
The event recognizes International Overdose Awareness Day, a global initiative to raise awareness of overdoses and reduce the stigma of drug-related deaths and serves as a prelude to the observance of National Recovery Month.

expired prescription drugs, and hold a training on how to use the overdose drug Narcan, 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 25 at Thomas Farm Recreation



Rockville's Community Services Division and its community partners provide outreach, awareness and education throughout the year to support substance misuse prevention

and early intervention with support from the city's portion of the state's Opioid Litigation Settlement Fund Abatement

Plan.

The city will host a lunch and learn, noon-1 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 24, focused on substance use and prevention, featuring a speaker from

Tree of Hope, a recovery focused organization. Lunch will be provided. A location for the event is yet to be determined.

A Mayor and Council proclamation states that: "The Rockville Goes Purple initiative is increasing awareness of the dangers of opioids and other substances, and strives to reduce the number of lives lost to drug addiction in our community."

From July 2024 to June 2025, Maryland had 1,360 overdose deaths, of which 1,097 were opioid related. Montgomery County had 67 overdose deaths, 39 related to opioids.

Rockville Adopts SolarAPP+ to Speed Solar Permitting

Rockville has launched Solar Automated Permit Processing Plus, or SolarAPP+, a webbased platform that automates plan review and permitting for residential rooftop solar systems.

The pilot program, part of the city's Climate Action Plan, is intended to cut wait times, lower costs and streamline the permitting process for homeowners and installers of solar equipment.

Operated by the nonprofit SolarAPP Foundation, the platform was developed by the U.S. Department of Energy's National Renewable Energy Laboratory to automate code compliance checks for eligible systems.

More than 300 local governments nationwide use SolarAPP+ to improve efficiency, maintain safety standards and support local business. The platform is free for municipalities and integrates with existing permitting workflows. The platform allows jurisdictions to issue permits instantly, saving time and lowering installation costs.

Express Permits for Residential Projects To Be Available Online

The Department of Community Planning and Development Services will offer an online same-day process for eligible residential permits, starting Tuesday,

Applications will be accepted from 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Tuesdays. They will be checked for completeness on receipt. Those that are complete and have fees paid by 12:30 p.m. will be reviewed the same day.

If a project meets the program's parameters, the permit will be issued. Standard application fees apply. There is no additional charge for the express service. Applications that do not qualify will be placed in the regular review queue. Eligible projects include:

 Fences that do not require review from other departments or agencies. Eligible fences must not

require Department of Public Works or forestry review, cannot affect roadside trees, must not be in a drainage easement or in a floodplain and must not require Historic District Commission review.

- Heating, ventilation and air-conditioning units and furnaces that do not require HDC review.
- Water heaters.
- Accessory structures under 200 square feet that do not require other departmental or HDC review.

Accessory structures between 200 and 500 square feet that do not require review from other departments or HDC review. Accessory dwelling units are ineligible.

City Moves King Farm Farmstead Project Toward Master Plan Phase

Rockville is progressing with plans to revitalize the historic King Farm Farmstead with a draft master plan expected to be presented this fall.

At a July 14 work session, the Mayor and Council reviewed community-driven programming options and concepts for building use, presented by the Department of Recreation and Parks and the city's design consultant, Design Collective. The options were developed through a public engagement process that included surveys, visioning and filtering sessions, and concept feedback received from the community.

The session followed earlier guidance given in October 2024, when city leaders asked staff to explore viable building uses. Following the presentation, the Mayor

and Council directed staff to advance selected concepts into the next phase: economic analysis and construction cost estimation.

King Farm

A third work session is scheduled for Monday, Sept. 29, where a draft master plan for the site will be presented for review and further input.

Located in King Farm Farmstead Park, the site is one of Rockville's historic landmarks. The city's vision emphasizes adaptive reuse, historical preservation and activating the space for community benefit. Potential future uses include event spaces, community markets, art and makerspaces, and recreational programming.





Phase 2, a permitting and development services improvement effort; Housing Strategies, focused on affordable housing and housing supply; the Vision Zero Action Plan, aimed at eliminating traffic-related fatalities and serious injuries; and the Climate Action Plan, which outlines steps to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and improve climate resilience.

