# **Rockville Mayor and Council Unanimously Adopt Town Center Master Plan**

The Rockville Mayor and Council unanimously adopted the Town Center Master Plan during their Jan. 27 meeting, marking the final step of a nearly two-year process to shape the future of the city's downtown core. The decision comes almost exactly two years after the project charter was initially approved in January 2023.

The Town Center Master Plan outlines a comprehensive vision for the area, including zoning changes, urban design improvements and strategies to enhance economic vitality and community engagement.

The final approved plan is available at engagerockville. com/towncenter.

Nearly 1,000 residents, business owners, employees and visitors contributed feedback through meetings, public comments and testimony before the Mayor and Council or Planning Commission. That diverse input significantly strengthened the final plan.

With the plan now adopted, city staff will begin work on near-term actions outlined in the implementation matrix, which establishes timeframes for executing the plan's recommendations. Larger initiatives, such as proposed zoning changes, will require additional time and analysis. The Department of Community Planning and Development Services is exploring the best way to update zoning regulations to align with the plan's goals.

The Town Center Master Plan represents a significant milestone in Rockville's efforts to create a vibrant, inclusive and sustainable downtown area.

# **Community's Ideas Sought for Future of King Farm Farmstead**

Rockville will be reaching out to its community to determine the future for King Farm Farmstead Park, a 7-acre, historic former farmstead at 1101 Grand Champion Drive.

The farmstead comprises eight buildings at the northern edge of the King Farm neighborhood, including the main residence, horse and dairy barns, and outbuildings. The site was designated as a historic district in 2006 and is part of the city's park system.

Several community engagement opportunities are planned and a survey will seek public input at engagerockville.com/ kingfarm, a site that will also act as a hub for the community to learn about the project and register for updates.

Three in-person community visioning open houses have been scheduled for: Wednesday, March 5, at Saddle Ridge Community Center, 300 Saddle Ridge Circle; Tuesday, March 25, at Glenview Mansion, 603 Edmonston Drive; and Tuesday, April 8, at Twinbrook Community Recreation Center,

12920 Twinbrook Parkway. A virtual community visioning meeting will be held Tuesday, April

All meetings will be held from 6:30-8:30 p.m.

"This is an opportunity for the community to play an active role in shaping one of Rockville's historic treasures," said Tara Stewart, director of the city's Department of Recreation and Parks. "We look forward to hearing from residents and working together to reimagine the King Farm Farmstead as a vibrant, functional space for generations to come."

The farmstead project will draw on more than a decade of input, including task force studies, property assessments and economic analyses. This foundational work will guide discussions as the city collaborates with a consultant to evaluate potential uses for each building on the property.

Public input will guide the Mayor and Council's decision on the property's master plan.

#### **Spring Forward and Check Your Smoke Alarms**

Clocks move forward an hour this month, providing an extra hour of daylight in the evening.

Daylight saving time begins at 2 a.m. Sunday, March 9 — an ideal reminder for homeowners to check smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors.

Alarms and detectors are the best way to notify you and your family of a fire.

State law requires that battery-operated smoke alarms be replaced every 10 years from the date of manufacture. Devices should also be tested at least once a month. State law also requires replacing older smoke alarms with new, sealed, long-life battery-powered smoke alarms.

Hardwired 120-volt electric smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years with new 120-volt smoke alarms with battery backup to ensure proper and timely operation in a fire. Homeowners with hardwired smoke alarms should not replace their devices with battery-powered alarms.

Fire code-compliant smoke alarms can be purchased at most home improvement stores.

#### **Rockville Utilities**

Rockville's four utility funds are enterprise funds. They function like a private business, with costs fully recovered through user charges. The utility funds are the water fund, the sewer fund, the refuse fund and the stormwater management fund.

Revenue from the funds pays for repairs and replacement of aging water and sewer pipes and other infrastructure vital to providing these services, and for required payments to the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission related to a regional wastewater treatment plant. The city does not control the amount paid for regional wastewater treatment.

The city's rate structure is based on property classification, namely single family, multifamily and nonresidential, to distribute, as equitably as possible, the cost of providing water and sewer service.


The budget includes a proposed \$30 annual increase in the refuse and recycling rate, to \$565 per household. The stormwater management rate would increase by \$7, to \$159 for the year.



# **Budget Watch: Fiscal Year 2026**

Rockville's Mayor and Council begin budget deliberations this month with public hearings and work sessions focused on a Fiscal Year 2026 budget that prioritizes the Mayor and Council's focus areas of public safety, economic development and housing.

The proposed budget will be available for review beginning Friday, March 7 at www. rockvillemd.gov/budget.

City Manager Jeff Mihelich is scheduled to present the Mayor and Council with a FY 2026 budget proposal on Monday, March 17.

The budget, which covers the fiscal year that begins July 1, is scheduled for adoption by the Mayor and Council on Monday, May 5.

The proposed FY26 operating budget of \$174.9 million is a 3.9% increase over the FY 2025 adopted budget. The general fund budget, which supports the largest portion of the operating budget, is \$116.6 million, a 6.9% increase.

The city's current real property tax rate of \$0.292 per \$100 of assessed valuation would remain the same for FY26. All residential and commercial property owners pay this tax. Rockville has not increased its property tax rate since 1995.

