F. Scott Theater to Close for Upgrades to Accessibility, Sound

The F. Scott Fitzgerald Theatre and its social hall will close for nine months in late December for renovations that will improve accessibility and sound.

The venue will close Tuesday, Dec. 17 and reopen Sept. 1, 2025.

City's Climate Action Projects Get a Boost from Grants

The summer saw Rockville receive grants that will allow the city to continue progress on its Climate Action Plan.

The Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments Transportation Planning Board approved \$371,000 for the city to install up to four bikeshare stations in Twinbrook and \$324,000 for design and installation of up to four electric vehicle charging stations in rights of way at 735 Monroe St. and 504 Blandford St., and at the Rockville Swim and Fitness Center and the Rockville Senior Center. The funding, resulting from the \$1 trillion federal infrastructure legislation passed in

2021, and administered under the Maryland Department of Transportation's Carbon Reduction Program, will expand access to bikeshare and to EV charging for residents without access to chargers at home.

A \$134,000 grant through the U.S. Department of Energy's Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant will be used to install solar panels on the gym rooftop at Lincoln Park Community Center and replace a landscape equipment trailer with a trailer capable of charging electric landscaping equipment, to better comply with a county law to reduce air and noise pollution from yard

Last Chance to Propose a Neighborhood Project

This month is the deadline for community members to propose neighborhood improvement projects to be considered as part of the Capital Improvements Program during the upcoming budget season.

To tell the city what capital projects are needed in your neighborhood, complete and submit the form at www.rockvillemd.gov/ Propose-a-Project by Friday, Sept. 13.

The city's CIP lays out how Rockville plans to invest, over a five-year period, in projects such as parks, roads, buildings and other infrastructure. As Rockville begins preparations for the budget process for Fiscal Year 2026, which begins July 1, 2025, residents are encouraged to tell the city about the condition of streets and parks and help plan new facilities or infrastructure upgrades to meet community needs.

Proposals cannot serve a private purpose or be located on private property and should have an equal, accessible benefit to all community members. If submitted on behalf of a neighborhood group, the proposal should be discussed and agreed on by the neighborhood group before submission. Neighborhood groups can provide the Mayor and Council with formal input about a project submission at any time during the budget process via a letter, email or online budget survey, or by addressing the Mayor and Council at a budget public hearing.

A summary of all proposals submitted will be provided to the Mayor and Council, the city manager and applicable city department staff, and will be included as part of the public record, beginning with the first budget public hearing in the fall. Potential Beall Avenue Improvements Herald Art Project for Roadway Safety

Depending on fall weather, roadway improvements could be coming soon along Beall Avenue, dramatically changing the look of the street for drivers, riders and pedestrians.

Rockville, in partnership with VisArts, was among 25 cities in the U.S., Canada and Mexico chosen from an extensive pool of 200 applicants that have been awarded Asphalt Art Initiative grants through Bloomberg Philanthropies. A \$25,000 grant from the Bloomberg Asphalt Art Initiative will be used for the project in addition to Rockville's Art in Public Places funding.

The grant will be used to enhance Beall Avenue between Maryland Avenue and North Washington Street in Rockville Town Center.

The project, which is the first of its kind for the city, aims to improve safety and make the street more attractive for residents, visitors and businesses through a mural created directly in the street.

Fall Outreach Coming for Zoning Ordinance Update

Public outreach will begin this fall on an update to the zoning ordinance. Public outreach meetings will be held to present the zoning diagnostic report and calibration tables for the project. Among recommendations outlined in the report is an emphasis on the need for a streamlined development review process and clearer, more understandable language in the zoning ordinance.

New development and design standards will be necessary to promote housing variety while maintaining compatibility with existing neighborhoods. The report also proposes new standards for open spaces, neighborhood amenities and specific "community nodes."

The Rockville 2040 Comprehensive Plan recommends a significant focus on development around high-capacity transit stations and reconsidered minimums for parking in these areas. The zoning ordinance rewrite will implement changes to the zoning map as recommended in the Rockville 2040 Comprehensive Plan.

The Maryland Energy Administration awarded Rockville four grants through a program for clean energy projects. They include \$130,000 to convert approximately 650 streetlights to LED fixtures, up to \$48,000 for up to eight EV charging ports for city fleet vehicles at the city's maintenance facility on Rothgeb Drive and the Recreation Services Building at Rockville Civic Center Park, and up to \$63,000 toward LED lighting upgrades at Thomas Farm Community Center. MEA will also provide up to \$10,000 for a solar consultant to evaluate city-owned property to identify facilities where solar energy systems could be installed.

From July 2023 to June 2024, Maryland had 2,030 overdose deaths, of which 1,763 were opioids related. Montgomery County had 93 overdose deaths, 71 related to opioids.

