City of Rockville: 2025 Year in Review

JANUARY

The Mayor and Council unanimously approved the Town Center Master Plan, setting a long-term vision for downtown's public spaces, transportation connections and economic vitality. The plan capped a multiyear engagement process and moved into implementation this year.

The 2024 Resident Survey showed strong community satisfaction. Nine in 10 residents rated Rockville as a good or excellent place to live and praised neighborhood quality.

Rockville received the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting for the 34th consecutive year for its Fiscal Year 2023 annual report.

FEBRUARY

Rockville and the Asian Pacific American Task Force welcomed the Year of the Snake with a Lunar New Year celebration at Rockville High School. The city released its Electric Vehicle Readiness plan for public comment, outlining 26 actions to support charger access, fleet conversion and policy updates aligned with Climate Action Plan goals.

MARCH

Rockville introduced a comprehensive rebranding effort with updated logos, colors and typography, and a new motto, "Rise Together." "Rockville Reports" debuted the refreshed look.

Community visioning sessions continued for the King Farm Farmstead to help shape a master plan for the historic 7-acre site.

Rockville opened its Fiscal Year 2026 budget process and began public hearings. The city also observed Earth Hour by turning off nonessential lighting at its maintenance facility. **APRIL**

Rockville Scores Top Marks Again for Commitment to LGBTQ+ Community

Rockville has scored 100 marks for the city's commitment to the health, welfare, safety and equality of its lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer community.

This is the city's eighth year of participation in the Human Rights Campaign's Municipal Equality Index and the 14th year for MEI's annual report.

Rockville scored 99 out of 100, plus an additional bonus point, for its nondiscrimination laws, law enforcement, employment and workplace inclusivity, leadership and services to the LGBTQ+ community. Final scores cannot exceed 100.

The HRC framed this year's results against a challenging national backdrop, underscoring the work of local governments supporting their LGBTQ+ residents.

"Cities and towns around the country are stepping up each and every day, finding new and innovative ways to empower LGBTQ+ people in the face of a dire national state of emergency. Even when anti-LBGTQ+ extremists in state capitals are working to undermine their progress, mayors and city councilmembers keep fighting to make sure that LGBTQ+ people in their communities — especially trans people — are supported and lifted up to the fullest extent

possible," stated HRC president Kelley Robinson.

The 2025 MEI showed local government leaders' dedication while governing in an "increasingly hostile environment," she continued.

The 14th annual MEI scorecard, released in mid-November, analyzes and rates 506 municipalities across the country, measuring each for the inclusivity of laws, policies and services for their LGBTQ+communities. The MEI is the only nationwide assessment of municipal laws, policies and services that are inclusive of LGBTQ+ people.

Cities rated include the 50 state capitals, the 200 largest cities in the U.S., the five largest cities or municipalities in each state, cities home to the state's two largest public universities, 75 cities and municipalities that have high proportions of same-sex couples, and 98 cities selected by HRC and Equality Federation state groups' members and supporters.

Cities are rated across numerous criteria, covering citywide nondiscrimination protections, policies for municipal employees, city services, law enforcement and the city's leadership on LGBTQ+ equality.



City to Host Virtual Meetings on Zoning Ordinance Rewrite and Comprehensive Map Amendment

Learn about how to comment on Rockville's draft zoning ordinance and zoning map during two virtual public meetings on Thursday, Dec. 4 and Wednesday, Jan. 7.

The meetings will be held via Webex at 7 p.m.

City staff will provide an overview of the draft zoning ordinance and map, and share tools for reviewing and commenting on the documents. Registration information will be available at engagerockville. com/zoningrewrite, where the first drafts of the new zoning ordinance and map were released in late November.

The virtual public meetings are scheduled toward the start of the public review phase of the project, which formally begins when the Mayor and Council authorize the filing of associated zoning text amendment and comprehensive map amendment applications.

The Mayor and Council are scheduled to authorize the filing of the zoning text and map amendments at their Monday, Dec. 1 meeting, after press time for this issue of "Rockville"

Reports." That authorization would begin formal public review, including a series of meetings before the Planning Commission in early 2026, followed by Mayor and Council review in spring. Adoption of the final drafts is expected later that season.

