Rockville Names Dufek as Deputy Chief of Police

New Hire Brings 25 Years of Experience in Law Enforcement

has been named
the Rockville
City Police
Department's
deputy police
chief, Chief Jason
West announced.
He officially
joined the force on
Monday, Sept 29.

The new deputy chief was sworn

in Tuesday, Oct. 7 in the Mayor and Council chambers at City Hall.

Dufek brings 25 years of law enforcement experience to the role. He began his public safety career in Virginia as an emergency communications dispatcher before becoming a deputy sheriff at age 21.

Over the course of his career, Dufek has held roles in patrol, street crimes, traffic and motor units, internal affairs, background investigations, and criminal investigations. He has overseen both patrol operations and administrative functions, including property and evidence, quartermaster duties, and accreditation.

He also served as a team supervisor on the Critical Incident Response Team, a regional task force that investigates officer-involved shootings, in-custody deaths and officer suicides.



Dufek is a graduate of the FBI National Academy's 281st session and holds a master's degree in public safety from the University of Virginia. He has risen through the ranks in two Virginia agen-

cies, most recently serving as chief of police for the Town of Purcellville.

"What stands out most about Barry — and what I know will resonate with this team — is his sincere desire to listen first, support the team, and learn what makes Rockville — and the RCPD — unique," West said. "During the hiring process, it was his character that made him the absolute best fit for this position."

Rockville Gun Buyback Returns Nov. 15



Rockville offers an opportunity to dispose of unwanted firearms voluntarily, anonymously and safely with a gun buyback event from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 15 at RedGate Park, 14500 Avery Road.

The Rockville City Police Department, in partnership with the Montgomery County State's Attorney's Office, sponsors the event, which allows community members to voluntarily drive up and drop off firearms with no identification needed and no questions asked.

Community members will receive a \$100 gift card for functioning handguns, rifles, shotguns and privately made firearms, and a \$200 gift card for functioning assault weapons.

The buyback is not limited to Rockville residents. Gift card quantities are limited and sub-

ject to availability. RCPD will maintain the ultimate determination on the eligible firearms for gift card issuance and reserves the right to limit cards given to an individual, regardless of the number of weapons surrendered.

This is a drive-up event. No walk-ups. Attendees should transport weapons in their vehicle's trunk. Ammunition and black powder muzzleloaders will not be accepted. Weapons must be functional.

Rockville has had great success with three previous buyback events, with about 300 firearms turned in during each. Every gun turned in is one less gun that could be used in a serious crime, suicide or domestic violence incident, or be accidentally discharged by a child.

Defending Against the Dangers of Less Daylight: Tips for Driving, Biking and Walking

The end of daylight saving time on Sunday, Nov. 2, and the coming winter, mean less daylight and a reminder to use caution while driving, biking and walking on city streets.

A National Highway Traffic Safety Administration study found that in 2022 nearly 54% of all fatal crashes occurred at night. A 2018 study by AAA Mid-Atlantic found that crashes in the Washington metropolitan area involving pedestrians on roads and walking paths peaked in October (284), November (292) and December (288).

AAA provides the following safety tips for drivers, bicyclists and pedestrians.

Tips for Drivers:

- Slow down.
- Turn on headlights for increased visibility during early morning and evening hours.
- Keep vehicle headlights and windows (inside and out) clean.
- Do not use high beams when other cars or pedestrians are around.
- Yield the right of way to pedestrians in crosswalks. Do not pass vehicles stopped at crosswalks.

Tips for Pedestrians and Bicyclists:

- Cross only at intersections. Look left, right and left again and only cross when it is clear.
- Cross at the corner not in the middle of the street or between parked cars.
- If you must walk on a road that does not have sidewalks, walk facing traffic.
- Evaluate the distance and speed of oncoming traffic before you step into the street.
- Avoid listening to music or listen at a low volume so you can hear motor vehicles approaching.
- Bicycle lights are a must-have item for safe night riding, especially during the winter months when it gets dark earlier.



Mayor and Council Set 2026 State Legislative Priorities

General Assembly Session to Run Jan. 14-April 13

The Mayor and Council have determined which priorities for Rockville they will advocate for during the upcoming 2026 session of the Maryland General Assembly, which will convene Wednesday, Jan. 14 in Annapolis.

The city's elected leaders' priorities include expanding access to affordable housing and property tax relief; improving pedestrian and traffic safety; preserving state aid for infrastructure and police protection; securing funding for schools and senior services; strengthening tenant protections; and supporting legislation that advances equity, climate action and public health.

