Nov. 7 Election Ballot to Include Four Advisory Referendum Questions

Along with a list of candidates vying for an expanded number of council seats and a mayor, four advisory referendum questions will also be on the Nov. 7 Mayor and Council election ballot.

Voters will have the opportunity to choose "yes," "no" or "no opinion" on the following:

- **Voting Age:** *Voters in the city's* election must be 18 or older to vote. Should Rockville allow 16and 17-year-olds to vote in city elections?
- Non-Citizen Voting: Only U.S. citizens who live in Rockville can vote in city elections. Should Rockville allow city residents without U.S. citizenship to vote?
- Term Limits: Mayor and Council members have no limits on the number of four-year terms they can serve. Should elected officials be limited to three consecutive terms?
- Representative Districts: Councilmembers are elected at large, meaning all registered city voters vote for all six councilmembers. Should the city be divided into representative districts to elect some, or all, of the six councilmembers?

The nonbinding advisory questions — meaning they allow voters to express a preference without resulting in a change to Rockville law - are based on recommendations from the Charter Review Commission.

The Mayor and Council may consider voters' preferences on the ballot questions should they choose to change the city's election law.

In this election, voters will have the opportunity to elect seven members of the city's elected body — a mayor and six council members — following a unanimous vote Feb. 6 by the Mayor and Council on a charter amendment resolution to add two seats to the

The Mayor and Council will hold a public hearing during their Monday, Sept. 11 meeting on a charter amendment to modify the procedure for adopting ordinances by increasing the number of councilmembers needed to request a public hearing on an ordinance when introduced, and increasing the number of councilmembers needed to vote in favor of waiving layover and agenda requirements



to adopt an ordinance.

Ballots will be mailed to all registered voters who live within Rockville city limits.

All ballots must be received by 8 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 7. Voters will be able to vote by mail, in person at the two Election Day Vote Centers on Nov. 7, or at an election drop box.

Voters can cast their ballots in person at vote centers on Election Day, Nov. 7, at either City Hall, 111 Maryland Ave., or Thomas Farm Community Center, 700 Fallsgrove Drive. Vote centers will be open 7 a.m.-8 p.m. on Election Day only.

If voting by mail, voters can return their ballots in the provided envelope by prepaid mail or by delivering them to a secure ballot drop box.

Voters will be able to drop their ballots at boxes inside the Rockville Senior Center, 1150 Carnation Drive; Lincoln Park Community Center, 357 Frederick Ave.; Twinbrook Community Recreation Center, 12920 Twinbrook Parkway; and Thomas Farm Community Center, 700 Fallsgrove Drive. The boxes will be available during center hours.

In addition to a drop box outside City Hall, voters will be able to drop their ballot at a drop box outside Montrose Community Center, 451 Congressional Lane. Both will be available 24/7, beginning in late September or early October.

Rockville Turns September Purple in Fight for Opioid Awareness

In their ongoing fight to bring awareness to the national impact of opioid addiction and signal hope for recovery, Rockville's Mayor and Council proclaimed September as National Recovery Month at their Monday, Aug. 7 meeting.

The theme for National Recovery Month is "Recovery is for Everyone: Every Person, Every Family, Every Community."

The proclamation states that: "The Rockville Goes Purple initiative is increasing awareness of the dangers of opioids and other substances, and strives to reduce the number of lives lost to drug addiction in our community."

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported that deaths from drug overdoses reached 107,622 nationwide in 2021, an increase of nearly 15% from the 93,655 deaths estimated in 2020, and 108,500 in 2022, "a staggering record that reflects the crisis and the continued spread of the synthetic opioid fentanyl in the

Radon Rental Testing Requirement to Begin This Month

An ordinance that will require specific rental properties in the city to be tested for the presence of radon will go into effect Sept. 27.

Radon is an invisible, odorless, tasteless, radioactive gas found in soil and rock, formed by the natural decay of uranium. While no immediate symptoms signal its presence, exposure at high levels can cause cancer. Testing is the only way to know a home's radon levels.

