Voters Will Have Their Say Through Ballot Questions

As well as choosing seven members to elect to the city's Mayor and Council, voters will decide on advisory referenda questions for the City

of Rockville's 2023 ROCKVILLE

election.

The questions, if approved by voters, would amend the city charter to:

• Lower the voting age to 16.

- Permit noncitizens to vote.
- Create representative districts.
- Set term limits.
- Implement ranked-choice voting.

The amendments are recommendations from the Charter Review Commission.

Ballots will be mailed to all registered voters who live within Rockville city limits. All ballots must be received by 8 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 7. Voters will be able to vote by mail, in person at the two election day vote cen-

ters on Nov. 7, or at an election drop box.

Voters will be able to drop



Frederick Ave., and Twinbrook Community and Recreation Center, 12920 Twinbrook Parkway. The boxes will be available during center hours.

In addition to a drop box outside City Hall, voters will be able to drop their ballots at a drop box outside Montrose Community Center, 451 Congressional Lane. Both will be available 24/7, beginning in October.

State Legislative Wins: Schools, Vision Zero and Solar Energy

State aid for schools, legislation addressing transportation needs and a grant to renovate restrooms at a city community center were among wins for Rockville during the Maryland General Assembly session that concluded April 10.

The General Assembly passed a \$63 billion state budget for Fiscal

Year 2024, which begins July 1. The budget's education funding — a city priority — includes \$8.7 billion for prekindergarten through 12th grade public schools and \$900 million for the Blueprint for Maryland's Future, a long-term plan for state public education

Compensation Commission Seeks Public Input

The city's Compensation Commission is seeking public comments about annual compensation for the Mayor and Council.

The commission is soliciting public input through an online survey and will hold a public forum to hear from city residents from 7-8 p.m. Thursday, May 11 in the Mayor and Council chambers at City Hall, 111 Maryland Ave.

The survey and May 11

public forum will ask residents to answer the question: "Do you believe that the current compensation for Mayor and Council is reasonable? If not, please explain. Currently, the annual stipend is \$37,560 for the mayor and \$30,483 for councilmembers."

City residents can also answer the question using the survey at www.rockvillemd. gov/103/Compensation-Commission, where they can

learn more about Mayor and Council compensation and about the commission.

The commission's five members must be City of Rockville residents or have a place of business in the city. By ordinance, the commission is required to convene every four years and provide a recommendation to the Mayor and Council by June 30. Any change in compensation would not take effect until after the following election.

They are categorized by the U.S. Census Bureau as census-designated places.

City Makes Bus Stop Improvements Across Rockville

A city contractor is completing 58 bus stop improvement projects this spring, bringing freestanding bus shelters, benches and other improvements to bus stops citywide.

The improvements, which began with concrete work in March, include constructing seven Americans with Disabilities Act-required concrete wheelchair landing pads, replacing 28 shelter benches that were not ADA compliant, and installing missing shelter benches, freestanding benches and leaning rails, and larger shelters at highactivity stops, as well as relocating trash cans and other equipment to remove sidewalk and shelter obstructions.

The contractor completed concrete work in March at bus stops on:

• Maryland Avenue at two stops at Monument Street and at Great Falls Road.

- Stonestreet Avenue at Spring Avenue.
- Veirs Mill Road at Edmonston Drive.
- Halpine Road at Rockville Pike.
- Seven Locks Road at two stops at Twin Oaks Drive and at Fortune Terrace.
- Wootton Parkway at Glen Mill Road.
- Stonestreet Avenue at Spring Avenue.

Scheduled work includes concrete work to install freestanding benches during the first week of May and shelter replacements at the end of May at bus stops along Frederick Road/Rockville Pike, Jefferson Street, Research Boulevard and Wootton Parkway. Work will continue into June. The contractor will post signs at bus stops notifying users when construction will begin.

Staff is joining representatives from other local jurisdictions, in partnership with the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments, for monthly inperson meetings and actions to build and strengthen the city's operational capacities.

City to Hold Meetings on Transportation Mobility and Safety Projects

The city's Traffic and Transportation Division will hold two virtual meetings in May to discuss upcoming projects to improve mobility and safety for pedestrians and bicyclists as part of the city's Vision Zero Action Plan.

One project will take a Complete Streets approach on Fleet and Monroe streets, near Richard Montgomery High School, in Rockville Town Center. A meeting from 7-8:30 p.m. Thursday, May 4 will review alternatives and allow opportunity for public input. Alternatives being considered include a wide shared-use path next to sidewalk, or an on-street cycle track — sometimes called a protected bike lane — that uses a physical barrier to separate bike traffic from motorized traffic.

A year ago, the
Metropolitan Washington
Council of Governments
awarded the city \$60,000
for a Complete Streets feasibility study of its streets.
The Complete Streets approach can reduce speeding vehicles and help move
the city towards achieving
the goals of Vision Zero, a
plan adopted by the Mayor
and Council to eliminate
traffic- and pedestrian-

related deaths and serious injuries.