The dashboards allow users to explore overall plans and specific milestones, providing a clear look at where the city stands in improving service delivery and quality of life. The tool is designed to support the Mayor and Council's strategic goals and better communicate progress to residents and stakeholders.

Summer Successes for Vision Zero Improvements

City Completes Summer Projects, Prepares New Plans to Improve Safety

Rockville is wrapping up summer construction on Vision Zero improvements to Mannakee Street and Twinbrook Parkway.

Meanwhile, presentations to the Mayor and Council are planned for Monday, Sept. 8 on the Vision Zero Action Plan, and Monday, Sept. 29 on the annual report of the city's Transportation and Mobility Commission. Vision Zero is the city's initiative to eliminate traffic-related deaths and serious injuries.

The Vision Zero presentation will share a new map showing areas where a disproportionately high number of crashes causing fatalities or severe injuries occur, and will highlight ongoing and upcoming projects, including bike facilities, sidewalks, trafficalming projects and the upcoming Complete Streets study for Rollins Avenue.

Summer construction projects nearing completion include, on Mannakee Street:

- Restoration of a speed hump at 508 Mannakee St. to slow traffic.
- A pedestrian median at Henderson Circle.
- A raised crosswalk at the intersection with Carr Lane.
- A concrete refuge island to provide a place for pedestrians to wait while crossing at the intersection with Smallwood Road.

Other summer improvements included installation of a concrete refuge island on Twinbrook Parkway at Meadow Hall Drive and repaving of Mannakee Street and Twinbrook Parkway.

And EVs have lower operating costs and are easier to maintain (no oil changes!).

business through Switch Together, the DMV solar cooperative purchase program. Participants receive an approximately 20% discount on top of the 30% tax credit and receive technical assistance along the way. Sign up anytime and learn more at switchtogether.

Electric appliances and home efficiency: For residents ready to switch from gas to electric appliances or add extra insulation or efficient windows, some of these homeowner tax credits expire Dec. 31. The good news is a new Maryland discount program opens soon, and Montgomery County and Pepco discount/rebate programs can help offset costs now. Sustainable Fall Yard Care: From Leaves to Lawn



Fall is the perfect season to take environmentally friendly steps for a healthier, sustainable yard.

Plant native for birds and bees. Replace some of your lawn with native ground cover, wildflower gardens and native trees. Leave seeds and flower stalks up to help birds and bees make it through the winter. Learn more at rockvillemd.gov/backyardhabitats.

Leave the leaves for butterflies. Did you know that most native butterfly species do not migrate? They hibernate in leaves. Leave some leaves where they fall in garden beds or in a wild portion of your yard. Fallen leaves also help prevent weeds and protect the soil.

Ditch the lawn chemicals. Prep your lawn for winter by aerating the soil and adding grass seed. Remember, most weed and feed and synthetic pesticides are prohibited

in Rockville. Learn more about organic lawn care at montgomerycountymd. gov/lawns.

Stay alert and report non-native invasive pests, including:

Spotted lanternfly. In late September, these colorful pests begin laying egg masses that look like grayish, mud-like smears. You can help reduce the population by destroying egg masses found on trees, outdoor furniture, vehicles and elsewhere. Learn more at mda.maryland.gov/plants-pests/pages/spotted-lantern-fly.aspx.

Box tree moth. This moth is new to Maryland, feeds exclusively on boxwoods and can completely defoliate and kill the shrubs, so early detection is critical. Check boxwoods for damage, caterpillars or webbing. For photos and tips on reporting, visit extension.umd.edu/resource/box-tree-moth.


Demonstration to Help City Consider Parking Lanes on Redland Boulevard

A demonstration project beginning in mid-September will temporarily repurpose the outside travel lanes of Redland Boulevard as full-time parking lanes, allowing Rockville to study whether to establish the parking lanes permanently.

Signs, pavement markings and flexible posts delineating the parking lanes will be installed and remain in place through October. During that time, city staff will track motor vehicle speed and volume, and traffic congestion. After the six-week demonstration period, the city will remove the posts and signs, reverting to the current roadway, and will ask the community about the project's impact.

