Mayor and Council to Review Rockville Station Study

Consultants from the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority will share an update on a study of the Rockville Metro station with the Mayor and Council at their Monday, Dec. 5 meeting.

The WMATA team will share the draft results of a concept analysis and discuss four concept design options with the Mayor and Council.

This is an interim review of the analysis by the Mayor and Council in order to provide direction before holding two public meetings to share results of the concept analysis and receive feedback from the community.

The station, which opened in 1984, is a critical part of the city's transportation network, but showing its age.

The study's goals are to develop recommendations for improvements to the station's aging infrastructure and connections with Rockville's downtown and neighborhoods to the east, and potential development opportunities at the site and strategies to increase bus and train ridership.

City's Education and Youth **Commissions Seek Members**

Rockville's two newest commissions — one for education, the other for youth are recruiting members.

The Education Commission was created by the Mayor and Council to support the city's students. While the commission has not yet been appointed, an interest meeting in September reviewed the ordinance creating the commission, commission responsibilities and requirements, and how to become a member.

The commission is intended to maintain and grow collaborative relationships among the county's board of education, Montgomery County Public Schools, private and nonprofit schools, Montgomery College, parentteacher associations, private and nonprofit school boards, home-school communities, and providers of early child care and education programs in the Rockville community.

The 11-member commission will include seven parents or guardians, with four representing public education and three representing private, parochial and home schooling; and three educational professionals. Those 10 members will serve for two years. One member will be a student, who will serve for one year.

The Youth Commission, comprised of 16- to 21-yearolds who live or attend high school or Montgomery College in the city, will develop recommendations for the Mayor and Council about programs, policies and legislation to promote the health and well-being of young adults by identifying, monitoring and evaluating youth services, programs, and activities offered in Rockville and surrounding areas.

Five members of the 11-member Youth Commission will be appointed for two-year terms and six members for one-year terms.

New Fire Protection Oversight System Proves a Success

Since January's implementation of the Compliance Engine, a thirdparty inspection and data collection platform for fire protection systems, the city has experienced 20% fewer nuisance alarms.

The Compliance Engine allows oversight by Rockville's fire marshal and Inspection Services Division of fire alarm, sprinkler, smoke control and commercial cooking extinguisher systems installed within commercial and multifamily dwellings in the City of Rockville.

This facilitates a more

efficient review, tracking and follow-up process with building owners to correct deficiencies and maintain systems.

The system, which allows for accurate and timely inspection reporting and tracking of those fire-protection systems, has meant greater safety and protection for the community.

Of 656 premises that were inspected since the system's implementation, 90% were compliant.

Agencies: 'Strong Economic Characteristics' for the City, Expect Outlook to Remain Strong

Reaffirmation of Triple-A Bond Rating Will Save Taxpayers Money

Two rating agencies recently reaffirmed the city's triple-A bond rating and expressed confidence in Rockville's financial outlook.

Triple-A is the highest possible rating and saves Rockville taxpayers money by allowing the city to borrow at the lowest possible interest rates.

In awarding the rating, the agencies showed confidence in Rockville's ability to meet its financial obligations, cited the city's conservative fiscal management, strong policies and practices, ample reserve levels and stable tax base.

"Rockville has historically maintained a strong record of conservative budgeting and finances, in our view, due to a very strong management team with strong well-embedded, formal financial-management policies and practices under our Financial Management Assessment (FMA) methodology, as well as very

strong economic characteristics," Standard & Poor's said in its ratings report.

Moodys Investors Service expects the city's rating outlook to remain strong. "The stable outlook reflects Moody's expectation that the city's credit profile will remain in line with the Aaa rating category due to prudent financial management, a strong local economy, and moderate long-term liabilities," Moody's said in its report.

"The city's finance staff take pride in the prudent and responsible management of city finances and celebrate this strong rating announcement," Stacey Webster, the city's chief financial officer, said in an email to the Mayor and Council, reporting the ratings. "Finance staff will continue to promote strong financial management policies and will continue to provide guidance and recommendations

that will keep the city on a path of financial stability."