The legislative session will run until Monday, April 13. Rockville will advocate for:

Expanded access to the State Homeowners' Property Tax Credit for low-income households, including those with seniors and people with disabilities, to provide relief from inflationary and cost-ofliving increases.

State funding for education from birth through community college, including both capital and operating support. Rockville will also push for a fair share of funding to implement the Blueprint for

Maryland's Future to prevent increased class sizes and potential furloughs and layoffs.

Youth Bureau Services funding restoration and support for at-risk youth, including expanded out-of-school programming and access to restorative justice services for repeat youth offenders.

Increased investment in senior services, such as neighborhood transportation, in-place aging support, wellness outreach and neighborhood-based programs.

Preservation of key state funding streams such as Highway User Revenue and state aid for police protection, which is crucial for local safety and infrastructure.

Stronger tenant protections, including legislation to prevent no-fault evictions, require transparency of rental fee history, and limit opaque algorithmic rent-setting without human

Support for Vision Zero and the city's Pedestrian Master Plan, including:

- A comparative negligence statute enabling injured pedestrians to recover proportional damages.
- Clear responsibilities for state maintenance of sidewalks and streetlights on

- "Don't Block the Box" legislation and authority for local stop sign monitoring in school zones.
- Support for regional transit authorities and Complete Streets project improvements along Rockville Pike (MD 355), Veirs Mill Road and other high-risk corridors.

The Mayor and Council adopted a Vision Zero plan in 2020 to eliminate traffic- and pedestrian-related deaths and serious injuries. Learn more at www. rockvillemd.gov/visionzero.

Modernizing municipal revenue authority, including a Maryland Municipal Leaguebacked proposal that allows cities to impose a local food and beverage fee (up to 3%) under the Admission and Amusement Tax framework.

Support for climate action and resilience legislation, consistent with Rockville's Climate Action Plan, to reduce emissions, promote equity and improve resilience.

Support for public health access, including equitable vaccine delivery and protections for the health care safety net.

- \$570,000 for each pedestrian bridge replacement at Twinbrook and Dogwood to schools and community spaces.
- \$150,000 for construction of a gender-neutral, accessible restroom at Mattie J.T. Stepanek Park.

In addition to the city's priority items, the Mayor and Council will be monitoring legislation involving invasive and native species management (for example, spotted lanternfly mitigation); financial empowerment and tenant-related measures; land-use authority and development review processes; and enhancements to pedestrian, bicycle and transportation safety.

Don't Let a Clog Become an Unwanted Holiday Guest

When the holiday feast is finished, don't pour fats, oils and grease, i.e., FOG, down the drain.

FOG, including sauces, gravy and salad dressings, can trap solids, form hard deposits and clog pipes, causing basement backups, sewer overflows and costly damage to city infrastructure and private property.

Before washing dishes, scrape food and grease into a trash can, use a paper towel to wipe away oil, or pour FOG into an empty can and let it cool to solidify for disposal.

'Tree-Bates': Get \$150 for Planting Native Trees

Rockville residents can receive a \$150 rebate per tree from the city for planting native trees under the RainScapes Rebate program.

Native trees are beautiful, provide important habitat for birds and other wildlife, and help absorb stormwater runoff and pollutants.

Eligible properties including single-family and townhome residences, homeowners associations, condominium associations, religious institutions, private schools and other nonprofits.

The city is proud to partner with the Chesapeake Bay Trust on the RainScapes Rebate program, which also offers rebates for permeable paver retrofits, rain barrels, native-planting projects and pavement removal. Residents can receive up to a maximum of \$5,000 in rebates across all RainScapes Rebate options. Learn more at www.rockvillemd.gov/rainscapes.

Need ideas for trees to plant? You can usually find these native trees at local nurseries or online:

Fruit Trees

Serviceberry (Amelanchier spp.). American persimmon (Diospyros virginiana).

American plum (Prunus americana).

Small Trees

White fringe tree (Chionanthus virginicus). Flowering dogwood (Cornus florida). Eastern redbud (Cercis canadensis)

Shade Trees

Red oak (Quercus rubra). River birch (Betula nigra). Black tupelo (Nyssa sylvatica).

City Horticulture Crew Turns Yard Waste into Valuable Compost



Yvette Lindler, a member of Rockville's horticulture crew, took the lead in creating a composting program for yard waste the crew generates. Instead of sending spent flowers and plant material to the dump, the team is transforming

the waste into nutrient-rich compost that will help nourish the city's planting beds.