The proposed budget pri-

oritizes the city's continued commitment to capital investments, including several large capital projects. (See the box below for details.) The proposed FY 2026-FY 2030 CIP, the five-year plan for funding new construction and infrastructure maintenance, supports 65 projects during the fiscal year.

The proposal also funds Mayor and Council focus areas and includes:

- Approximately \$10 million in new funding for the city's Vision Zero Action Plan and Pedestrian Master Plan.
- Introduction of a two-year closed-circuit television security camera system modernization initiative.
- Two new full-time civilian positions in the Rockville City Police Department.
- Support for increased police officer recruitment incentive programs.
- Funding for the city's annual gun buyback.
- More than \$1.5 million to promote safety and quality for the city's drinking water and water treatment plant.
- \$250,000 for a new emergency response vehicle for the Rockville Volunteer Fire Department.
- \$1.6 million for Rockville Economic Development,

- Five new full-time positions to support timely and efficient processing of plan reviews, permits and inspections, including the reinstatement of expedited building permit review processes.
- \$650,000 for the expected annexation of the Shady Grove Metro station.
- Support for the ongoing update of the city's zoning ordinance.
- A \$250,000 transfer to and \$750,000 in new funding for the Housing Opportunities Fund to promote the preservation and addition of affordable housing, launch an employee homeownership assistance program, and begin development of a homeownership downpayment assistance program for the community.
- Two new full-time positions to assist with the expansion of city programs addressing housing.

# **Proposed FY 2026-FY 2030 Capital Improvements Program**

The FY 2026-FY 2030 Capital Improvements Program includes new appropriations of \$33.8 million to support 65 capital projects. For more information on each project, see the "CIP Projects" section of the proposed FY26 budget at www.rockvillemd.gov/budget. The CIP includes:

- Construction of a new entrance to the Rockville Senior Center from West Gude Drive.
- Completion and occupancy of the maintenance and emergency operations facility at 6 Taft Court.
- Completion of improvements to Lincoln Park Community Center and the F. Scott Fitzgerald Theatre.
- Ongoing maintenance and improvements of the city's paths, roadways, sidewalks, stormwater facilities and water and sewer infrastructure.
- Six new capital projects focused on the preservation and improvement of city facilities, efficient and effective transportation, water quality and regulatory compliance, and technology advancements, including:
  - An assessment of, and critical repairs to, the retaining walls and paths at Glenview Mansion.
  - Traffic signal upgrades at multiple locations.
  - An inventory of material used in water service lines to comply with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Lead and Copper Rule.
  - Development of the city's Water Distribution System Master Plan to guide projects to improve water quality and the flow of water to fire hydrants, and to meet future development demands.
- Improvements to the city's core financial, human resources and procurement enterprise resource planning system to support business needs.
- Improvements to the city's Rothgeb Drive maintenance facility based on the facility's master plan.



Admission and parking are free. Food will be available for purchase. The event will be held rain or shine.



# **Spring Rake!: April Leaf Collection**

The city will vacuum leaves from neighborhood curbs from Monday, April 7-Friday, April 18 in five collection areas throughout Rockville.

Rake leaves next to, but out of, roadways, gutters and bike lanes, and away from parked vehicles. Leaves should be raked by 6 a.m. on the first day of their collection period, but no earlier than one week before the collection dates to avoid grass damage or fire hazards. Remove sticks and other objects from leaf piles. Avoid parking near leaf piles or other vehicles.

Do not dump leaves, grass clippings or other yard waste into storm drains, along stream banks or directly into streams.

# **Working on a Historic Property? You Could Qualify for a Tax Credit**

Restoring or repairing the outside of a historic home? Preserving the exterior of a historic structure? You could be eligible for a property tax credit.

Rockville participates in a tax credit program for local structures designated as historic.

If your property in Rockville is designated by the city as historic and you spent at least \$1,000 on exterior maintenance between Jan. 1 and Dec. 31, 2024, you may be eligible for a reduction of your property taxes for the coming year, up to 25% of the approved expenses.

Eligible projects include:

- Exterior painting.
- Uncovering and repairing

original siding.

- Repairing roofs or replacing them in-kind.
- Repointing brick or stone foundations or chimneys.
- Repairing windows, architectural trim or ornament.
- Repairing and maintaining outbuildings, such as barns and garages.
- Restoring a documented feature, such as a dormer or porch, that was altered or removed.

Meanwhile, Vision Zero planning and projects are making progress as Rockville continues creating safer travel routes for

The city plans to install a temporary pedestrian safety improvement this month by adding flex posts separating the travel lane from a marked no-parking zone — at Mannakee Street and Smallwood Road. A concrete pedestrian refuge island, providing a place for pedestrians to wait while crossing Mannakee Street, will be installed as a permanent improvement when the street is resurfaced this summer.

Another concrete pedestrian refuge median will be constructed to ease pedestrian crossings and slow vehicle traffic on Twinbrook Parkway at Meadow Hall Drive when Twinbrook Parkway is resurfaced later this year. Staff evaluated the intersection at the request of residents and the Twinbrook Community Association.

A virtual public meeting is scheduled for Thursday, March 27, to discuss the Congressional Lane Complete Streets study. Staff will solicit

comments and suggestions from residents and answer questions. Find meeting details with the March 27 calendar listing at www. rockvillemd.gov/calendar. 