The testing requirement will apply to all units in a rental facility in contact with the ground, including basement apartments and any dwelling unit with a basement, crawl spaces or units built on a slab in contact with the ground.

Landlords will be required to conduct a radon test before leasing a qualifying dwelling unit.

The legislation also addresses instances when tenants can have their rental unit tested for radon. If the test results are above the 4 picocuries per liter standard, the tenant must report the test results to the landlord in writing. Landlords must initiate a follow-up radon test within 14 days to confirm radon levels. If confirmed, the landlord must take steps to reduce the radon level within safe parameters and provide tenants a copy of test results indicating levels have been reduced.

A tenant has the right to terminate the lease without the loss of a security deposit if the landlord fails to mitigate the issue.

Propose a Project to Improve Your Neighborhood

The city is seeking input from community members about Rockville's Capital Improvements Program for Fiscal Year 2025-2029.

The CIP lays out how Rockville plans to invest funding over a five-year period for capital projects such as parks, roads, buildings and other infrastructure. As Rockville begins preparations for the Fiscal Year 2025 budget process, which begins July 1, 2024, residents are encouraged to tell the city about the condition of streets and parks, and help plan new facilities or infrastructure upgrades to meet community needs.

To tell the city what capital projects are needed in your neighborhood, complete and submit the form at www.rockvillemd.gov/Propose-a-Project by Friday, Sept. 15.

Proposals cannot serve a private purpose or be located on private property and should have an equal, accessible benefit to all community members. If submitted on behalf of a neighborhood group, the proposal should be discussed and agreed on by the neighborhood group before submission. Neighborhood groups can provide the Mayor and Council with formal input about a project submission at any time during the budget process via a letter, email or online budget survey, or by addressing the Mayor and Council at a bud-

A summary of all proposals submitted will be provided to the Mayor and Council, the city manager and applicable city department staff, and will be included as part of the public record, beginning with the first budget public hearing in the fall. 

City to Plant More Than 1,000 Trees at RedGate Park with Chesapeake **Bay Trust Grant Money**

The Chesapeake Bay Trust has awarded Rockville an Urban Trees Award Program grant of \$199,930 to plant more than 1,000 trees and 500 shrubs in RedGate Park to reforest the area, as approved in the Mayor and Council's RedGate Master

The city has until May 1, 2026, to use the funds.

At 131 acres, RedGate, located at 14500 Avery Road, is a former golf course converted to park use, and one of 67 parks in the City of Rockville.

In 2018, following the course's closure, the Mayor and Council voted unanimously to keep the open space as a park, with a lengthy period of community engagement to determine what facilities should be planned for the future.

illegal narcotic supply," the proclamation states.

Lights at City Hall, the Rockville City Police Department headquarters and other city and county facilities will once again shine purple throughout the month.

The theme of the campaign is "Opioids: Let's Talk About It," which encourages dialogue about, and openness around, the problems of opioid addiction, and awareness about the dangers of stigmatizing addiction.

The Rockville City Police Department responded to 24 reports of heroin or opioid overdoses in 2022, a 31% decrease from 2021, and three reports of heroin or opioid possession, the same number as in 2021. There were three reports of opioid

Zoning Ordinance Rewrite to Kick Off Soon

A comprehensive rewrite of Rockville's zoning ordinance will be underway soon to modernize city code in a way that accommodates the changing living, working and lifestyle choices of residents in the 21st century.

The Mayor and Council approved a contract June 13 with ZoneCo to assist the city with rewriting the zoning ordinance in chapter 25 of city code. The

current zoning ordinance was adopted in 2009.

The project, expected to be completed in the next 18-24 months, will include ways for the public to be engaged.

The purpose of the project is to:

- Implement recommendations of the Rockville 2040 $\,$ Comprehensive Plan.
- Accomplish goals from the FAST initiative — making

the development review and permitting process Faster, Accountable, Smarter and Transparent.

- Incorporate the best practices of planning and zoning.
- Create an easily understood, accessible and organized document.

The city is seeking community input as work on Rockville's first Pedestrian Master Plan continues this fall.