On Oct. 19, the city sold \$11.2 million in general obligation bonds to TD Securities at a 3.74% interest rate. The bond proceeds will finance ongoing water main rehabilitation and improvements citywide; advanced water meter infrastructure implementation and replacements; upgrades and expansion of the District of Columbia Water and Sewer Authority's Blue Plains Wastewater Treatment Plant, which treats the city's wastewater; and stream restoration and improvements at the Croydon Creek and Calvin Park tributary stream to Rock Creek.





Don't Let a Clog Become an Unwanted Holiday Guest

When the holiday feast is finished, don't pour fats, oils and grease, i.e., FOG, down the drain.

FOG, including sauces, gravy and salad dressings, can trap solids, form hard deposits and clog pipes, causing basement backups, sewer overflows and costly damage to city infrastructure and private property.

Before washing dishes, scrape food and grease into a trash can, use a paper towel to wipe away oil, or pour FOG into an empty can, let it cool to solidify and dispose of it.



Recycle the Rockville Way This America Recycles Day

America Recycles Day is Tuesday, Nov. 15.

The 26th annual day of awareness, sponsored by Keep America Beautiful, encourages community members to visit america recyclesday.org and take the #BeRecycled pledge to commit to recycling. The national recycling rate has increased from less than 7% in 1960 to the current rate of 34%, according to Keep America Beautiful. Rockville's recycling rate is 42%.

At the 2020 America

Recycles Summit, the Environmental Protection Agency announced a first-ever national recycling goal of 50% by 2030.

Rockville also recycles air conditioners, water heaters, refrigerators (with doors removed), grills, lawn mowers and more. For a complete list, select "Electronics & Metal" from the sidebar of the recycling webpage. Other special collection items include:

Bulk refuse, for which Rockville provides six special collections per household per calendar year of items such as wooden furniture, fencing, landscape ties and construction debris.

Electronics, such as televisions, computers, printers, small electronics, cords and cables.

The city will not accept materials for recycling that are in plastic bags or that contain plastic bags. Many grocery or retail stores offer plastic bag collection bins near their entrances. Find a drop-off location at bit.ly/howtorecyclebags.

Call 240-314-8568 or email refuse@rockvillemd.gov to schedule a special collection, start service, get a larger recycling cart, report a missed collection, verify collection schedules or ask a question.

Be Cart Smart

When setting carts out for recycling and trash collection, remember to place carts in the street along the curb in front of your property. Along busy streets, where carts in the street could pose a hazard, place carts adjacent to, but not in, the street, such as in the grass buffer between the sidewalk and street or, in locations where there is no buffer, behind the sidewalk. In all cases, carts should not be placed in the sidewalk because it impedes the path of pedestrians and can be particularly hazardous for those who use a wheelchair and cannot navigate around or move the carts. 💠

City Debuts New Food Scraps Compost Drop-Off

Rockville is piloting a food scraps drop-off program to make composting easy, keep valuable materials out of landfills and reduce excessive greenhouse gas emissions.

Food scraps will be picked up weekly by a commercial contractor and delivered to the Prince George's County Organic Compost Facility.

How To Use the Drop-Off


- 1. Place food scraps in an airtight container. (Empty coffee containers with sealing lids are great for this.) Be sure to remove any plastic or other trash.
- 2. Bring full containers and empty them into the designated green bins at the Food Scraps Compost Drop-Off area at the city's maintenance facility at

14625 Rothgeb Drive. View the map below and follow the signs when you arrive. The site is accessible 24/7 and the service is free of charge.

3. Rinse your container and repeat!

Smarter Parking as New Meters Debut in Two City Neighborhoods

Smart parking meters that allow motorists to pay by multiple methods and are environmentally friendly are debuting this fall in two Rockville neighborhoods.

The City of Rockville has teamed up with IPS Group to replace 300 parking meters in Town Center and Twinbrook with the new smart meters.

Baltimore Road Partially Resurfaced as Corridor Improvements Continue

With the first section of roadway resurfacing on Baltimore Road complete, construction of a shared-use path near Rockville High School is next up as work continues along the corridor between Rockville Town Center and the city's east side.