Rockville's horticulture crew provides care and maintenance that keeps the city's parks and public spaces beautiful, overseeing land-scaping, planting and maintaining flower beds throughout Rockville's parks and streetscapes.

The composting initiative not only provides valuable additives that improve the soil, it saves time and public funds previously spent on waste disposal.

The project has also been a hands-on learning experience for the crew, who are gaining practical knowledge about composting best practices, such as what materials to include, how to rotate and water the pile, and how to monitor compost temperature for optimal results.

City Urges Public to Help Protect Young Trees From Vandalism



Damage has been reported to protective equipment installed around newly planted trees in Rockville parks and rights of way. Examples include cut tree stakes and deer cages being removed.

These protective measures are essential, as stakes

provide support to help trees grow straight and stable during early development; deer cages prevent bark damage caused by buck rubbing, which can seriously injure or kill a tree.

Do not tamper with or remove any tree protection.



Leave the Leaves to Us

Second Pass for Leaf Collection Begins This Month

Rockville crews are vacuuming leaves from neighborhood curbs, with the second of two collection rounds beginning Monday, Nov. 17.

Rake leaves next to, but out of, roadways, gutters and bike lanes, and away from parked vehicles. Leaves should be raked by 6 a.m. on the first day of their collection period, but no earlier than one week before the collection dates to avoid grass damage or fire hazards. Remove sticks and other objects from leaf piles. Avoid parking near leaf piles or other vehicles.

Sustainable Leaf Tips

- Leave some leaves where they fall or rake into garden beds to serve as natural mulch and habitat for beneficial insects that overwinter in leaves, such as butterflies, fireflies and native bees. Learn more about helping wildlife at rockvillemd.gov/backyardhabitats.
- Mow over leaves to break them up into tiny pieces that can filter into the grass, providing muchneeded nutrients.
- Compost leaves at home with other yard trimmings.

Act Now: Clean Energy Tax Credits End at Year's End

Federal tax credits on electric appliances and solar panels expire at year's end and now's the time to apply to take advantage of them while you still can.

Solar: There's still time to take advantage of lower prices for residential solar leases, even though the opportunity to claim federal solar tax credits for directly purchased systems has ended. Systems must be fully permitted, installed, interconnected and operational by Wednesday, Dec. 31. Leased residential solar panels are considered commercial tax credits since the installer claims them, lowering your lease rates. Commercial/leased residential projects must be under construction by Saturday, July 4, but new restrictions apply after Thursday, Jan. 1. Consider signing on to solar now

while supplies last.

Electric appliances and home efficiency: For residents switching from gas to electric appliances, or adding extra insulation or efficient windows, some homeowner tax credits expire Dec. 31. Discount and rebate programs from the state of Maryland, Montgomery County and Pepco can help offset costs. Additional funding and financing options are available for low-income residents. Did you know that recycling just one aluminum can saves enough energy to power a laptop for two hours? Small actions really do add up!

Celebrate America Recycles Day with these easy tips to help you recycle right, reduce waste and reuse materials: Recycle Right

When in doubt, throw it out: Not everything belongs in the brown recycling cart. Greasy pizza boxes, Styrofoam, disposable cups, plastic bags and tanglers like electrical cords can contaminate the whole batch of recycling. Don't recycle these — dispose of them in the trash instead.

Rinse and repeat: Containers should be empty and rinsed. No need to scrub, just remove food particles.

Flatten cardboard and remove tape: Break down boxes to save space in the recycling cart. Remove plastic tape to prevent contamination.

Reduce Waste

B.Y.O. mug: Skip the disposable cups and bring your own. Some cafes even give discounts for bringing your own mugs.

Clean with cloth: Switch to rags and clothing for cleaning instead of disposable paper towels.

A new drop-off site opening this month offers residents a fourth site for composting food scraps.