A second project seeks to provide safer crossings of Beall Avenue for pedestrians and bicyclists by creating "protected intersections" that improve sightlines and slow vehicles' turning speeds.

Last year, COG awarded the city \$50,000 for a feasibility study of the most effective safety improvements for Beall Avenue intersections and to develop three alternative concept designs for each.

A meeting, from 7-8:30 p.m. Thursday, May 18, will review the concept designs and allow opportunity for public input. Alternatives include signalization changes, moving the bus stop at Beall Avenue/MD 355, a raised intersection or roundabout at Beall and Maryland avenues, and improvements along Beall Avenue that could include separated bicycle lanes, additional parking and wider buffers.

Town Center Road Diets Project Continues with Sidewalk Widening, Pavement Milling

The city's Town Center Road Diets project is ongoing and on schedule, with pavement milling along North Washington Street and East Middle Lane scheduled for May.

In April, city contractors completed widening of the south side of East Middle Lane between Gibbs Street and Maryland Avenue.

Pavement milling is scheduled for the second or third week of May and will take two to three weeks. Temporary striping will be done after the milling, with permanent striping two to three weeks after the final paving. Both projects are dependent on the weather.

During the permanent striping, new lane configurations will reduce the two travel lanes to one lane along North Washington Street and East Middle Lane. This will create a new traffic pattern with new bike lanes and onstreet parking spaces. New precast curb barriers will be installed during or after the striping.

Rockville Housing Enterprises Acquires Scarborough Square

121 Affordable Units Added for City Residents

Rockville Housing Enterprises, the city's public housing agency, recently acquired Scarborough Square in the city's College Gardens neighborhood, which provides and preserves 121 affordable housing units in the City of Rockville.

Scarborough Square has a variety of units, including larger ones that are often in short supply but ideal for families. The property's 121 one-to-fourbedroom units are contained in townhomes and multifamily buildings. RHE plans to modernize the building over the next two to four years.

The acquisition of Scarborough Square is a step towards achieving the city's housing policy objectives outlined in the 2040 Comprehensive Plan. The Regional Metropolitan Council of Government's goal is to increase the number of affordable units in the city of Rockville to 1,000 by 2030. To support this goal, RHE acquired Scarborough Square apartments through the Montgomery County Right of First Refusal program in November 2022. The acquisition was made possible through intergovernmental and public-private partnerships with the City of Rockville, Montgomery County and a private lender, ORLO.

The City of Rockville provided \$1.8 million towards the acquisition; the county provided \$44 million in interim financing and \$10 million permanent financing; ORLO provided \$33 million in funding towards the acquisition financing.

Mayor and Council to Vote on FY 2024 Budget in May

The Mayor and Council are scheduled to vote in May on the adoption of a city budget that demonstrates a commitment to capital investments, adopted city plans and fiscal sustainability.

The budget covers Fiscal Year 2024, which begins July 1. In February, City Manager Rob DiSpirito proposed an operating budget of \$156.4 million, a 5.1% increase over the FY 2023 adopted budget.

The Mayor and Council discussed changes to the proposal during work sessions on March 6, March 20, April 17 and April 24. They recommended advancing several large capital projects, including improvements to the F. Scott Fitzgerald Theatre, renovation of the Rockville Swim and Fitness Center's outdoor recreation pool, renovation of the new Maintenance and Emergency Operations Facility at 6 Taft Court, and designing new amenities for RedGate Park. The Mayor and Council also prioritized ongoing city plans, including the Comprehensive Plan, the Climate Action Plan and the Vision Zero Action Plan.

The April work sessions included a discussion of options for avoiding a property tax rate increase in future budgets. Under the city manager's proposal, the city's current real property tax rate of \$0.292 per \$100 of assessed valuation would remain the same for FY24. All residential and commercial property owners pay this tax. Rockville has not increased its property tax rate since 1995.

A final budget work session is scheduled for the Mayor and Council meeting on Monday, May 1. The budget is scheduled for adoption on Monday, May 8. from pre-K through college.

Lawmakers also approved legislation addressing financing for state transportation projects and establishing a commission to make recommendations about transportation funding and infrastructure needs. The legislation could support improvements to state roads identified by Rockville's Vision Zero Action Plan to eliminate traffic- and pedestrian-related deaths and serious injuries. It could also affect Maryland's approach to the state's proposed I-495 and I-270 Managed Lanes Project. The Mayor and Council remain strongly opposed to the project and are committed to working with Gov. Wes Moore's administration to rethink it.

Lawmakers also voted to make permanent a pilot program that allows customers to share electricity from solar energy generating systems. The community solar program addresses a goal of Rockville's Climate Action Plan, to increase access to affordable, reliable, clean energy.

