program manager position to implement and manage city initiatives recommended by the plan.
- \$8.4 million for several projects that support Vision Zero, a transportation safety action plan to eliminate all traffic-related deaths and serious injuries. Projects include asphalt and concrete improvements and replacement, LED streetlight conversion,

and pedestrian and bicycle safety improvements to sidewalks and roadways.

- \$1.6 million for Rockville Economic Development, Inc., the nonprofit charged with helping businesses launch, locate and expand in Rockville. The 13% increase over FY 2022 will support operational cost increases, tourism promotion, REDI's business incentive program and a commercial district creation project.
- \$300,000 for two-year contract for a consultant to assist with an update to the city's zoning ordinance.
- Restoration of operating funds, eliminated during the pandemic, and funding for the Employee Compensation and Classification Study rec-

The proposal calls for an increase of 17.8 full-time equivalent positions, including four that were previously frozen. They are two senior planners, a police major, and a senior construction projects

The proposed FY 2023-FY 2027 CIP, the five-year plan for funding new construction and infrastructure maintenance, includes \$27.3 million in new funding, combined with a carryover of \$58.2 million to support 46 projects during the fiscal year. *

Charter Review Commission Turns Attention to City Elections Commission Launches Online Questionnaire

and Sets Town Hall Meeting for March

Rockville's Charter Review Commission is asking city residents for ideas about how to increase voter turnout, update the city's election process and engage more communities.

The commission is using an online questionnaire, and will hold a town hall meeting at 7 p.m. Tuesday, March 15 to gather community input about how to improve city elections for all. Save the date for the town hall meeting and watch the city's online calendar and social media for more details.

The questionnaire, at www. rockvillemd.gov/Charter-Review-Commission, presents a unique opportunity to share thoughts with the commission and help create meaningful change for the next decade. Responses will inform the commission's ongoing work. The deadline for responses is Friday, March 25.

Every decade or so, the Charter Review Commission looks at ways to update the charter so that it best serves all residents. In 2021, the Mayor and Council appointed 11 commissioners to review the city's charter, with a focus on examining city elections.

About 70% of registered voters in Rockville did not vote in the city's 2019 election. The next city election is in November 2023.

The charter is a legal document that is like a constitution. It outlines how the city is organized, runs elections, levies taxes, adopts ordinances, provides services and more. Find the charter at www. rockvillemd.gov/124/City-Code-Charter. 💠



Raking News: Spring Leaf Collection in April

The city will vacuum leaves from neighborhood curbs from April 4-15 in five collection areas throughout Rockville.

An interactive map at www.rockvillemd. gov/leafcollection allows residents to input their address and learn when their leaves will be collected. Unlike the fall leaf collection, which has two collection rounds, city crews make only one pass to collect leaves in spring.

Rake leaves next to, but out of, roadways, gutters and bike lanes, and away from parked vehicles. Leaves should be raked by 6 a.m. on the first day of their collection period, but no earlier than one week before the collection dates to avoid grass damage or fire hazards. Remove sticks and other objects from leaf piles. Avoid parking near leaf piles or other vehicles.

After the collection period ends, use biodegradable paper lawn bags or 32-gallon trash cans (without plastic garbage bags) to set leaves out on your refuse and recycling collection day. Use alternative disposal methods such as mulching or composting. Do not dump leaves, grass clippings or other yard waste into storm drains, along stream banks or directly into streams, where they can cause blockages that contribute to localized flooding or release nutrients that lead to fish kills.

Do Your Bit to Deter Deer

Area wildlife helps maintain a healthy ecosystem but can become a nuisance. Here are a few ways to live with, and discourage, deer:

- Taste or odor repellent are humane forms of control designed to repel deer from an area.
 You can find repellents at sporting goods stores.
- Plant deer-resistant native plants.
- Install fencing and physical barriers.
- Do not feed the deer. (Feeding wildlife can do more harm than good.)

City's Financial Assistance Program Can Help in an Emergency

Need Financial Help? Facing Eviction?

Utilities about to be shut off? Need help paying for prescription medication?

Emergency financial assistance through the Rockville Emergency Assistance Program is available to eligible Rockville residents facing a financial crisis.

Depending on eligibility, REAP assistance may also be available for funeral and medical expenses. Referrals for emergency food, clothing, financial/employment counseling and other assistance are also provided.

All applicants for financial assistance must have a court-issued notice of evic-

tion or notice of pending disconnection, and must apply to the Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services. Montgomery County DHHS will submit a referral to the City of Rockville Community Services Division on behalf of eligible city residents.