The plan will guide the development, construction and maintenance of safe, convenient, and equitable walking and rolling facilities across the city. Walking and rolling describes mobility that does not use motor vehicles, e-scooters or bicycles. This includes walking with or without a white cane, audio-assistance device or walker; running; or using a wheelchair, knee-walker, mobility scooter or stroller.



- Spicebush (Lindera benzoin).

Human Rights Commission Seeks Student Ambassadors

Rockville's Human Rights Commission is seeking 10 students to serve as HRC Student Ambassadors in its fifth annual Student Ambassador Program.

Ambassadors will serve as liaisons between the HRC and their high schools. The program will accept two students each from Richard Montgomery, Rockville and Thomas S. Wootton high schools, and four students who attend other Rockville high schools or who live in Rockville but attend high schools outside Rockville. Students must be 10th-, 11th-, or 12th-graders. 



Citywide Streetlight Replacement to Begin This Fall

Rockville will begin work this fall on the first phase of a citywide project to replace streetlights owned and maintained by the city with energy-efficient light-emitting diode fixtures.

The project's first phase includes replacing approximately 2,000 fixtures of the more common types, including colonial, contemporary and cobra-head fixtures. The city will replace other decorative fixtures as a later phase of the project. Streetlights that are owned and maintained by the city are located on metal or fiberglass poles and are fed by underground power. Streetlights owned and maintained by Pepco are

located on wooden utility poles and are fed by overhead power.

The Mayor and Council awarded the roughly \$1 million project contract Aug. 7 to Lighting Maintenance, Inc. The city is funding nearly \$675,000 of the project through a grant award from the Maryland Energy Administration and from Pepco's EmPowerMD rebates.

The project supports energy efficiency efforts that are part of Rockville's Climate Action Plan. LEDs offer reduced greenhouse gas emissions and save tax dollars through lower energy and maintenance costs. **‡**

Rockville Awarded Grant to Study Historic City Sites

The Maryland Heritage Areas Authority has awarded the City of Rockville grant funding to study the Avery Road Colored Cemetery and Benjamin Franklin Smith Family Homestead, located within the footprint of today's Croydon Creek Nature Center and John G. Hayes Forest Preserve.


The city was awarded \$16,941 to hire a consultant to perform historical background research and use ground-penetrating radar to document what remains below ground connected to Benjamin Franklin Smith, his family and the sites' development.

This nondestructive approach will seek to discover what lies beneath the areas, including burial sites, funerary objects, architectural relics, and stone tools, arrowheads or other artifacts. Survey findings will assist with a second phase of the project to provide overall site interpretation of the Smith homestead and cemetery

The sites were once part of Bowie's Glenview Estate. The Bowies used the labor of enslaved Black people, including Smith, to operate the plantation. Up to 31 enslaved people were used to clear forested areas, for farming, and in the family home's upkeep and operation.

The plantation was comprised of the Bowie residence, farm fields, a chapel and cemetery slave quarters, a slave cemetery, and timberlands. In 1884, per Bowie's final wishes, the lands were deeded to Smith, who developed a homestead and an adjacent family burial plot.

One-hundred grants were awarded to state nonprofits, local jurisdictions and other heritage tourism organizations, totaling \$5 million. 🕈



The ceremony, which is free and open to the public, will include a presentation of colors and remarks by Rockville Mayor Bridget Donnell Newton.

The 9/11 memorial at Courthouse Square Park remembers the 11 Montgomery County residents who lost their lives on Sept. 11: William Edward Caswell, Dr. Gerald Paul Fisher, Capt. Lawrence D. Getzfred, Michele M. Heidenberger, Angela Marie Houtz, Teddington Hamm Moy, Lt. Darin H. Pontell, Scott A. Powell, Todd Hayes Reuben, Patricia J. Statz and Ernest M. Willcher.

The memorial, commissioned by the Montgomery County Arts and Humanities Council and designed by artists Gene and Susan Flores, includes a grassy area circled by 11 benches - one dedicated to each victim, with an inscription related to that person's character. It also includes a plaque, covered by two doors, bearing the victims' names. The artists worked with astronomers to design the memorial so that on Sept. 11 the morning sun briefly illuminates each name. 💠
