



WHEREAS, Kwanzaa is an annual celebration of African American culture, born out of the turbulent civil rights era of the 1960s; and

WHEREAS, Kwanzaa was created by Dr. Maulana Karenga, who first celebrated it in 1966, it was derived from African harvest festival traditions from various parts of Africa, including West and Southern Africa; and

WHEREAS, Kwanzaa is observed for 7 days, from December 26 through January 1; and

WHEREAS, the name Kwanzaa derives from the Swahili phrase *matunda ya kwanza*, which means, "First Fruits;" and

WHEREAS, the seven/principles days of Kwanzaa are: Day 1- **Umoja** (Unity) Day 2 – **Kujichagulia** (Self-Determination), Day 3 – **Ujima** (Collective Work and Responsibility), Day 4 – **Ujamaa** (Cooperative Economics), Day 5 – **Nia** (Purpose), Day 6 – **Kuumba** (Creativity), Day 7 – **Imani** (Faith); and

WHEREAS, on the seventh day of the celebration, gifts are given to encourage growth, achievement, and success. Handmade or culturally significant gifts are exchanged to promote self-determination, purpose, creativity, and love.