The addition of parking lanes is expected to encourage motorists to travel at the posted speed, making it more comfortable for pedestrians to cross Redland Boulevard and helping to address safety concerns expressed by King Farm residents.

If repurposing the lanes addresses the concerns, the city will consider a permanent project, which would still need to be planned and designed before construction.



The City of Rockville will mark the 24th anniversary of the Sept. I I attacks and remember county residents who lost their lives with a ceremony at 9 a.m. Thursday, Sept. I I at Courthouse Square Park, at the corner of East Jefferson Street and Maryland Avenue in Rockville's downtown.

The ceremony, which is free and open to the public, will include a presentation of colors and remarks by Rockville Mayor Monique Ashton.

The 9/11 memorial at Courthouse Square Park remembers the 11 Montgomery County residents who lost their lives on Sept. 11: William E. Caswell, Dr. Gerald P. Fisher, Capt. Lawrence D. Getzfred, Michele M. Heidenberger, Angela M. Houtz, Teddington H. Moy, Lt. Darin H. Pontell, Scott A. Powell, Todd H. Reuben, Patricia J. Statz and Ernest M. Willcher.

The memorial, commissioned by the Montgomery County Arts and Humanities Council and designed by artists Gene and Susan Flores, includes a grassy area circled by I I benches – one dedicated to each victim, with an inscription related to that person's character. It also includes a plaque, covered by two doors, bearing the victims' names. The artists worked with astronomers to design the memorial so that on Sept. I I the morning sun briefly illuminates each name.

Each year, the Maryland Police Training and Standards Commission evaluates RCPD's community policing program, including a thorough review of the department's written report and an independent assessment of ongoing RCPD initiatives. Over the past year, the department has strengthened its community policing strategies by:

State-certified mental health integration with a full-time mental health specialist embedded within the department's operations.

Expansion of youth outreach, including Shop with a Cop, partnering with county schools in the criminal justice/law enforcement program, and school talks.

Over 25 National Night Out events, "Coffee with a Cop" sessions and dozens of neighborhood civic meetings to foster meaningful connections.

Proactive programs like weekly "Code 18" deployments, Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design assessments and a steering wheel lock giveaway directly addressing crime concerns.

Enhanced training with courses in crisis intervention, Fair and Impartial Policing and more than 30 additional specialized programs to ensure professional, compassionate and equitable service.

Increased presence and accessibility through foot and bike patrols, station tours, public events, and vibrant social media engagement.

Broad and inclusive community partnerships that reach all segments of Rockville's population, from youth and seniors to faithbased businesses and special needs communities.

The commission's recognition of RCPD's efforts is a direct reflection of the daily commitment and collective efforts of city officers, civilian staff and leadership, Chief Jason West said. "The certification and praise received from the Maryland Police Training and Standards Commission affirms what we already know: Community policing is not just a strategy, it is at the core of who we are," he said.

Fall for Farm-Fresh Food at the Rockville Farmers Market



The Rockville Farmers Market offers fall produce and a dollar-for-dollar match, up to \$15, for customers using their federal nutrition benefits.

The market is open 9 a.m.-1 p.m. Saturdays through Nov. 22, in the jury parking lot at East Jefferson (MD 28) and Monroe streets in Rockville Town Center.

Fall offerings include apples, cider, gourds, potatoes and pumpkins. The market also features plants and flowers, baked goods, local beer and spirits, meat, and coffee.

Now in its 14th year, the Eat Fresh Rockville and Maryland Market Money program removes economic barriers for food-insecure shoppers by increasing access to fresh produce and increasing purchasing power. Customers can receive a dollar-for-dollar match of up to \$15 weekly when they shop with SNAP/EBT (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program/

Electronic Benefits Transfer) and WIC-FVC (Women, Infants and Children-Fruit and Vegetable Checks) at the market.

Matching funds can be used to purchase locally grown and produced items including fruits, vegetables, meat, cheese, dairy, baked goods, eggs and honey. The program aims to fight hunger while investing directly in farmers, strengthening the local food system. Customers can stop by the market tent, located at the market entrance, for more information.