The rewrite implements land use and zoning policies of the Rockville 2040 Comprehensive Plan, which guides the city's long-term growth and development, and the Town Center Master Plan. The proposed changes are intended to align zoning regulations with the community's vision for Rockville's future.

As the zoning ordinance is updated, the city's zoning map will also be revised, and some properties will be rezoned through the Comprehensive Map Amendment.

Matching Grant Program Deadline Approaches Dec. 5

Neighbors and community groups have until Friday, Dec. 5 to apply for the city's Community Empowerment Matching Grant program, which helps residents work together on projects that support the health, vitality and inclusivity of the place they call home.

Applications are open to tenant, neighborhood, civic or homeowners associations, community groups, organized groups of neighbors, and student groups. The required match may be met with cash, in-kind support, or volunteer hours.

Grants typically range from \$500 to \$1,000, must benefit a clearly identified area within city limits and address one or more of the following objectives:

Building community: Projects that promote the development or sustainability of a neighborhood association or community group, or activities that foster diversity and equity.

Community improvement projects: Projects

that improve shared space within a neighborhood or strengthen community identity. This may include landscape improvements and maintenance, natural features management, benches, painting or certain exterior improvements. Bonus points will be awarded if two or more groups work together on a project.

Livability initiatives:
Projects that provide educational and outreach opportunities that strengthen social connections between neighbors or neighborhoods. This may include improving safety, addressing a neighborhood challenge or conflict, serving low-income seniors or finding ways to welcome newcomers to Rockville.

Mural Installed at Twinbrook Community Recreation Center Annex

Baltimore-based artist LaToya Peoples has installed a new mural at the Twinbrook Community Recreation Center Annex. The city is planning a dedication event, with details to be shared soon.

Peoples' mural, "Past to Promise," celebrates the history, culture and natural character of the Twinbrook neighborhood. The work features three figures representing past, present and future, and is rich with symbols tied to the community's roots.

The background depicts an idealized scene inspired by the two streams of Twinbrook and the Higgins farm, and honors the enslaved people who lived there. The background also depicts the classic Cape Cod-style homes built post-World War II, when many veterans settled in Twinbrook after returning from the war.

Earlier this year, residents previewed the mural design and shared their feedback during a community engagement session at the center. Peoples presented her vision for the work and joined a discussion about the project's themes and inspiration.

Rockville Awarded \$1.5 Million for RedGate Park and Arboretum **Renovations**

The Mayor and Council voted unanimously in November to accept a \$1.5 million grant from the Maryland Department of Natural Resources' Land and Water Conservation Fund to support renovations to RedGate Park and Arboretum.

The grant is part of more than \$12 million awarded through the fund to support outdoor recreation projects throughout Maryland.

RedGate Park and Arboretum was identified by the city as a priority for renovations when it was converted from a golf course to a park in 2018. The 130-acre site is located at the intersection of Norbeck and Avery roads.

Have Your Say With the Budget Survey

Public hearings on the Fiscal Year 2027 city budget resume in March, following the introduction of the city manager's budget proposal.

In the meantime, the community budget priorities survey is available in English, Spanish and simplified Chinese at rockvillemd.gov/budget. Public participation in the budget process is a high priority for the Mayor and Council and city staff. Survey responses provide valuable input to the Mayor and Council for their budget

A Nov. 10 staff report to the Mayor and Council includes an interim report of the survey results as of Oct. 20, as well as a summary of public testimony, and exhibits for proposed project submissions from community groups and individuals. The city manager's FY27 budget proposal will be presented Monday, March 9, followed by public hearings and work sessions on Mondays, March 9 and 23, and a final balancing and Capital Improvements Program work session on Monday, April 13. The budget is scheduled for adoption on Monday, May 4.

RCPD Details Positive Trends in Community Policing Mission "[In] 2024, we did see sig-"We're working on a new nificant issues around the city," West said. "In 2024, we had significant staffing issues in our police department. We do not have that problem to date."

Over the past year, the department filled all vacant police positions — a total of 18 new officers — and has 11 recruit officers in police academies in Montgomery and Frederick counties. There is just one current vacancy.

