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Mayor and Council Recognize Recreation and Parks as National Gold Medal Finalist

Rockville's Mayor and Council formally recognized the Department of Recreation and Parks for being named a 2025 National Gold Medal finalist for Excellence in Park and Recreation Management.

Rockville was selected as a finalist in the population category of 30,001-75,000, placing the department among four agencies nationwide recognized in that category.

The National Gold Medal Award honors public recreation and parks agencies and state park systems throughout the United States, as well as armed forces recreation programs worldwide. The award recognizes excellence in long-range planning, resource management and innovative approaches to delivering recreation and park services while maintaining fiscally sound business practices.

The program is governed and administered by the American Academy of Parks and Recreation in partnership with the National Recreation and Park Association.

Each completed application was independently reviewed by a panel of five recreation and parks professionals selected by the academy based on management experience, agency size and type, geographic location and diversity. From that pool, four agencies in each population category are selected as finalists, along with finalists representing armed forces recreation programs and state park systems.

Finalists were announced in late April, and finalist and Grand Plaque awards were presented at the 2025 NRPA Annual Park and Recreation

Resident Runs All of Rockville's Roads

Credits City's Safe Streets While Completing Quest



Call him the Rockville Roadrunner.

In January 2025, Matthew Sushinsky unfolded a city map — the old school paper kind — and set a goal: run every street within the city limits by year's end, with each run starting from the front door of his home in the Silver Rock neighborhood.

On Dec. 19, after 42 runs totaling 443.75 miles, Sushinsky accomplished his goal.

While the feat is a testament to Sushinsky's cardio fitness, he said it also allowed him to discover his hometown, street by street, and gain a greater appreciation for Rockville's commitment to pedestrian safety.

"One of the most notable things is how runnable/walkable the city is," Sushinsky said. "I felt completely safe while performing my challenge."

There were just two streets where Sushinsky said he had to modify his running route. The first was Avery Road where the

sidewalk ends before reaching the city limits. There he ended up running in RedGate Park, alongside the road. The second was a section of Norbeck Road between Baltimore Road and First Street where there is no sidewalk or shoulder. "The Millennium Trail runs along the parallel street, First Street, so I ran that twice," he said.

Sushinsky said running friends told him about the city's Vision Zero initiative to eliminate traffic-related deaths and serious injuries. The city might be interested in hearing about what he observed while completing his challenge, the friends said.

"Besides those two streets, everything else in Rockville was very runnable, with or without sidewalks on both sides," Sushinsky said. "Thank you for providing a safe community."

Zoning Ordinance Rewrite and Map Amendment Move Toward Final Adoption

Rockville's multiyear zoning ordinance rewrite and comprehensive map amendment project has entered its final phase.

The adoption phase is the final step in updating the city's zoning ordinance and zoning map. The Planning Commission began its adoption review in January with a series of public hearings and work sessions. After completing its review, the Planning Commission will make a recommendation to the Mayor and Council, who will then hold work sessions and public hearings. Public testimony has and will continue to be accepted throughout the process. The full adoption schedule, available online at engagerockville.com/zoningrewrite, is subject to change.

At its Jan. 14 meeting, the Planning Commission was expected to hold its first adoption work session and public hearing. Topics included a briefing on historic preservation; the comprehensive map amendment for planning area 12, Tower Oaks and planning area 10, Montrose and North Farm; parking and loading requirements; pedestrian and bicycle facilities; and amenity space.

The commission continued its review at a second adoption work session and public hearing on Jan. 28, after "Rockville Reports" had gone to press. Discussion included fencing, including deer mesh; certain use standards; non-conformities; and the state's Starter and Silver Homes Act.

The Planning

Commission is scheduled to hold work sessions on Wednesdays, Feb. 4 and 11. Planned discussion topics include development standards, specifically bonus density and setback requirements; development review processes; notification requirements; appeal timelines and public outreach for administrative decisions; Park Zone; signage; and additional items as necessary.

The commission is expected to make its recommendation to the Mayor and Council on Wednesday, Feb. 25.

Planning Commission meetings begin at 7 p.m. and are held in the Mayor and Council chamber at Rockville City Hall. Meetings are broadcast live on Rockville 11, channel 11 on county cable, and video of the meeting, including staff reports and briefing documents, will be available on rockvillemd.gov/agendacenter.

Comments continue to be accepted on both staff drafts of the zoning ordinance and zoning map. Separate feedback forms are available for each component of the project, including one for the draft zoning ordinance and another for the draft zoning map. Feedback submitted through Engage Rockville will be shared with the Planning Commission and the Mayor and Council during their respective work sessions.