In another win for Rockville, lawmakers approved a \$350,000 grant for renovations to create gender-neutral, single-user restrooms at the Twinbrook Community

Protect Pollinators: Plant Natives, Provide Water, and Preserve Habitat and Insect Life

June is National Pollinator Month

Bees, butterflies, moths, beetles and other garden helpers play an important role in the food chain by fertilizing plants that produce seeds, berries, fruits and other plant foods. But pollinators worldwide are in decline due to habitat loss, climate change, invasive species and pesticides. Check out the tips below to learn how to do your part to help pollinators.

Plant native flowering plants in your garden, reduce the size of your lawn and don't plant non-native invasive plants.

Plant host plants to provide essential habitat. Butterflies need special host plants as food for their caterpillars. Native oak trees are host to over 400 butterflies and moths. Monarchs rely on only one host plant, milkweed.

Provide water for pollinators. Fill a shallow birdbath with gravel or create a muddy patch in a corner of your yard.

Plant dense shrubs where hummingbirds can nest and, to provide food, native plants with bright red and orange tubular flowers. Supplement as needed with a nectar feeder.

Leave hollow stems, fallen logs and bare patches of sandy soil. Most native bees are solitary and lay eggs in tiny tunnels in hollow stems, dead trees, fallen branches or sandy soil.

Avoid using pesticides. Most insects are a sign of a healthy garden and an important food source for birds.

Learn How to Help Save the Bay Every Day

Rockville is part of the Chesapeake Bay watershed. Actions we take in our own backyards can have a significant impact on the health, habitat and wildlife of local waterways, and eventually the Chesapeake Bay.

Help Rockville celebrate Chesapeake Bay Awareness Week, from Saturday, June 3-Sunday, June 11, by sharing, with friends and family, these actions to help protect local water resources, the Potomac River and the Chesapeake Bay:

Reduce pesticide and fertilizer use. Or better yet, don't fertilize at all if it isn't necessary! Never fertilize or use pesticides if rain is forecast within 24 hours. Fertilizers and pesticides can end up in streams and harm aquatic life — and most synthetic pesticides are prohibited in Rockville. Learn more and find organic lawn care tips at www.rockvillemd.gov/ pesticideban.

Reduce impervious sur*faces* to reduce polluting runoff, plant a native tree to absorb harmful nutrients and prevent erosion, and landscape with plants native to the bay. Learn how to get rebates for taking these actions at www.rockville md.gov/rainscapes.

Pick up after your pet. Rain washes pet waste left on the ground into storm drains or streams. Please place bagged waste in a

Keep our city litter free. Litter often ends up in local streams and eventually the Chesapeake Bay. Don't overflow your outdoor trash cart. Keep the lid closed securely and put trash out shortly before pickup, especially on windy days. Adopt a stream to keep clean at www.rockvillemd. gov/adopt-a-stream, or take the Plogging Pledge at www.rockvillemd.gov/ environment.

Checklist to Reduce Mosquito Breeding on Your Property

Mosquito species that have the potential to spread viruses prefer to breed in small amounts of standing water near where people live and work. They typically do not breed in natural areas like streams and ponds.



Empty out water from children's toys and plastic containers.

If possible, bring indoors. Cover large toys and sand boxes with tightly fitting tarps, or drain weekly.

Remove trash from yard.

As little as a bottle-cap full of water is enough for mosquitoes to breed.

Clean out roof gutters and downspout screens. If possible, replace corrugated downspouts with smooth PVC.

Store recycling bins out of the rain. Dump out any water at least weekly.

Even though bins have drain holes, small amounts of water may still collect.

Add an aerator or fountain to birdbaths or ornamental

Mosquitoes do not breed in moving water.

Tighten tarps and pool covers to minimize folds. If water still collects, shake out the tarp at least weekly.

Fix outdoor leaks and dripping faucets.

Get rid of puddles from window air conditioners.

Dump and scrub saucers under potted plants, and flush birdbaths at least once a week.

Where to Check:

- Front yard.
- Backyard.
- **Roof and gutters** (follow safety precautions).

Along edge of the property. Balconies (apartments too!).

Note: Mosquito species of concern typically do not fly more than 150 yards from where they breed.

Customers can receive a dollar-for-dollar match of up to \$10 weekly when they shop with SNAP/EBT (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program/ Electronic Benefits Transfer), P-EBT (Pandemic EBT) and WIC-FVC (Women, Infants and Children-Fruit and Vegetable Checks) at the market. Matching funds can be used to purchase locally grown and produced items including fruits, vegetables, meat, cheese, dairy, baked goods, eggs and honey.

The program aims to fight hunger while investing directly in farmers, strengthening the local food system. Customers can stop by the market tent, located at the market entrance for more information.

Recreation Center and Annex.

Lawmakers also passed bills changing how municipalities are required to advertise proposed charter changes and real property tax increases. The measures are expected to save the city money on the cost of public notices.

Several city-backed priorities failed to win passage, including Maryland Municipal League-backed legislation to give municipalities the option of creating their own police accountability board and administrative charging committee, a bill extending a state rebate program for electric vehicle charging equipment, and bills to crack down on illegally modified vehicle exhaust systems that generate excessive noise.