Improved recruitment and a partnership with county police have also led to quicker response times. The average time for officers to respond to calls, from dispatch to arrival on scene, decreased from 9.2 minutes in 2023 to 8.6 minutes in 2024 and held steady through the first 10 months of 2025. This is even as call volume increased 49% from 2023 and 2024.

strategy to redeploy our officers so that we can make sure we provide equal service to all areas of our city," West said. That includes increasing the number of patrol sectors in 2026 from three to five.

The department includes 73 sworn officers and 23 civilian staff members. It was reaccredited in 2024 by the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies, recognizing RCPD as among the top law enforcement agencies in the country.

Save the Date: Rockville's Lunar New Year Celebration is Feb. 21


Celebrate Rockville's Asian cultures with performances, interactive displays, kids' crafts and to-go snack boxes at the city's Lunar New Year celebration.

Celebrate Smarter: Reduce Holiday Waste

The holiday season is a time for joy, connection and giving back — it's also one of the most wasteful times of the year. According to the Environmental Protection Agency, household waste increases by about 25% between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day, about an extra 1 million tons of waste per week nationwide.

Every gift and decoration choice contributes to the community's waste footprint. Reducing waste conserves natural resources and landfill space and cuts greenhouse-gas emissions. Choosing sustainable options helps keep Rockville cleaner and greener.

Simple Ways to Celebrate

Buy Local: Support the local economy by visiting local artisan shops, farmers markets and craft fairs. This helps reduce transportation emissions and decreases carbon footprint.

Sustainably:

Give Experiences: Memories last longer than packaging. Gift someone a cooking class, concert tickets, or a park or gym membership.

Gift Greener:

Consolidate online orders to cut down on shipping materials.

Give Back: Donate, volunteer or purchase a gift subscription to a community-supported agriculture farm's seasonal harvest.

Recycle Right: Use reusable bags or fabric wrapping, avoid metallic or glittery paper that cannot be recycled, and compost food scraps where possible.

Practical Hosting Tips:

Plan meals based on realistic guest counts and portion sizes, freeze leftovers and donate extra food.

Decorate mindfully. Choose LED lights rather than incandescent, reuse ornaments, avoid disposable decor.

Wrap smart. Pull out previously used boxes, reuse shipping boxes, wrap in cloth/fabric.

When cleaning up, separate recyclables properly (avoid "wish-cycling") and compost food scraps where available.

Last Chance for Clean Energy Tax Credits

Federal tax credits on electric appliances and solar panels expire at year's end and now is the time to apply to take advantage of them.

Solar: Lower prices for residential solar leases or solar power purchase agreements are still available. Leased residential solar panels are considered commercial tax credits since the installer claims them, lowering lease rates. Commercial/leased residential projects must be under construction by Saturday, July 4, but new restrictions apply after Thursday, Jan. 1. Consider signing on to solar now while supplies last.

Electric appliances and home efficiency: For resi-

to electric appliances, or adding extra insulation or efficient windows, federal tax credits for homeowners expire Dec. 31. Montgomery County's Electrify MC and Pepco's Home Performance With Energy Star programs are ongoing and can also help offset costs. A Brighter, Greener Rockville

Croydon Creek Nature Center is shining a little brighter these days. In November, the city upgraded the building with new LED lighting, bringing crisp, energy-efficient illumination to the space.

The project replaced 130 lights at the center with energy-efficient LEDs. These new lights not only enhance visibility and safety but also save energy, reduce maintenance costs and cut greenhouse gas emissions. Many of the new lights feature occupancy sensors with automated dimming, saving energy when spaces are unoccupied.

The improved lighting efficiency is projected to save the city \$2,273 in annual electricity costs while also noticeably brighten-

ing the space for staff and the public. The project was largely funded by a Pepco rebate and a Maryland Smart Energy Communities grant from the Maryland Energy Administration.

"It was an honor supporting this 'en-light-ening' investment," said Denzel John, Rockville's sustainability program manager.