The site at Potomac Woods Park opens Saturday, Nov. 1. There is no cost to drop off food scraps at city sites, which make composting easy, keeping valuable materials out of landfills and helping to reduce excessive greenhouse gas emissions. The sites are located at:

- Maintenance Facility, 4625 Rothgeb Drive.
- Potomac Woods Park, 1380 Stratton Drive.
- Twinbrook Community Recreation Center, 12920 Twinbrook Parkway.
- Rockville Senior Center, 1150 Carnation Drive. Food scraps are picked up weekly by a commercial contractor and delivered to

the Prince George's County Organic Compost Facility. How To Use the **Drop-Offs**

- 1. Place food scraps in a container - empty coffee containers with sealing lids are great for this. Be sure to remove any plastic or other trash.
- 2. Bring full containers and empty them into the designated green bins at one of the food scraps compost drop-offs. Follow the signs when you arrive. The sites are accessible 24/7 and the service is free of charge.
- 3. Rinse container and repeat.

Rockville Offers Resources for Federal Employees, Contractors Affected by Shutdown

The City of Rockville is providing services and programs for federal employees and contractors who live within the City of Rockville and have been impacted by the federal government shutdown.

The federal government shutdown does not affect City of Rockville municipal government programs, services or assistance. Information in this article was accurate at press time and reflects conditions during the period of the federal government shutdown.

Struggling federal employees and contractors could be eligible for delayed payment options, with no penalties, on certain city services, including child care, water bills, rent payments, pet license fees and food services.

Residents seeking delayed payment options can contact the relevant city department for more information and must provide proof of Rockville residency and federal employment, or of being a federal contractor (for example, with a federal employee/contractor ID badge or employer's letter).

Season's Eatings: Tips for Sustainable

Small changes in the kitchen help prevent waste and protect waterways.

Here are tips for feasting responsibly and making sustainability part of your Thanksgiving tradition:

Love your leftovers: Don't let good food go to waste. Turn turkey bones into broth, transform mashed potatoes into pancakes, convert vegetable scraps into homemade stock or send guests home with a container of goodies. Freeze extra herbs in olive oil for easy cooking later.

Plan the plate: Overcooking leads to wasted food. Use a portion calculator to plan the menu, and shop with a list to avoid buying extras that won't be used. Try using dishes, glassware, flatware, tablecloths, cloth napkins and natural decor instead of disposable items.

Cook seasonally: Choose local, inseason produce like squash, sweet potatoes and apples. They taste better, support local farmers and cut down on transportation

Keep pipes happy: Never pour grease, clogs pipes and can cause sewer backups. Instead, pour or scrape cooled grease into a sealable container, then toss it in the trash. For larger amounts, up to 5 gallons of cooking oil can be taken to the county's Shady Grove Transfer Station, 16101 Frederick Road, in Derwood.

Save energy: For smaller portions, use smaller electric appliances like toaster ovens, microwaves or skillets. Bake several dishes in the oven at a time to save energy.

Receive a dollar-for-dollar match of up to \$15 weekly when shopping with SNAP/EBT (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program/ Electronic Benefits Transfer) and WIC-FVC (Women, Infants and Children-Fruit

and Vegetable Checks).

Matching funds can be used to purchase locally grown and produced items including fruits, vegetables, meat, cheese, dairy, baked goods, eggs and honey. The programs aim to fight hunger while investing directly in farmers, strengthening the local food system. Customers can stop by the market tent, located at the market entrance, for more information.

Commemorative Wall for Local Baseball Stars at Dogwood Park The City of Rockville's Recreation and Park Property Namic Commemoration

Board Recommends

Recreation and Park Advisory

The City of Rockville's Recreation and Park Advisory Board has recommended approval for a commemorative display recognizing inductees to the Rockville Baseball Hall of Fame.

The display would be installed on the side of the snack bar at Dogwood Park, pending final consideration by the Mayor and Council. The park is also home to a statue of Walter "Big Train" Johnson, one of the most accomplished pitchers of all time who is among 16 players recognized by Rockville's hall of fame.

The board voted unanimously at its Sept. 25 meeting to recommend approval of the request, submitted by Rockville Baseball Hall of Fame representative William Hickman. The hall of fame, established in 2019 in association with the Rockville Baseball Association, honors players, coaches and supporters of baseball in Rockville.

Under the city's Public

Property Naming and Commemoration Policy, the advisory board's recommendation now goes to the Mayor and Council for action. If approved, the city and the Rockville Baseball Association would establish a memorandum of understanding outlining responsibilities for the display's funding, installation and maintenance.

The agreement would add a Recreation and Parks representative to the hall of fame selection committee and require that the organization maintain an online record of inductees that is accessible to the public.

According to the request submitted to the city, the Rockville Baseball Hall of Fame hopes the commemorative wall at Dogwood Park will celebrate honorees' achievements and serve as an educational feature for young athletes.