Pause for Pedestrians: City Installs Flashing Beacons for Safer Street Crossing

Rockville is sporting flashier crosswalks in recent months as the city installs flashing beacons to improve pedestrian safety.

The beacons are flashing yellow lights attached to crosswalk signs at either end of a crosswalk. They bring attention to crosswalks that don't have stops signs or signals and are designed to alert drivers that a pedestrian is at the crosswalk. The beacons aren't stop signs or stop lights, but drivers are required to come to a complete stop when a person is using the crosswalk.

The city installed beacons at the intersection of Great Falls Road and Monument Avenue in summer 2020 and this fall at a crosswalk on Wootton Parkway in front of Thomas S. Wootton High School.

The beacons work similarly to a signalized crosswalk. People needing to cross

the street press the button to activate the beacons. Once the lights are flashing, they should look for oncoming motor vehicle traffic and, when it is clear, cross the street as they normally would, using the crosswalk.

Maryland law requires drivers to come to a stop when a person is crossing the roadway in a crosswalk on the same half of the roadway, or in an adjacent lane. Pedestrians must take care not to walk into the path of an approaching vehicle if it is so close that it is impossible for the driver to stop.

A flashing beacon means a person is at the crosswalk. Drivers should slow to a complete stop so that the person may cross the street safely. Once the person has reached the sidewalk on the other side of the street, vehicular traffic can proceed.

County to Provide Free, Virtual Tax Preparation Appointments through VITA

Montgomery County is hosting free, virtual tax preparation sessions throughout tax season for low- to moderate-income families that earned \$58,000 or less in 2021.

The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program, which is run by the Montgomery County Community Action Agency, provides IRS-certified volunteers from nonprofit and public agencies who can help low- to moderate-income families maximize their tax refunds and credits, including the Earned Income Tax Credit, and e-file their federal and state tax forms.

The program is using virtual tax preparation during the COVID-19 emergency that allows county residents to securely upload their tax documents and have their taxes prepared for free by a certified tax preparer. No in-person contact is required.

Working on a Historic Property? You Could Qualify for a Tax Credit

Restoring or repairing the outside of a historic home or preserving the exterior of a historic structure? You could be eligible for a property tax credit.

Rockville participates in the tax credit program for local structures designated as historic. The city is now accepting applications for work completed in calendar year 2021.


If your property in Rockville is designated by the city as historic and you spent at least \$1,000 on exterior maintenance between Jan. 1 and Dec. 31, 2021, you may be eligible for reduction of your property taxes for the coming year, up to 25% of approved expenses.

Eligible projects include:
• Exterior painting.

- Uncovering and repairing original siding.
- Repairing roofs or replacing them in-kind.
- Repointing brick or stone foundations, or chimneys.
- Repairing windows, architectural trim or ornament.
- Repairing and maintaining outbuildings, such as barns and garages.
- Restoring a documented feature, such as a dormer or porch that was previously altered or removed.



Meet Rockville Employees: The Recycling and Refuse Team



Rockville's outstanding recycling and refuse team serves more than 14,300 homes each week. The team also helps with snow removal during winter weather emergencies.

Who's on the team?

Our team includes sanitation workers and operators, supervisors, and the recycling/refuse superintendent. Fifteen veteran team members have more than 200 years of combined service to Rockville. The city is recruiting sanitation workers to join our team. (See the ad on page 5 for details).

What does the team do?

The team operates recycling and refuse trucks that provide weekly recycling, trash and yard waste collections for more than 3,200 single-family and townhomes per day – more than 14,300 homes a week. Teams work in inclement weather to ensure the community receives this essential city service. This is a skilled and physically demanding job and safety is the team's priority.

That's a big job. Is there anything customers can do to help the team?

When in doubt, throw it out. Nonrecyclable material in the recycling stream can damage recycling equipment or contaminate recyclable material. Find a list of recy-

clable materials at www. rockvillemd.gov/recycling-trash. If you're not sure if it's recyclable, put it in the gray trash cart.


Also remember: When in doubt, set it out. During weeks that include a city holiday, your recycling, trash and yard waste collections may occur one day later that week. Visit www. rockvillemd.gov/301/ holiday-schedules for holiday collection schedules.

Anything else we should know?

Please remember to be extra careful around workers. Slow down when you drive around a stopped trash truck or other utility vehicle. Maryland's "Slow Down to Get Around" law protects recycling and trash collection crews by requiring drivers to change lanes as they approach stopped utility vehicles, or to slow to a "reasonable and prudent speed" when passing. The law applies to tow trucks, law enforcement, emergency response vehicles, transportation, service and utility vehicles, including recycling and trash trucks.