Upcoming work includes installing signage between First Street and Edmonston Drive, and continuing the installation of storm drain structure and pipe between Edmonston Drive and Avery Road.

City Launches Reimbursement Program for Resident Flood Mitigation Projects

The City of Rockville is piloting a Flood Mitigation Assistance Program to reimburse residents and property owners for property improvements intended to mitigate future damage from flooding.

The matching reimbursement funds will provide up to 50% of the total costs of approved mitigation measures, up to \$5,000. The city has allocated a total of \$300,000 for the program. Funds will be distributed on a first-come, first-served

Examples of eligible practices include floodproofing windows, flood gates, "sandless sandbags," battery-powered sump pumps, modifying topography, elevating utilities, flood alert systems

and flood-resistant building materials.

Who May Apply

• Residential and commercial properties, including homeowner associations and condominium associations. Condominium associations or homeowner associations may only apply for improvements to commonly owned property areas and must provide proof of approval by the association's governing board.

• Renters may only apply with documentation of approval from the property owner.

Eligibility Criteria

- Work must be completed before applying.
- Applicant must provide itemized receipts for purchase and/or installation for eligible expenses.
- Eligible expenses must be incurred on or after July 1, 2019.
- Applicant must provide photographic evidence that measures have already been installed.
- All applicable permits and approvals must be obtained and submitted with the application.
- Applicants must confirm that their project and/or installation will not adversely affect neighboring property by increasing or blocking stormwater flow.
- Applicants must execute the City Waiver Agreement included in the application.

Charter Review Commission to Present Recommendations to Mayor and Council

Rockville's Charter Review Commission is scheduled to present a report this month that outlines recommendations about the makeup of the Mayor and Council, how the city conducts elections, operations of the city's Board of Supervisors of Elections, and how to increase voter turnout.

The commission is scheduled to present its report during the Mayor and Council meeting at 7 p.m. Monday, Nov. 21.

In 2021, the Mayor and Council appointed 11 commissioners to review the city charter, with a focus on examining city elections.

The report, which the commission submitted to Mayor and Council on Sept. 30, can be found at www.rockvillemd.gov/Charter-Review-Commission. It is the result of over 40 public meetings of the commission and an online questionnaire that earlier this year asked city residents for ideas about how to increase voter turnout, update the city's election process and engage more communities.


About 70% of registered voters in Rockville did not vote in the city's 2019 election. The next city election is in November 2023.

Every decade or so, the Charter Review Commission examines ways to update the charter so that it best serves all residents. The charter is a legal document like a constitution. 
continued from pg. 1... include features and amenities interwoven with the natural habitat areas, including a new visitor center, community gardens, picnic area, playground, dog park and amphitheater.

Over time, the entire park will be developed as an arboretum to feature arboretum plant and tree specimens and collections. Interpretive signage will be integrated into natural environments and park features with access along the pathway network.

Park features will be implemented in phases, particularly parkwide enhancements such as new forest, feature landscapes, collections associated with the arboretum and improvements to the pathway network.

Plans for the park were developed based on the city's strategic plan for recreation and parks; considerable engagement with, and feedback from, the community; input from the Mayor and Council; and environmental constraints of natural features at the park.

Rakin' Round Two — We'll Vacuum Leaves for You Second Pass for Leaf Collection Begins This Month

Rockville crews are vacuuming leaves from neighborhood curbs, with the second of two collection rounds beginning Monday, Nov. 21.

Rake leaves next to, but out of, roadways, gutters and bike lanes, and away from parked vehicles. Leaves should be raked by 6 a.m. on the first day of their collection period, but no earlier than one week before the collection dates to avoid grass damage or fire hazards. Remove sticks and other objects from leaf piles. Avoid

parking near leaf piles or other vehicles.

Green Yard Tips

Consider environmentally friendly alternatives to raking, including leaving some leaves where they fall or using them as mulch in garden beds, where they provide natural habitat for beneficial insects. Mowing over the leaves can break them into tiny pieces that can filter into the grass, providing muchneeded nutrients. Or consider composting leaves at home with other yard trimmings. ‡