Summer of Safety: Advancing Vision Zero Projects for Rockville Roadways

Rockville advanced several Vision Zero projects this summer, including a study of potential safety improvements to Mannakee Street, construction of a sidewalk along West Gude Drive and a shared-use path along Scott and Veirs drives.

The projects are part of the city's Vision Zero Action Plan to eliminate traffic-related deaths and serious injuries.

In July, city staff completed the Mannakee Street Complete Streets Study. The feasibility study, funded by the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments' Transportation Land-Use Connections Program, proposes roadway improvements, bicycle and pedestrian facilities, and traffic-calming measures to reduce speeding vehicles. A Complete Streets approach identifies potential improvements to help people drive, walk, roll, bike and use transit more safely. The city has already completed some of the proposed improvements at the intersection of Mannakee Street and Smallwood Road, and will continue to evaluate the proposed improvements to identify which can be completed

soon or as part of other ongoing roadway improvement projects.

The city also completed construction of a new sidewalk on the north side of West Gude Drive from MD 355 to Watkins Pond Boulevard. Replanting of the willow oak trees removed during construction is scheduled for this fall.

COG's Transportation Planning Board in July approved a \$200,000 grant for the design of a shared-use path along Scott and Veirs drives, between the city boundary and Wootton Parkway, with a connection to the Carl Henn Millennium Trail. This shared use path will be one component of a Bikeway Master Plan "Crosstown Route."

The board also approved a \$371,000 grant for the city to install up to four bikeshare stations in Twinbrook as part of the Maryland Department of Transportation's Carbon Reduction Program.



Grants and Rebates Aid Energy-Efficient Lighting Upgrades at City Facilities

A state grant is helping Rockville meet the goals of its Climate Action Plan with funding to convert city facilities to LED lighting.

Upgrades are in progress at the Rockville Senior Center and Twinbrook Community Recreation Center using grants from the Maryland Energy Administration's Maryland Smart Energy Communities program, and rebates from Pepco's Energy Savings for Business Program. Combined, the senior center and Twinbrook projects are using \$150,000 in state grants and \$74,000 in rebates.

LED upgrades are planned for Thomas Farm Community Center during Fiscal Year 2025, which ends June 30. The \$92,000 upgrade project would be paid for with up to \$63,000



from the state grant and a Pepco rebate of up to \$12,000.

The state grant program supports local governments, state agencies, nonprofits, educational institutions and communities pursuing clean energy policies and projects aimed at reducing energy usage and greenhouse gas emissions, increasing cost savings, and creating clean energy and economic development. The Thomas Farm project is expected to create \$10,868 in annual energy savings for Rockville.

The city completed similar upgrades to City Hall in 2023, using a \$50,000 MSEC grant and a \$57,000 Pepco rebate, and is already realizing cost savings through reduced energy use.

The LED upgrades are contributing to the city's Climate Action Plan goal of equitably reducing greenhouse gas emissions that cause climate change. The energy-efficient LED bulbs last up to 25 years and generate less carbon dioxide.

The Rockville City Police Department has once again been reaccredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies.

Accreditation is earned through a rigorous and comprehensive review of professional standards in law enforcement. RCPD has been an accredited law enforcement agency since 1994. 



Customers can receive a dollar-for-dollar match of up to \$20 weekly when they shop with SNAP/EBT (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program/ Electronic Benefits Transfer) and WIC-FVC (Women, Infants and Children-Fruit and Vegetable Checks) at the market.

Matching funds can be used to purchase locally grown and produced items including fruits, vegetables, meat, cheese, dairy, baked goods, eggs and honey. The program aims to fight hunger while investing directly in farmers, strengthening the local food system.

The City of Rockville will mark the 23rd anniversary of the Sept. 11 attacks and remember county residents who lost their lives with a ceremony at 9 a.m. Wednesday, Sept. 11 at Courthouse Square Park, at the corner of East Jefferson Street and Maryland Avenue in Rockville's downtown.

The ceremony, which is free and open to the public, will include a presentation of colors and remarks by Rockville Mayor Monique Ashton.

The 9/11 memorial at Courthouse Square Park remembers the 11 Montgomery County residents who lost their lives on Sept. 11: William E. Caswell, Dr. Gerald P. Fisher, Capt. Lawrence

D. Getzfred, Michele M. Heidenberger, Angela M. Houtz, Teddington H. Moy, Lt. Darin H. Pontell, Scott A. Powell, Todd H. Reuben, Patricia J. Statz and Ernest M. Willcher.

The memorial, commissioned by the Montgomery County Arts and Humanities Council and designed by artists Gene and Susan Flores, includes a grassy area circled by 11 benches - one dedicated to each victim, with an inscription related to that person's character. It also includes a plaque, covered by two doors, bearing the victims' names. The artists worked with astronomers to design the memorial so that on Sept. 11 the morning sun briefly illuminates each name. **‡**