LED lighting upgrades were completed earlier this year at F. Scott Fitzgerald Theatre and Rockville Civic Center Park. More updates are underway at Thomas Farm Community Center and the city's maintenance facility. These upgrades are a shining example of how small changes can make a big impact on the environment and the Rockville community.

Bring Your Own Bag Law to Apply in Rockville



Many Rockville businesses will be prohibited from using plastic carryout bags beginning in January, after the Mayor and Council voted Nov. 10 to apply Montgomery County's Bring Your Own Bag Law in the City of Rockville, starting Thursday, Jan. 1.

The goal of the law is to reduce waste, protect waterways and encourage reusable bag use.

What the New Law Means


- No more plastic carryout bags at many businesses. Plastic carryout bags will no longer be allowed starting Thursday, Jan. 1, with certain exceptions.
- Paper bags will cost 10 cents each. If you forget your reusable bag, you can purchase a paper bag at the checkout.
- Bring reusable bags.
 Save money and the environment by keeping reusable bags handy.
 They're sturdier, hold more and won't rip on

the way home. Exemptions from the Law

- Plastic bags are still allowed in some instances, including medications from pharmacies, fresh produce, meats, seafood or bulk items, farmers markets, yard sales, and dry cleaning and garment bags.
- The 10-cent paper bag tax does not apply to transactions using SNAP/EBT (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program/Electronic Benefits Transfer), WIC-FVC (Women, Infants and Children) or other stateapproved food assistance benefits at a grocery store.
- Restaurants are not required to collect the tax from customers for paper bags used to carry out prepared or leftover food or drink.

Half the tax revenues will go toward water quality programs

Leaf Vacuuming Makes Final Sweep This Month

The city is scheduled to conclude its fall leaf collection on Friday, Dec. 19, with crews completing the second of two rounds of vacuuming leaves from neighborhood curbs.

An interactive map at rockvillemd.gov/leaf collection allows residents to input their address and learn when their leaves will be collected.

Rake leaves next to, but out of, roadways, gutters and bike lanes, and away from parked vehicles. Leaves should be raked by 6 a.m. on the first day of their collection period, but no earlier than one week before the collection dates to avoid grass damage or fire hazards. Remove sticks and other objects from leaf piles. Avoid parking near leaf piles or other vehicles. After the collection period ends, use biodegradable paper lawn bags or 32-gallon trash cans (without plastic garbage bags) to set leaves out on your recycling and trash collection day.

Sustainable Leaf Tips

Leave some leaves where they fall or rake into garden beds to serve as natural mulch and habitat for beneficial insects that overwinter in leaves, such as butterflies, fireflies and native bees. Learn more about helping wildlife at rock villemd.govbackyardhabitats.

Mow over leaves to break them into tiny pieces that can filter into the grass, providing much-needed nutrients.

Compost leaves at home with other yard trimmings.

Post-Christmas 'Tree-tment': An At-Home Way to Recycle Holiday Trees

Rockville collects Christmas trees as part of its recycling collection.

Place trees at the curb for pickup on regular recycling and trash collection days after removing all ornaments and metals, wires, stands and decorations, including tinsel. Trees should not be bagged. There is no deadline for curbside collection of trees.

The county recommends recycling branches and needles at home by using them as ground cover under trees and shrubs, or by chopping them up and adding them to a compost pile.

Artificial trees cannot be recycled and should be placed in the gray trash cart for regular weekly collection. Artificial trees that are too large to fit in the cart can be collected by appointment as one of six bulk collections allowed per year or taken to the transfer

Rockville's Winter Weather Resources Keep You In the Know When It Snows

When winter weather strikes, turn to the city's website at rockvillemd.gov.

Closure and snow emergency information will be available on the website, as well as through Facebook (facebook.com/cityof rockville) and X (@rockville411), and by signing up for Alert Rockville notifications at rockvillemd.gov/alerts.

City crews treat and plow roads in priority order. First are primary roads, including major arterial roads, emergency routes, central business districts and primary residential roads near schools. Next are secondary roads, including the remainder of neighborhood streets, alleyways and cul-de-sacs. To check if an address is within the city limits, find the Address and Residency Check map at rockvillemd. gov/maps.