Fourth Graders: What Would You Do If You Were Mayor?

March 5 is the Deadline for the ‘If I Were Mayor ...’ Essay Contest

Rockville fourth graders have a chance to meet Mayor Monique Ashton and imagine what they would do if they were mayor by taking part in the Maryland Municipal League’s statewide “If I Were Mayor” essay contest.

This year’s theme is “90 Years Strong: Where Tradition Meets Innovation.” Students are asked to identify a community tradition they value and write an essay of no more than 275 words about what they would do, if they were mayor, to imagine their community 90 years in the future. Students should answer how the tradition and community would change, whether the tradition would help the community work together, and how innovations, such as technology, would impact their community.



One winning essay will be selected from each of MML’s 11 districts. Winners will receive a \$100 cash prize and a citation from the governor and will be honored, along with their parents and teacher, during an awards ceremony in April in Annapolis.

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City Manager to Present Budget Proposal to Mayor and Council on March 9

Community Priorities Survey Offers Opportunity for Neighborhood Representation

City Manager Jeff Mihelich is scheduled to present Rockville’s proposed Fiscal Year 2026 operating budget and Capital Improvements Program on Monday, March 9, followed by Mayor and Council public hearings and work sessions in March and April. The proposed budget will be available beginning Friday, March 6 at rockvillemd.gov/budget.

Public participation in the budget process is a high priority for the Mayor and Council and city staff. That includes having all parts of the city represented in responses to a survey about community priorities for the city’s budget.

The community budget priorities survey is available in English, Spanish and simplified Chinese at rockvillemd.gov/budget. The survey takes 5-10 minutes to complete and provides valuable input to the Mayor and Council for their

budget discussions.

The Mayor and Council are scheduled to hold public hearings and work sessions on Mondays, March 9 and 23. A final balancing and Capital Improvements Program work session, and the closing of the public record, is scheduled for Monday, April 13.

The Mayor and Council are scheduled to adopt the budget on Monday, May 4. FY27 begins Wednesday, July 1.

The \$175.5 million budget for Fiscal Year 2026, which began July 1, keeps the city’s real property tax rate at \$0.292 per \$100 of assessed valuation. All residential and commercial property owners pay this tax. Rockville has not increased its property tax rate since 1995.

Reminder: Bring Your Own Bag Law Now Applies in Rockville

With Montgomery County's Bring Your Own Bag Law now applying in Rockville, here's what city businesses and customers should keep in mind:

- **No more plastic carryout bags at many businesses.** Plastic carryout bags are no longer allowed, with certain exceptions.
- **Paper bags will cost 10 cents each.** If you forget your reusable bag, purchase a paper bag at the checkout.
- **Bring reusable bags.** Save money and the environment by keeping reusable bags handy. They're sturdier, hold more and won't rip on the way home.

Safe Steps, Cleaner Streams: Reducing Salt Use for Smarter Winter Deicing

Salt helps keep our streets and sidewalks safe in the winter. But too much salt can harm wildlife and pets, damage infrastructure, and contaminate drinking water. Follow these steps to keep your sidewalks and driveway safe, while minimizing the environmental impact:

1. **Shovel early** and often. Salt works best on thin layers of ice or snow.
2. **Scatter** salt to leave a few inches of space between the grains.
3. **Sweep** up extra salt for future use and to prevent it from washing away.

Winter Plumbing Protection: Tips for Preventing Frozen Pipes



Freezing temperatures can lead to frozen pipes or meters, leaving homes without running water or burst pipes that cause costly damage to homes and infrastructure. To prevent frozen pipes:

- When freezing weather is forecast, turn off inside valves that control the water supply to outside hose attachments (known as bibs). Open the outside hose bibs to allow any water in the line to drain out. Keep the valve open. Remove and drain garden hoses and drain in-ground irrigation systems.
- Eliminate sources of cold air near pipes. Close off crawl spaces, seal drafty windows and doors, and insulate walls and attics.
- Use insulation, pipe sleeves or newspaper to wrap pipes that are exposed to cold air.
- During extended absences, set the thermostat to at least 55 degrees, or shut off the main water valve.
- In severe cold, keep water moving through pipes. Turn on the faucet farthest from your main valve to a very small, steady trickle.

If pipes freeze:

- Shut off the water immediately at the main shut-off valve.
- Warm air around the pipes using a hair dryer. Do not use a kerosene

heater, blow torch or open flame.

- Once pipes are thawed, slowly turn water back on. Check all joints for leaks and other areas for cracks that may have resulted from the freeze.

- Freezing water can cause rain barrels to crack or deform. When freezing temperatures are forecast, store barrels in a garage or shed, or disconnect the barrel and divert water to the ground using a downspout.