Removing snow from sidewalks, driveways and

entrances is the responsibility of the property and/or business owner or a community association. Rockville requires that snow and ice be removed from sidewalks, steps, driveways, parking spaces and similar paved areas for public use within 24 hours after a snowfall of up to 3 inches, within 48 hours after a snowfall of 3-10 inches, and within 72 hours after a snowfall of more than 10 inches. If residents can do so, they should clear snow from around fire hydrants and storm drains. To report a sidewalk that has not been cleared within the required timeframe, call 240-314-8330.

Residents are encouraged to check on older neighbors who may need assistance clearing snow. For information about the city's volunteer snow shoveling for seniors and those with disabilities program, visit bit.ly/rkvsnowvol.

Stay Warm, Save Money, Help the Planet

Being energy smart doesn't mean being cold. Simple habits like sealing drafts and adjusting thermostats can cut heating costs by 10-15% without sacrificing comfort. These small steps keep homes cozy, wallets happy and carbon footprints low.

Cold Facts:

- Heating can make up over half of your winter energy bills.
- Drafts around doors and windows can waste up to 30% of your home's heat.
- Save 1-2% in cost for every degree the thermostat is lowered.

Warm Tips:

- Turn the thermostat down 2-3 degrees when asleep or out of the house.
- Set ceiling fans to spin clockwise on low speed to circulate warm air.
- Reduce drafts by rolling up an old towel or sew a "door snake," a stuffed fabric tube, to block cold air from sneaking in under doors.
- Heat the person rather than the room: layer up with sweaters, fuzzy socks or a small, heated blanket.
- Use thick curtains and area rugs to reduce cold from windows and floors.
- Unplug chargers and gadgets when not using them or plug them into a power strip that is easily turned off.

Don't Let a Clog Become an Unwanted Holiday Guest

When the holiday feast is finished, don't pour fats, oils and grease, i.e., FOG, down the drain.

FOG, including sauces, gravy and salad dressings, can trap solids, form hard deposits and clog pipes, causing basement backups, sewer overflows and costly damage to city infrastructure and private property.

Before washing dishes, scrape food and grease into a trash can, use a paper towel to wipe away oil, or pour FOG into an empty can, let it cool to solidify and dispose of it.

Help Put a Halt to Pollution From Salt

When it comes to winter salt, less is more. Not only do you need a small amount of salt to melt ice, but using too much can damage landscaping, harm pets and local wildlife, and contaminate streams and drinking water. Follow these tips to be salt smart this winter.

Shovel early and often. Deicers work best for melting thin layers of snow or ice. So, shovel first, break up any ice patches you can and then add the deicer.

Use less salt. Sprinkle deicer sparingly and evenly and leave space between the grains. More is not better. A 12-ounce mug of salt is enough to treat a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares. Consider organic, salt-free and pet-safe deicers.

Sweep and reuse. After a weather event, sweep and collect any sand, salt or undissolved deicer. Any excess can be reused for the next storm. Letting it run off into waterways is harmful to drinking water and wildlife.



Results Rockville Expands with New Dashboards to **Track Progress on Major Initiatives**

Rockville has launched a new phase of Results Rockville, expanding the city's online performance dashboard to include the Rockville 2040 Comprehensive Plan and the 2025 Rockville Town Center Master Plan.

The new dashboards cover the "Elements" and "Planning Areas" components of the city's comprehensive plan, plus the Town Center master plan, bringing the total number of plans tracked through Results Rockville to eight. The newly added plans represent 1,034 unique action items and participation from 76 staff members across multiple departments.

The expanded dashboards provide a detailed view of city progress on the long-term priorities of the comprehensive plan, such as land use, transportation, housing and others. Each dashboard highlights the current status and progress of the component parts of the plans.

Results Rockville was

created to make city performance data and plan statuses accessible and understandable for the public, reflecting the city's commitment to transparency, accountability and evidence-based decisionmaking. The new dashboards are updated twice a year. Others are updated monthly or annually, depending on the plan.

The latest update marks the completion of a major transition in how Rockville tracks comprehensive plan progress. Over the past year, the tracking system was converted from spreadsheets to Envisio, an online project management tool that enables publication of the interactive dashboards and real-time updates.