If you suspect your meter might be frozen and pay water bills to the City of Rockville, call 240-314-8567 to schedule a service call. 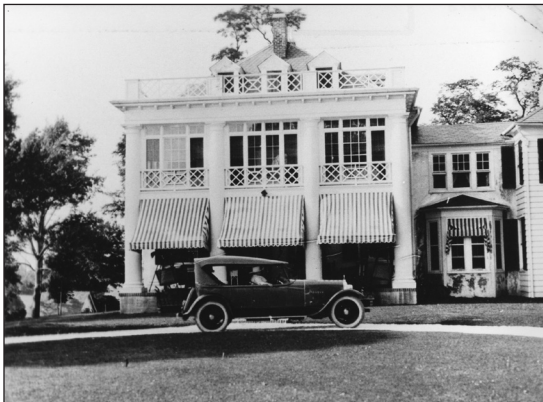

Drive Wisely With These Tips for Winter Travel

February can bring some of the snowiest, iciest conditions to Rockville. Drive safely with these tips:

Keep your vehicle well-maintained for the winter driving season: Check to see that the brakes, heating/cooling system, electrical system, engine, exhaust, tires, oil, lights, defrosters and wipers are working properly. Consider installing winter or snow tires with deep treads to help keep traction.

Equip vehicles with an emergency kit: Kits should include blankets, flashlights, extra clothes, a shovel, tow chain, matches, traction aids, flares, jumper cables and non-perishable snacks and water.

While driving in winter weather conditions:

- Always drive with lights on to help increase visibility.
- Increase following distance. Stopping distances are three to 12 times longer on winter surfaces.
- Come to a gradual stop. To reduce the risk of skidding, don't slam the brake pedal.
- Brake before curves and turn the steering wheel slowly and smoothly to help maintain control.
- Always wear your seatbelt.

Rockville Amends Forest and Tree Preservation Ordinance

The Mayor and Council approved amendments to the city's forest and tree preservation ordinance in January, expanding tree protections, adding new requirements for native tree plantings and encouraging greater biodiversity.

The changes took effect immediately. The amendments also update administrative provisions intended to improve efficiency while strengthening long-term protections for the city's tree canopy.

Rockville has been designated a Tree City USA for more than 35 consecutive years and is known for its extensive urban forest canopy. The updated ordinance builds on those efforts by reinforcing protections for trees and forested areas across the city.

The amendments were initiated in response to changes in state forestry regulations. In 2023, the Maryland General Assembly approved legislation intended to reduce the loss of forest and tree canopy statewide by establishing new standards and requirements.

As part of the update process, Rockville evaluated additional changes to the ordinance. Throughout 2024, the city provided opportunities for public input and gathered recommendations from the Mayor and Council. City staff developed proposed revisions, including changes that support efforts to improve development application efficiency.

After drafting the amended ordinance, staff worked with the Maryland Department of Natural Resources throughout much of 2025 to ensure compliance with state law.

Rockville to Seek Community Feedback for Housing Needs Assessment

The City of Rockville is continuing work on a comprehensive housing needs assessment, a multi-month effort to better understand existing and future housing needs across the community.

The assessment will examine housing affordability, availability and type, with a focus on identifying gaps affecting older adults, renters, people with disabilities, families and residents with limited or moderate incomes. Findings will help inform the city's future housing policy, programs and planning decisions.

Community input is a central component of the assessment. Beginning this winter and continuing into early spring, Rockville will invite community members to share their experiences, priorities and preferences related to housing.

Planned engagement efforts are expected to include an online survey and in-person outreach intended to reach people who may be less likely to par-

ticipate online. Additional opportunities for discussion and feedback are anticipated as the assessment progresses.

The city will make a particular effort to hear from groups that are often underrepresented in planning processes, including renters, older adults, people with disabilities and residents who speak languages other than English at home.

An open house will be held from 6-8 p.m. Wednesday, March 25 in the first-floor meeting space of Rockville Memorial Library, 21 Maryland Ave.

Information collected through surveys and engagement activities will be analyzed to build a clearer picture of housing needs citywide. A summary of community feedback and findings is anticipated later this spring.

Rockville's Generosity Lights Up Holidays for Community's Most in Need

Rockville's community warmth and holiday spirit were on display during the 2025 Holiday Drive, with 151 donors donating \$42,442.83 in cash to families and people in need throughout November and December.

In-kind, or non-monetary, donations totaled \$33,615.

Four-hundred-and-fifty-five volunteers donated 1,523 hours of their time. Hundreds of families were helped during the two-month campaign.
